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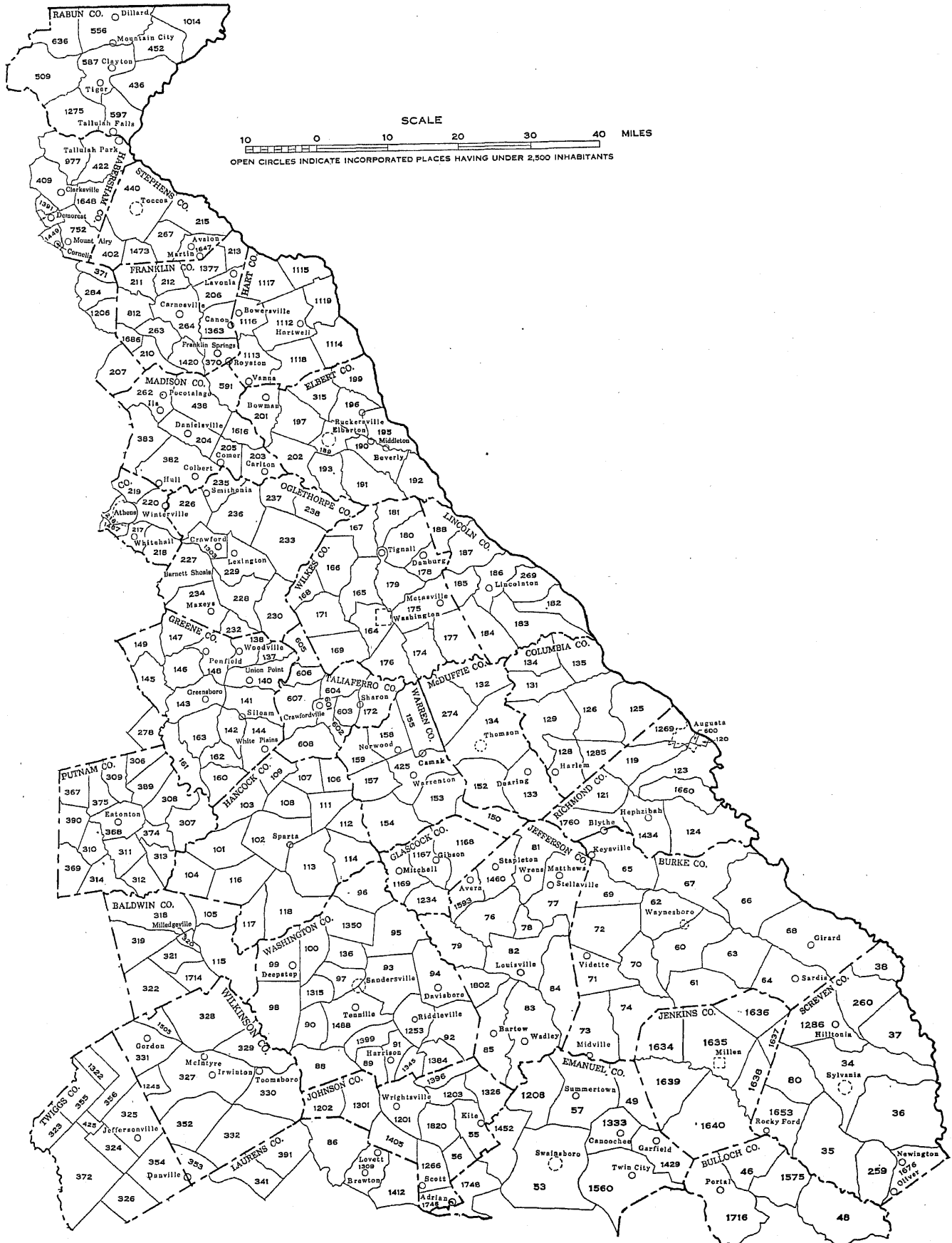

MINOR CIVIL DIVISIONS—MILITIA DISTRICTS

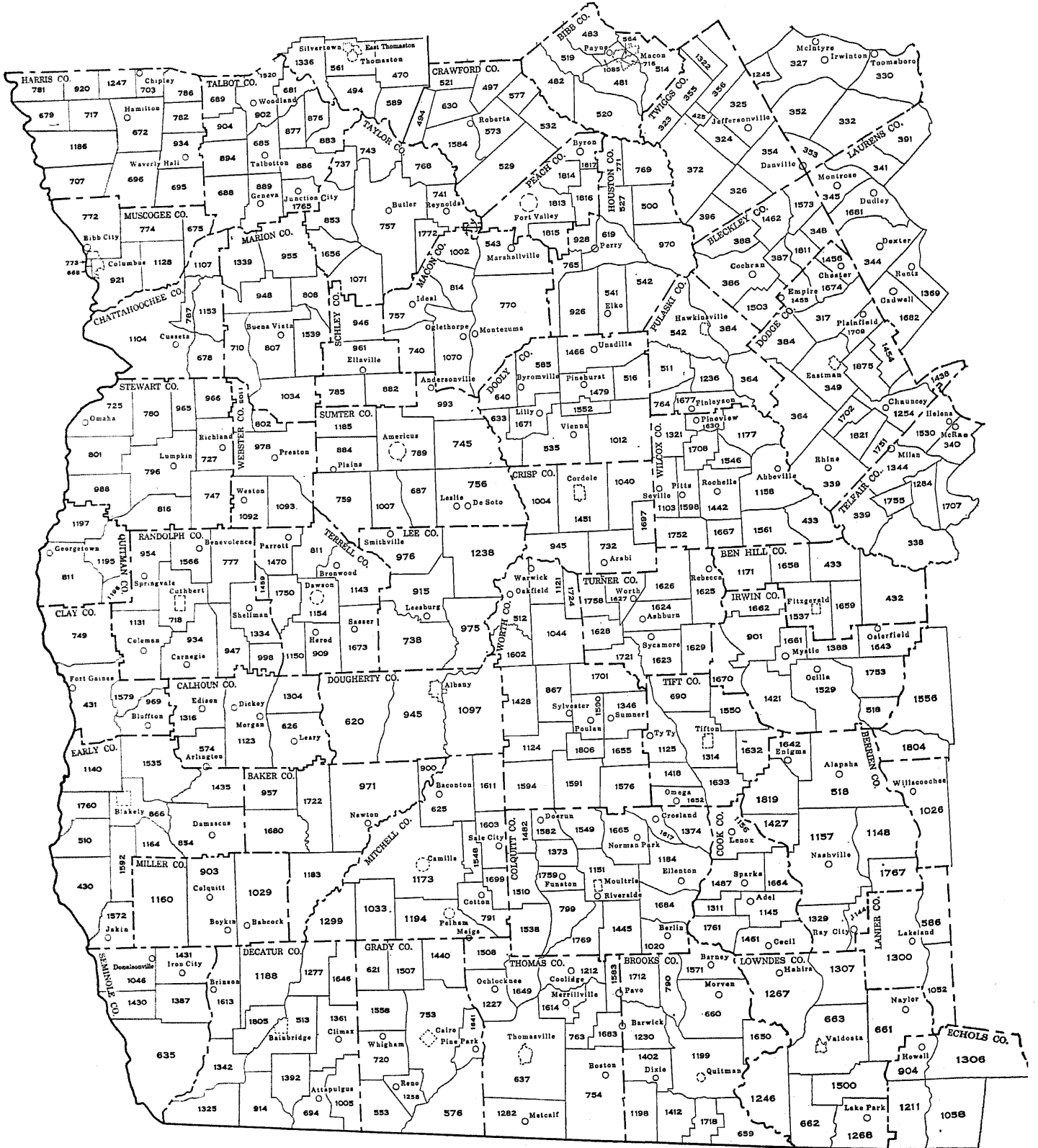

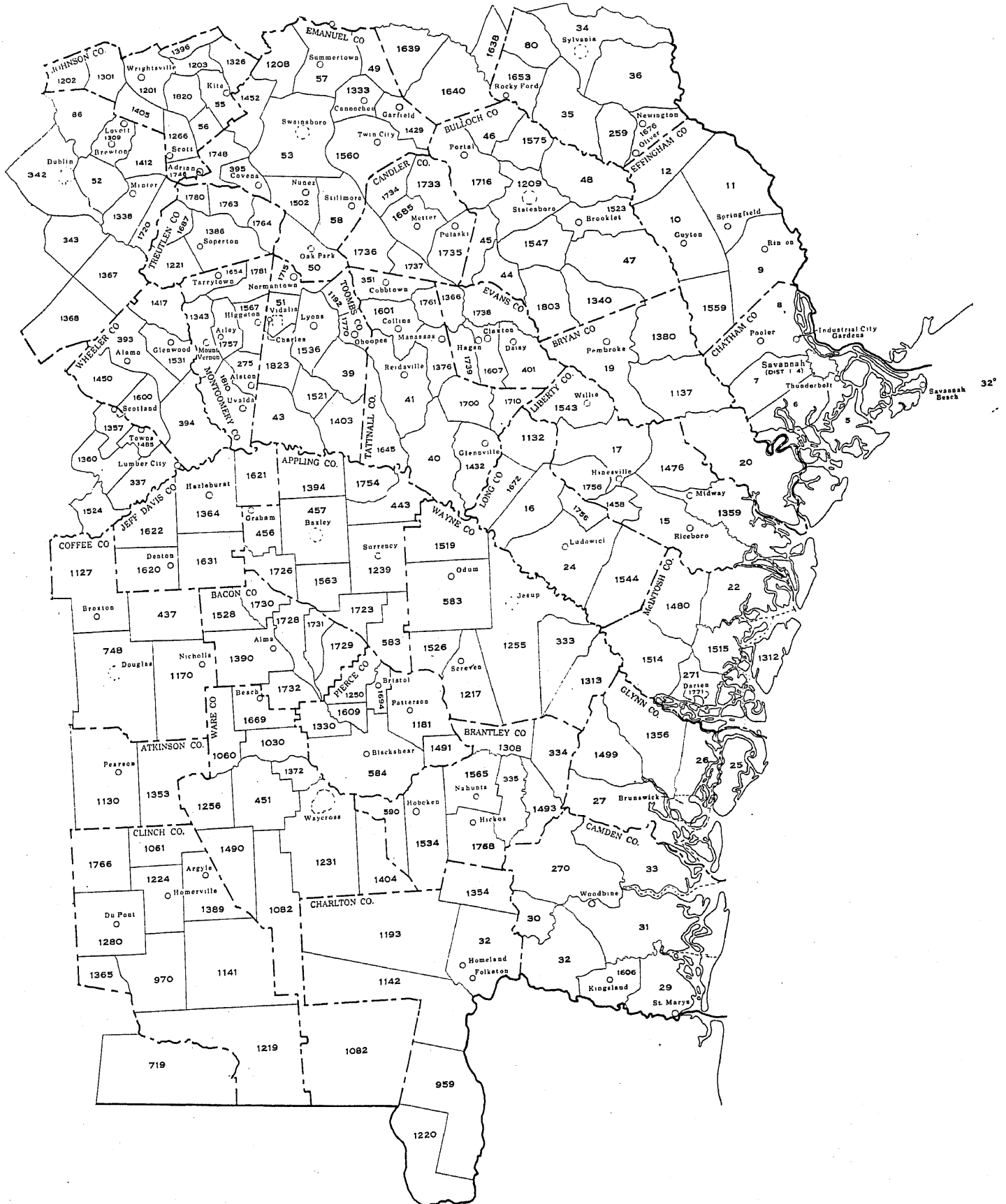

Population of the State.—Georgia was one of the Thirteen Original States. At the close of the Revolution it included territory extending westward to the Mississippi River, constituting most of the area now in Alabama and Mississippi. In 1798 part of this area was organized as the Territory of Mississippi. In 1802 Georgia ceded to the United States all its claims to the region west of its present western boundary, and a slight adjustment of its northern boundary, made at the same time, left the State with its present limits.

The population of Georgia on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 3,123,723, which

represents an increase of 215,217, or 7.4 percent, as compared with the population on April 1, 1930. The total land area of the State, as shown in table 3, is 58,518 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1940 was 53.4, as compared with 49.7 in 1930.

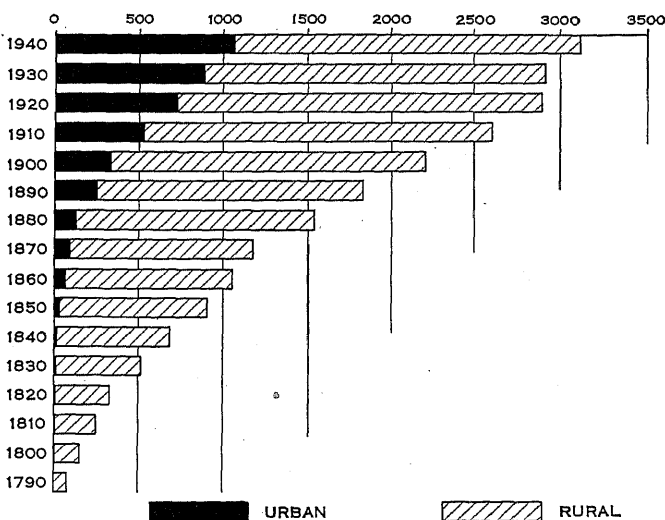
Table 1 shows the population of Georgia from 1790, the year of the first Federal census, to 1940, together with the increase during each decade. The urban and rural population of the State at each census is presented in this table and is also shown graphically in the accompanying chart.

The urban population of Georgia, as defined by the Census Bureau, consists mainly of those persons living in incorporated places of 2,500 or more. It also includes the population of one militia district, not incorporated as a municipality nor containing any areas so incorporated, which had a total population of more than 10,000 and a population density of more than 1,000 per square mile. The remainder of the population is classified as rural. The urban and rural areas are not necessarily constant from one census to the next, since new places are added to the urban list from time to time as they meet the requirements; for example, district 1511, Center Hill, in Fulton County, was classified as urban under the special rule in 1940 for the first time. Places are likewise taken off the urban list when, through decline in population, they no longer meet the requirements.

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS

Geographic subdivisions.—In tables 2 to 5 the population of Georgia is shown by counties, militia districts, cities, towns, and villages, with comparative figures from previous censuses. Table 6 gives the population of cities by wards. Data for the metropolitan districts are presented in tables 7 to 7-D and for the census tracts of the tracted cities and their adjacent areas in tables 8 to 8-C.

Cities of 10,000 or more.—There are 19 cities in the State that had a population of 10,000 or more in 1940. Table 2 shows the population of these cities at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase or decrease during each decade. Atlanta, the capital and largest city, had a population in 1940 of 302,288.

Counties.—Table 3 shows the population of the 159 counties of Georgia from 1920 to 1940, together with the land area of each county and its population per square mile in 1940. The land areas given here are the result of new measurements recently compiled and differ somewhat from those published in earlier census

reports. Of the 153 counties whose boundaries remained unchanged since 1930, 95 increased in population between 1930 and 1940, and 58 decreased. Information concerning boundary changes is given in the footnotes on table 3. This table also presents the urban and rural population of each county for 1940 and 1930.

Minor civil divisions.—To the primary political divisions into which the counties are subdivided the Census Bureau applies the general term "minor civil divisions." The primary divisions of the counties in Georgia are called militia districts, except for the city of Atlanta, which is independent of any militia district organization and is presented as a primary division in each of the two counties in which it is located; to make the presentation complete, the population is also shown, in *italics*, for the part outside the county and for the city as a whole. The incorporated cities (except Atlanta), towns, and villages form secondary subdivisions of the minor civil divisions in which they are located. There are 208 cities (including Atlanta), 369 towns, and 13 villages. Ordinarily, each of the secondary divisions forms a part of some militia district (or districts).

Table 4 shows the population of each county by militia districts, cities, towns, and villages for the last three censuses. The population of the cities (except Atlanta), towns, and villages is shown in *italics* under the population of the primary divisions in which the places are respectively located. Where an incorporated place is located in two or more militia districts in the same county, the total population of the place is given in connection with the presentation for the first militia district. Where the place is situated in two or more counties, the total population is given in connection with each county. *Italics* are also used for the comparative figures for 1930 and 1920 for districts formerly included in Campbell and Milton Counties but now in Fulton County through annexation. These figures are not to be added to make the Fulton County total for 1930 and 1920, but must be added in order to make the State total for those years.

Metropolitan districts.—Metropolitan districts have been set up for use in the 1940 Census of Population in connection with each city of 50,000 or more, two or more such cities sometimes being in one district. The general plan is to include in the district, in addition to the central city or cities, all adjacent and contiguous minor civil divisions having a population of 150 or more per square mile. In some metropolitan districts, a few less densely populated contiguous divisions are included on the basis of special qualifications. A metropolitan district is thus not a political unit but rather an area including all the thickly settled territory in and around a city or group of cities. It tends to be a more or less integrated area with common economic, social, and, often, administrative interests.

Table 7 shows the population of the Atlanta metropolitan district and its constituent political units in 1940 and 1930, together with the increase during the decade. In 1940 the Atlanta metropolitan district had 442,294 inhabitants, whereas in 1930 the district as then constituted had a population of 370,920. That part of district 1446, Oak, in Clayton County, outside College Park city; and districts 479, Bryants, and 1289, Adamsville, both in Fulton County, were included in the metropolitan district in 1940 for the first time. These new areas had a combined population of 6,280 in 1940 and of 3,838 in 1930.

Census tracts.—Census tracts are small areas into which certain large cities (and sometimes their adjacent areas) have been subdivided, through cooperation with a local committee in each case, for statistical and local administrative purposes. The tracts are permanently established, so that comparisons may be made from census to census; they are laid out with a view to approximate uniformity in population and with some regard for uniformity in area; and each is designed to include an area fairly homogeneous in population characteristics. In tables 8 to 8-C the 1940 population of the cities of Atlanta, Augusta, Macon, and Savannah, respectively, is shown by census tracts. These tables also give the 1940 population of certain adjacent areas by tracts, as shown on the accompanying maps. The tracted area adjacent to Macon comprises all the remainder of Bibb County; and the tracted area adjacent to Savannah comprises all the remainder of Chatham County. Since these tracts were not established until after 1930, there are no comparative figures for earlier censuses.

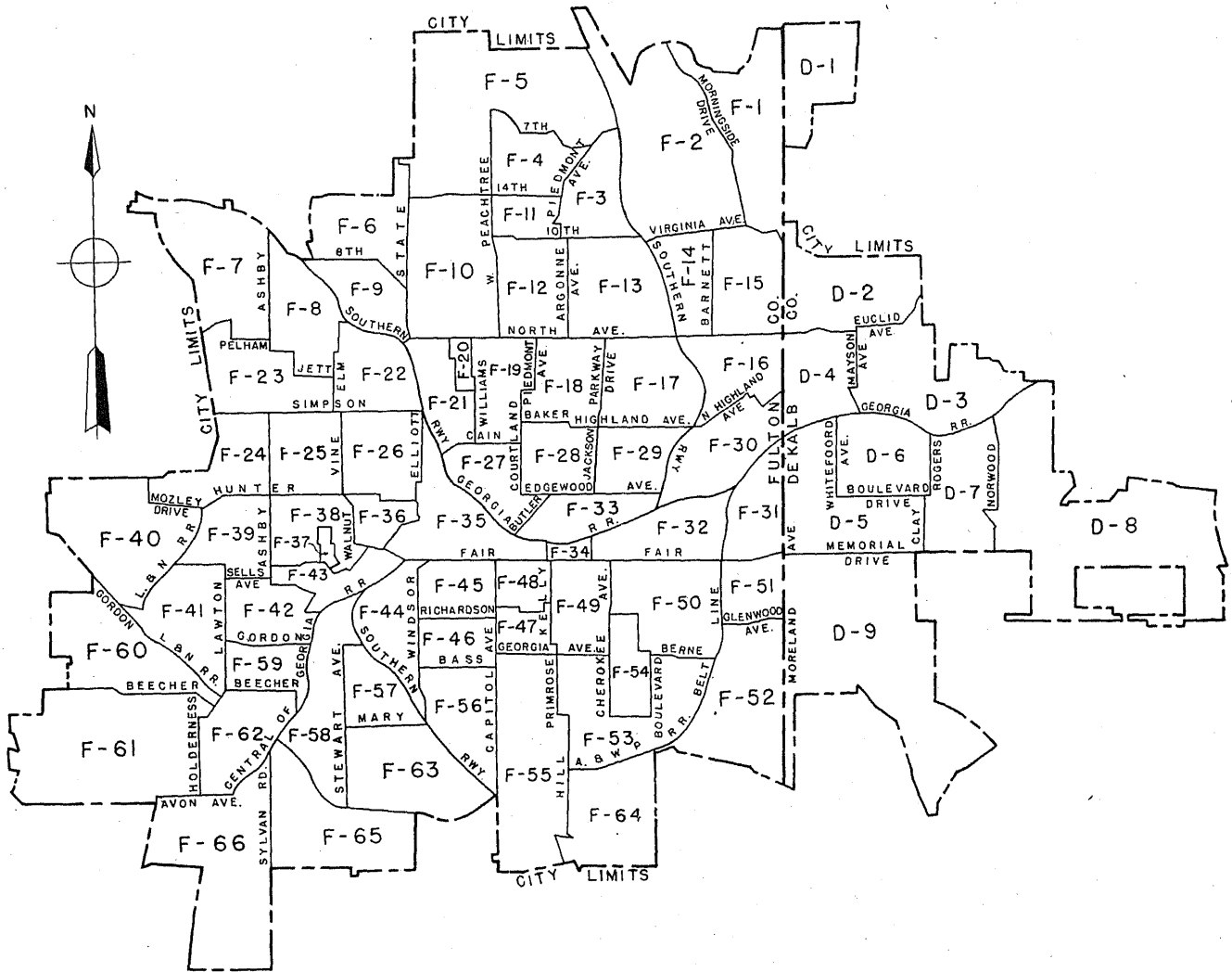

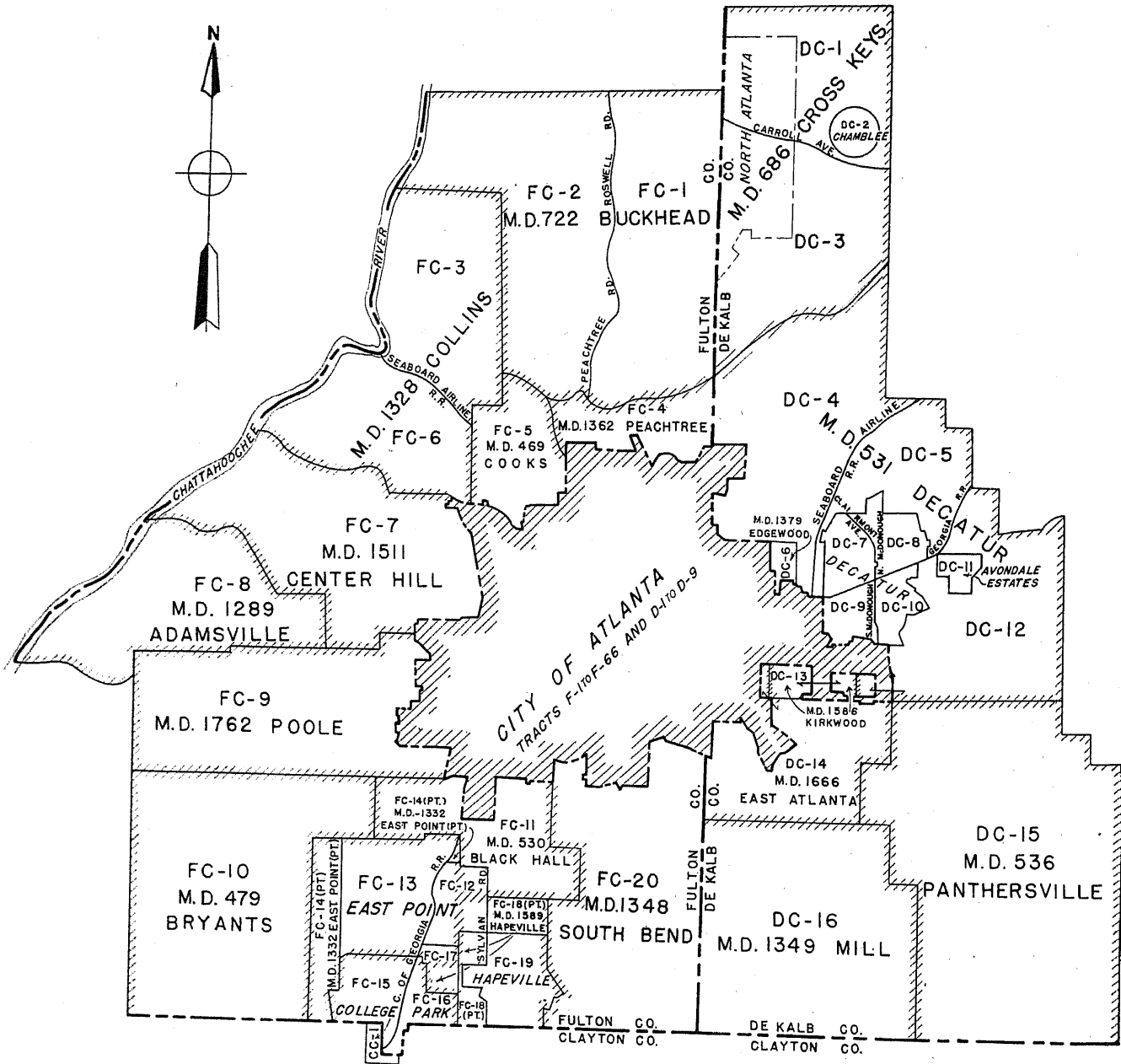

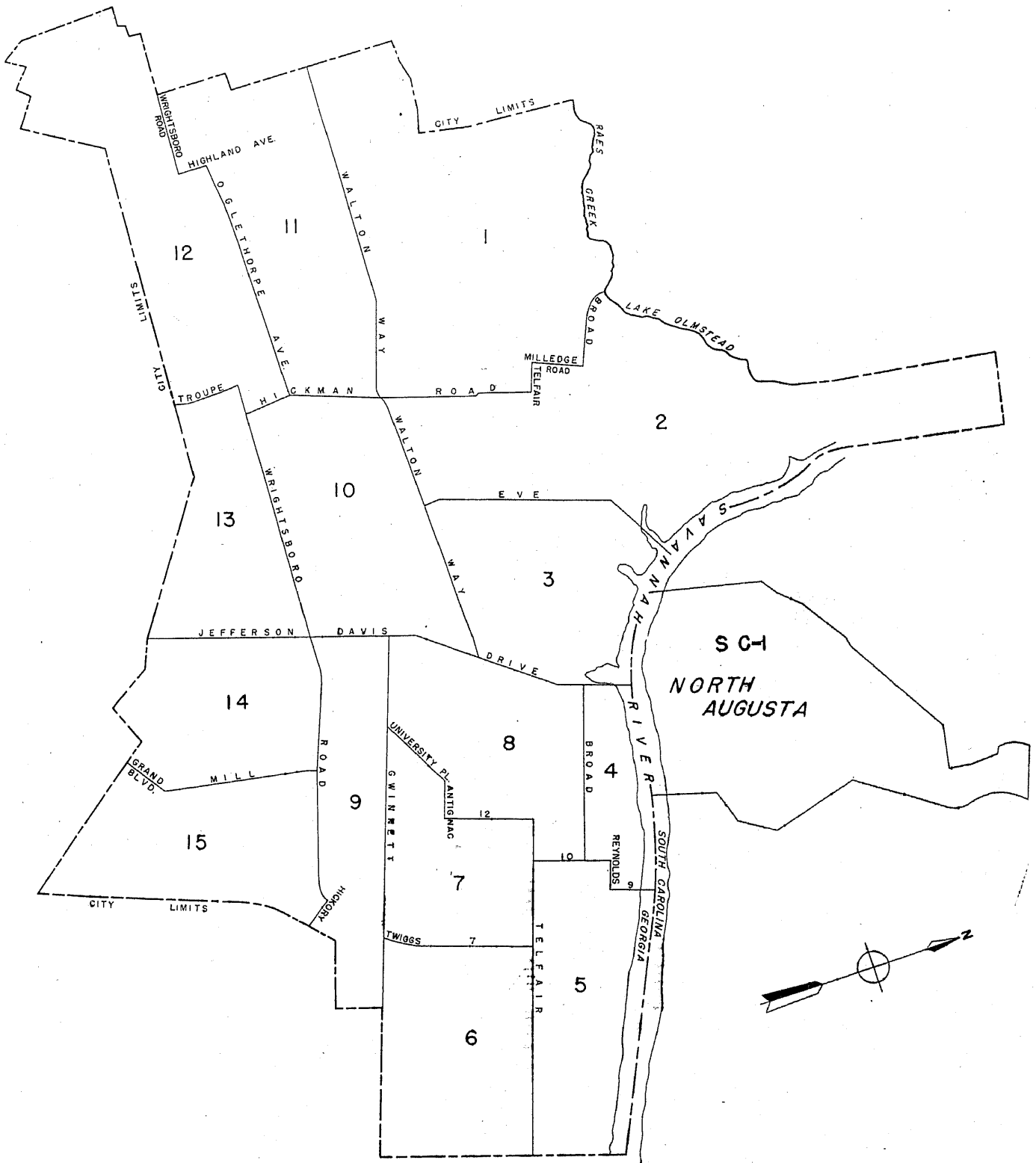

Part 2.—Tracts in Clayton, De Kalb, and Fulton Counties



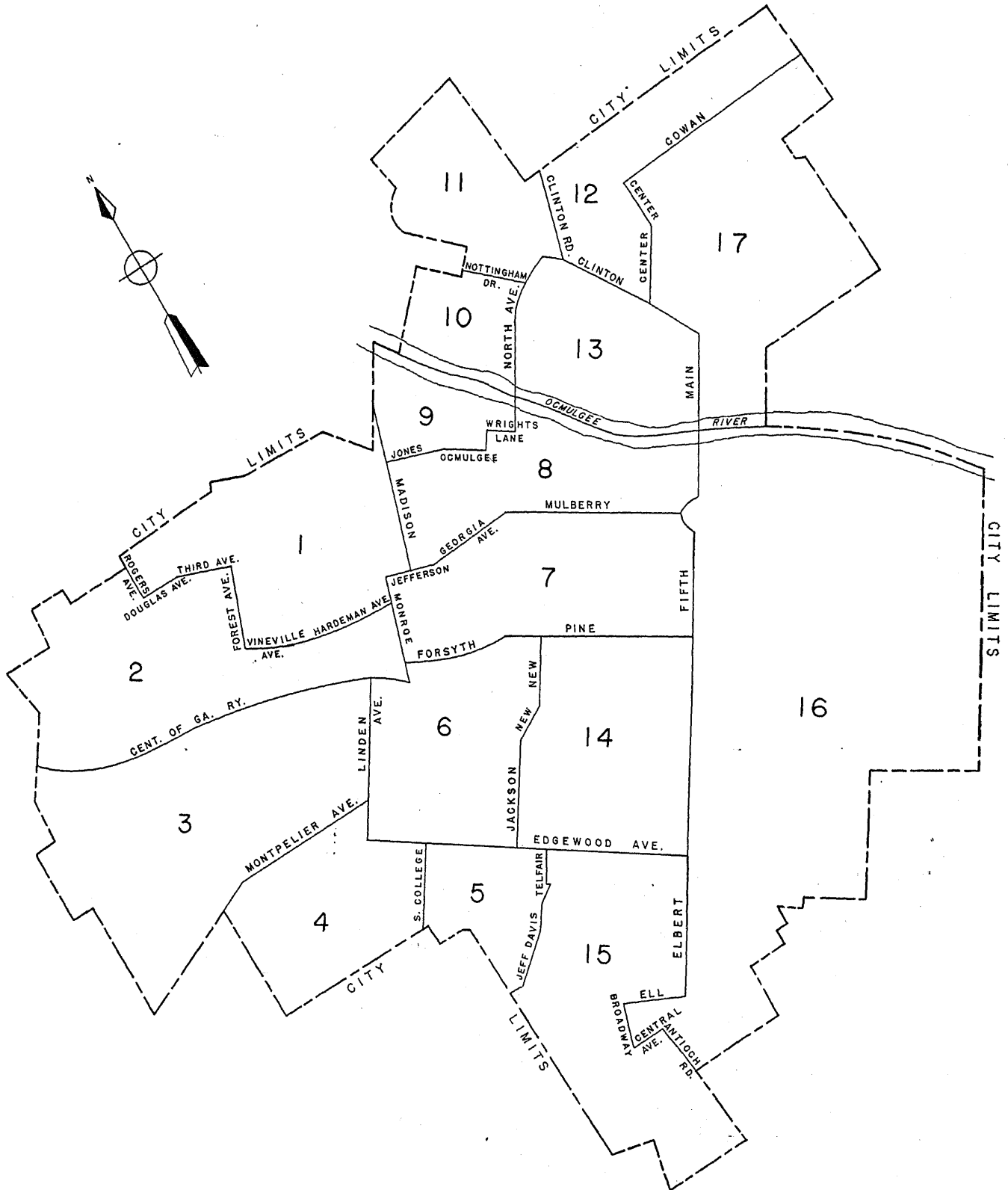
AUGUSTA AND ADJACENT AREA BY CENSUS TRACTS

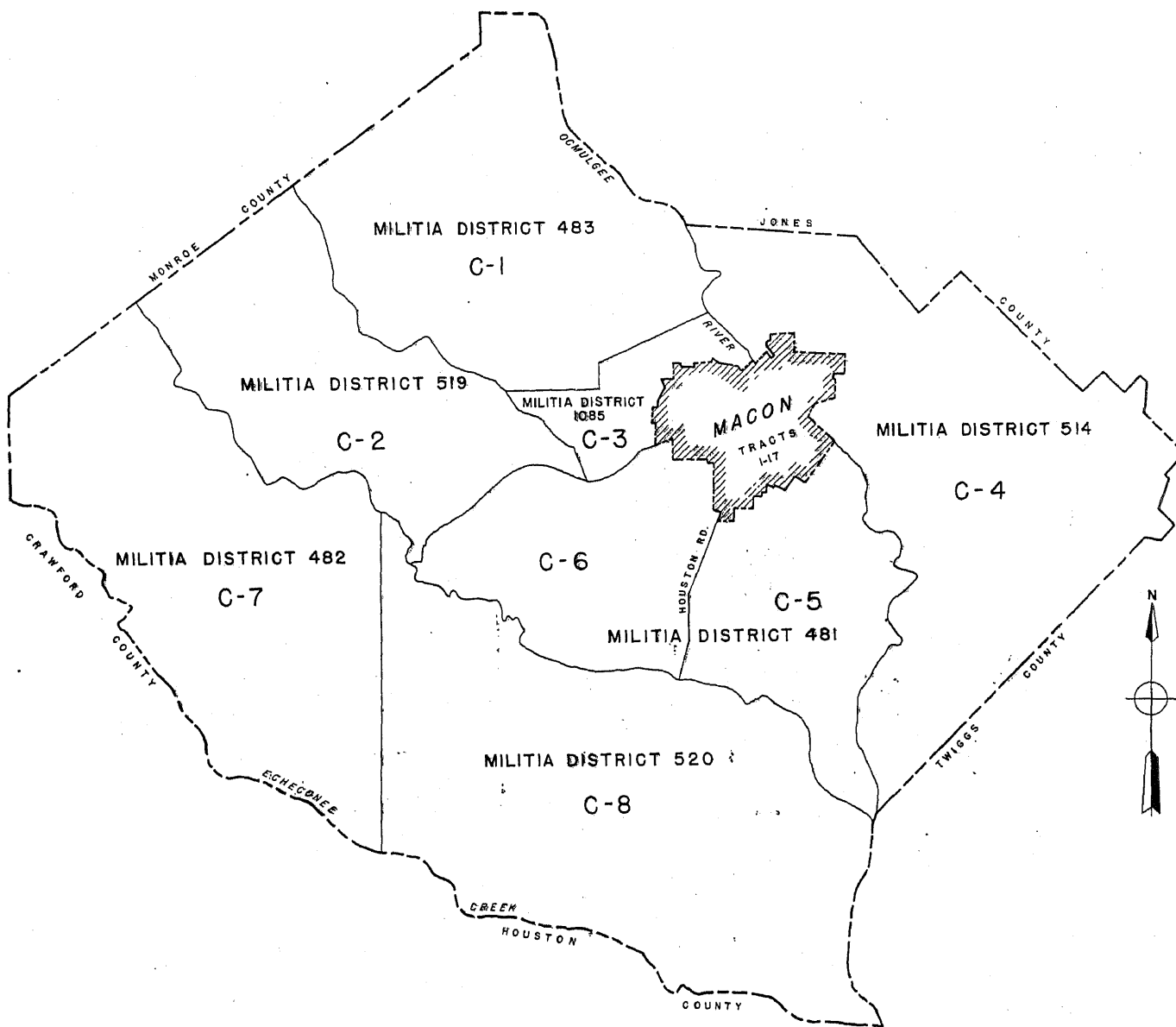
MACON AND ADJACENT AREA BY CENSUS TRACTS

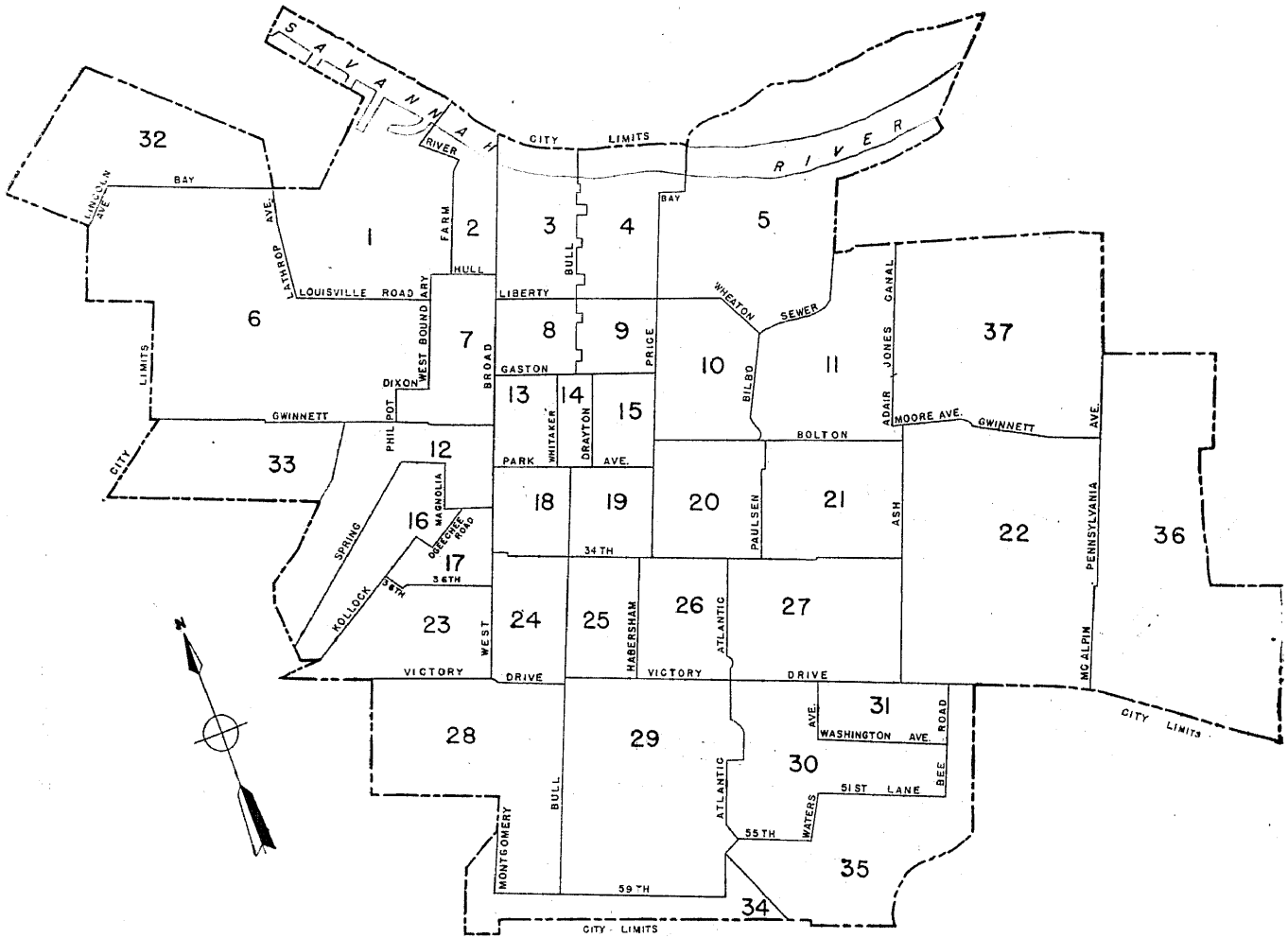

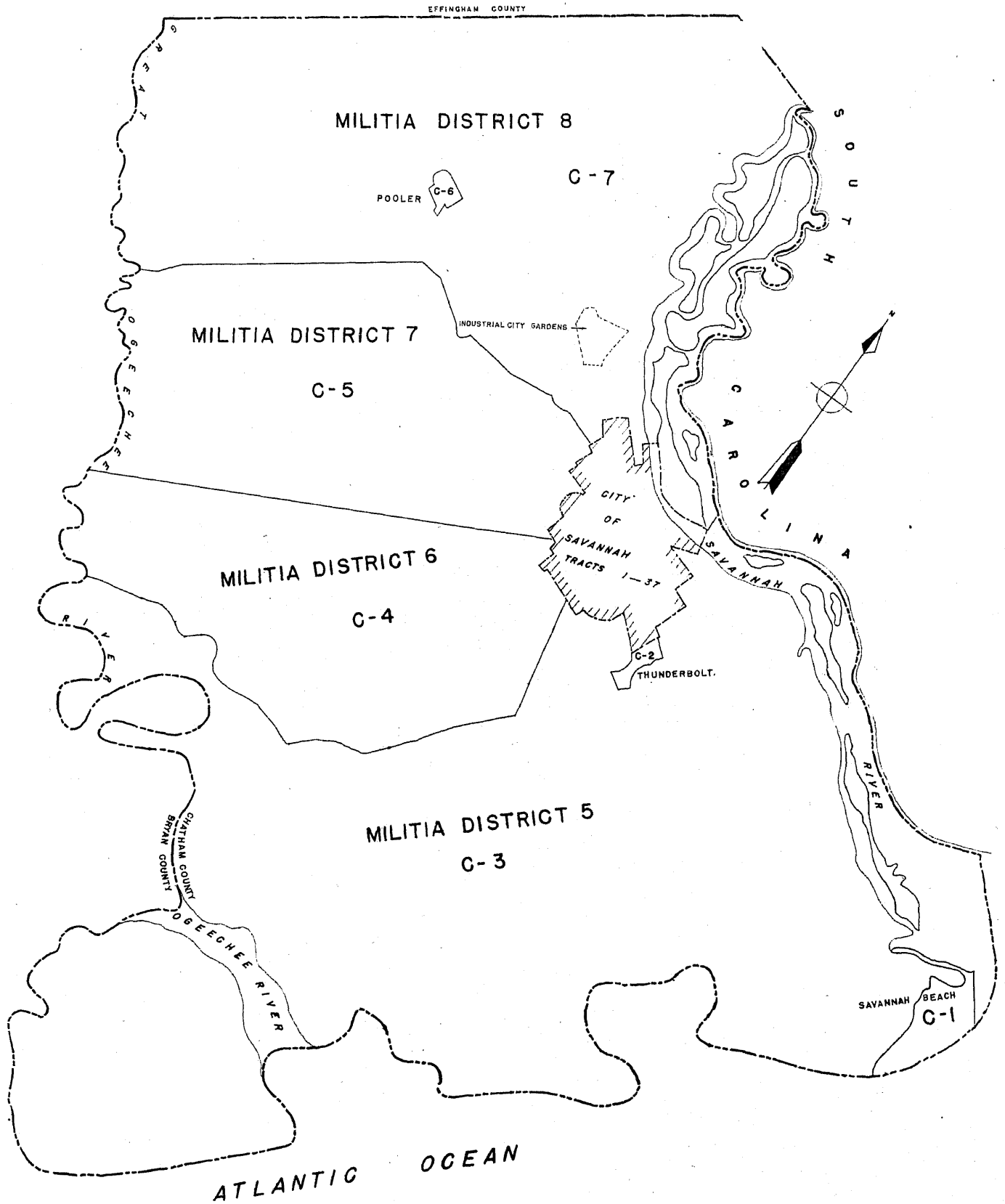
SAVANNAH AND ADJACENT AREA BY CENSUS TRACTS

Part 1.—Tracts in Savannah city

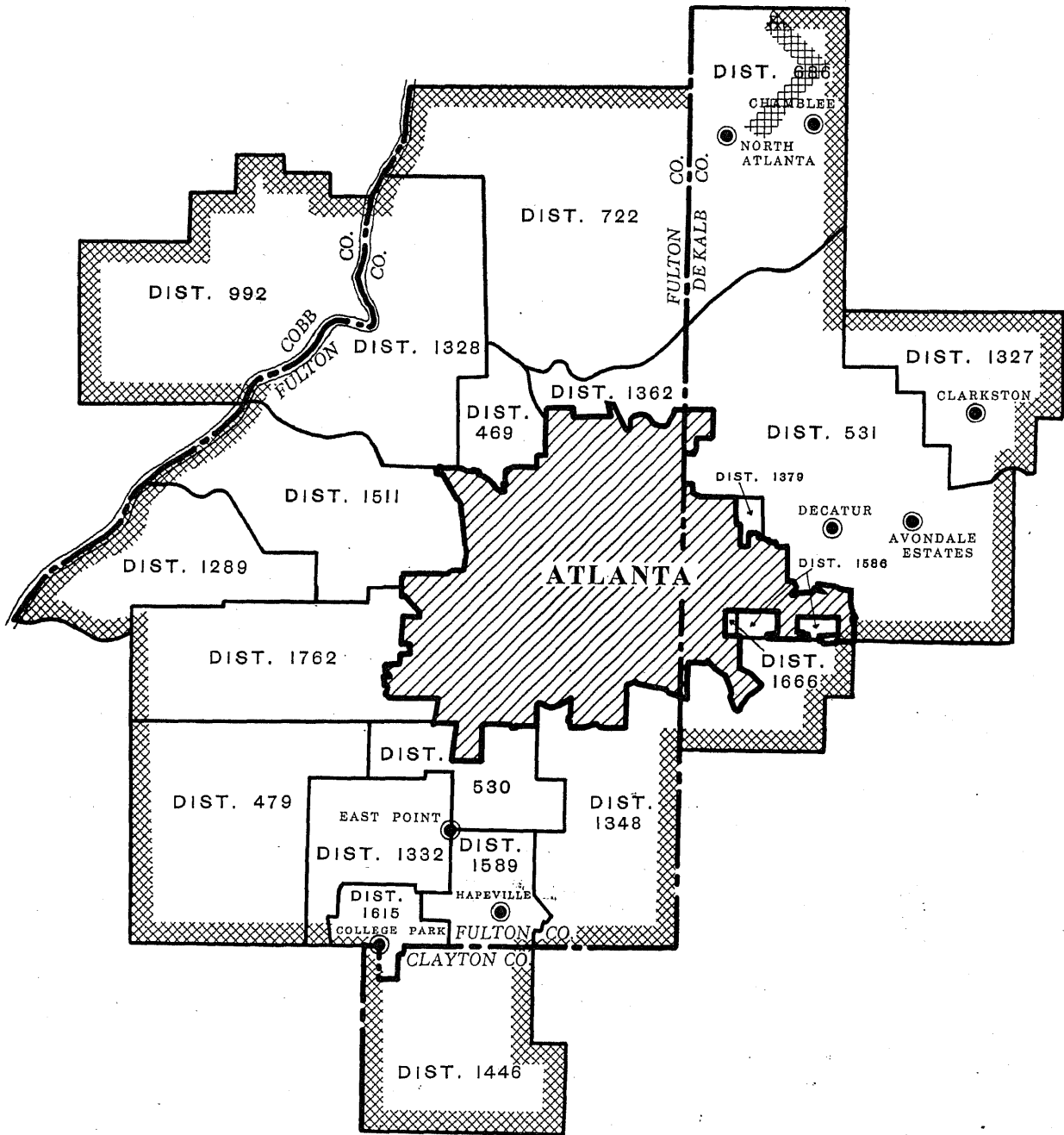

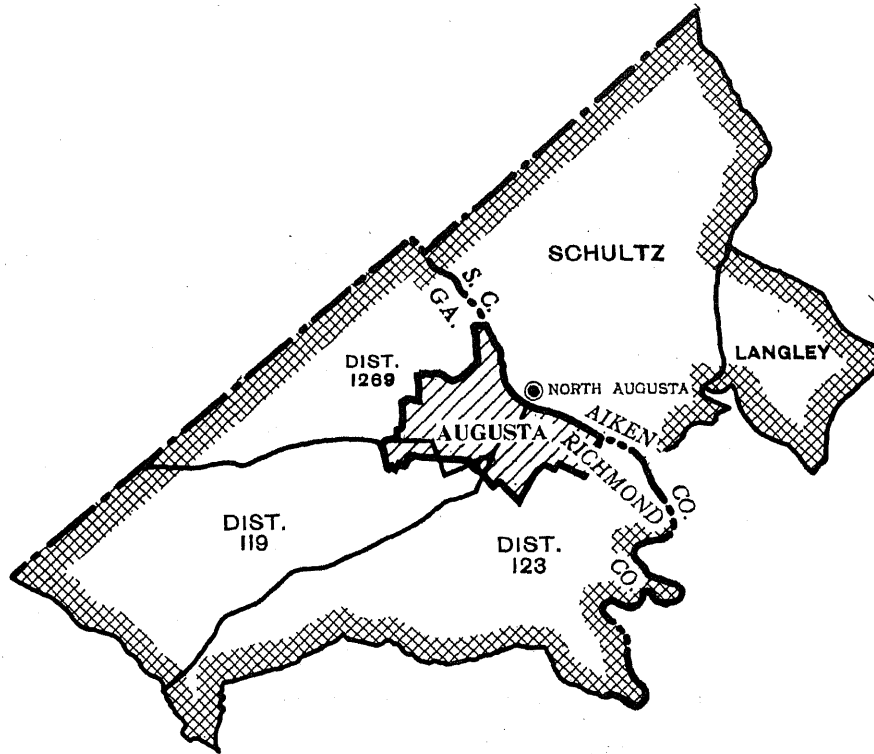

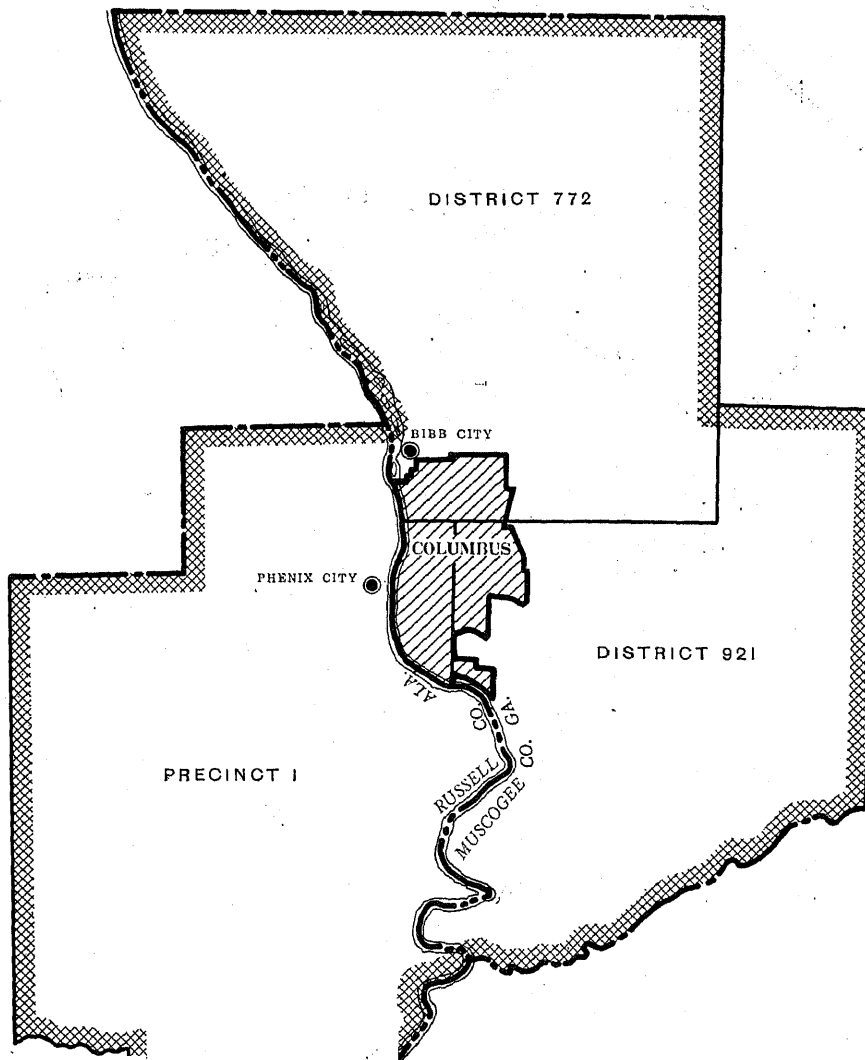
ATLANTA METROPOLITAN DISTRICT

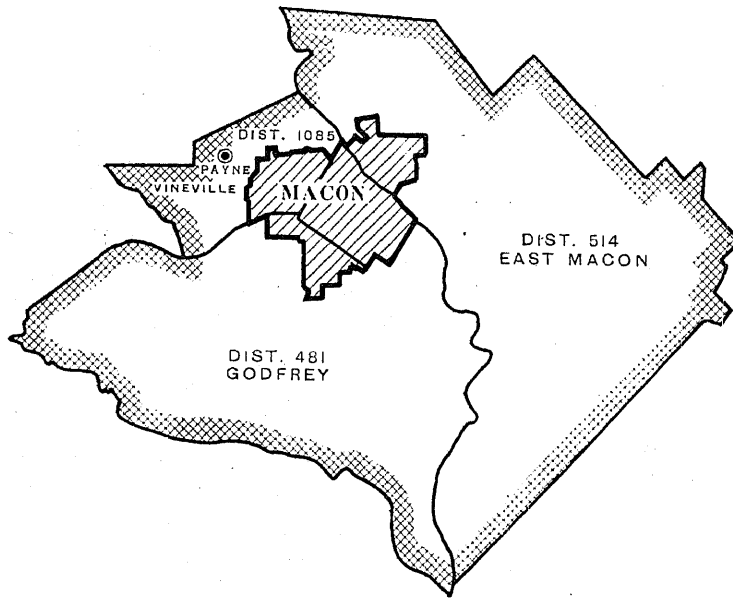

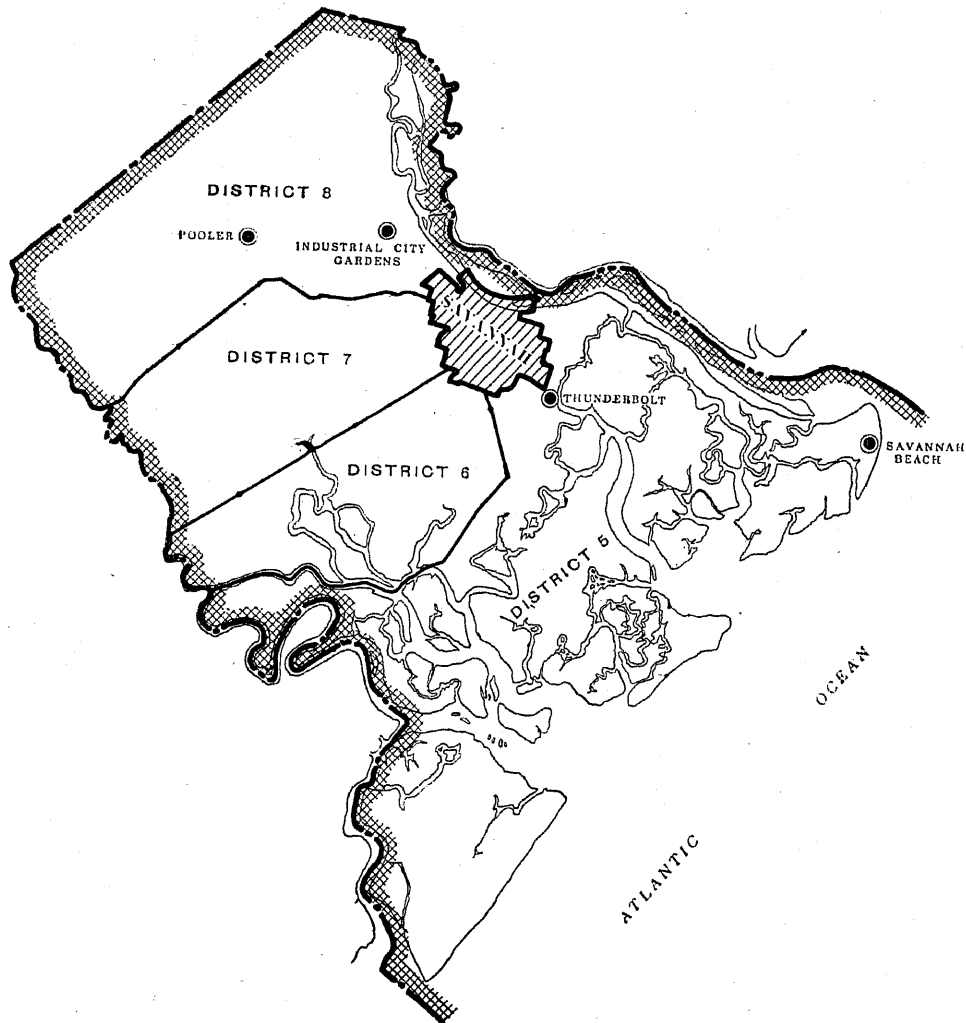

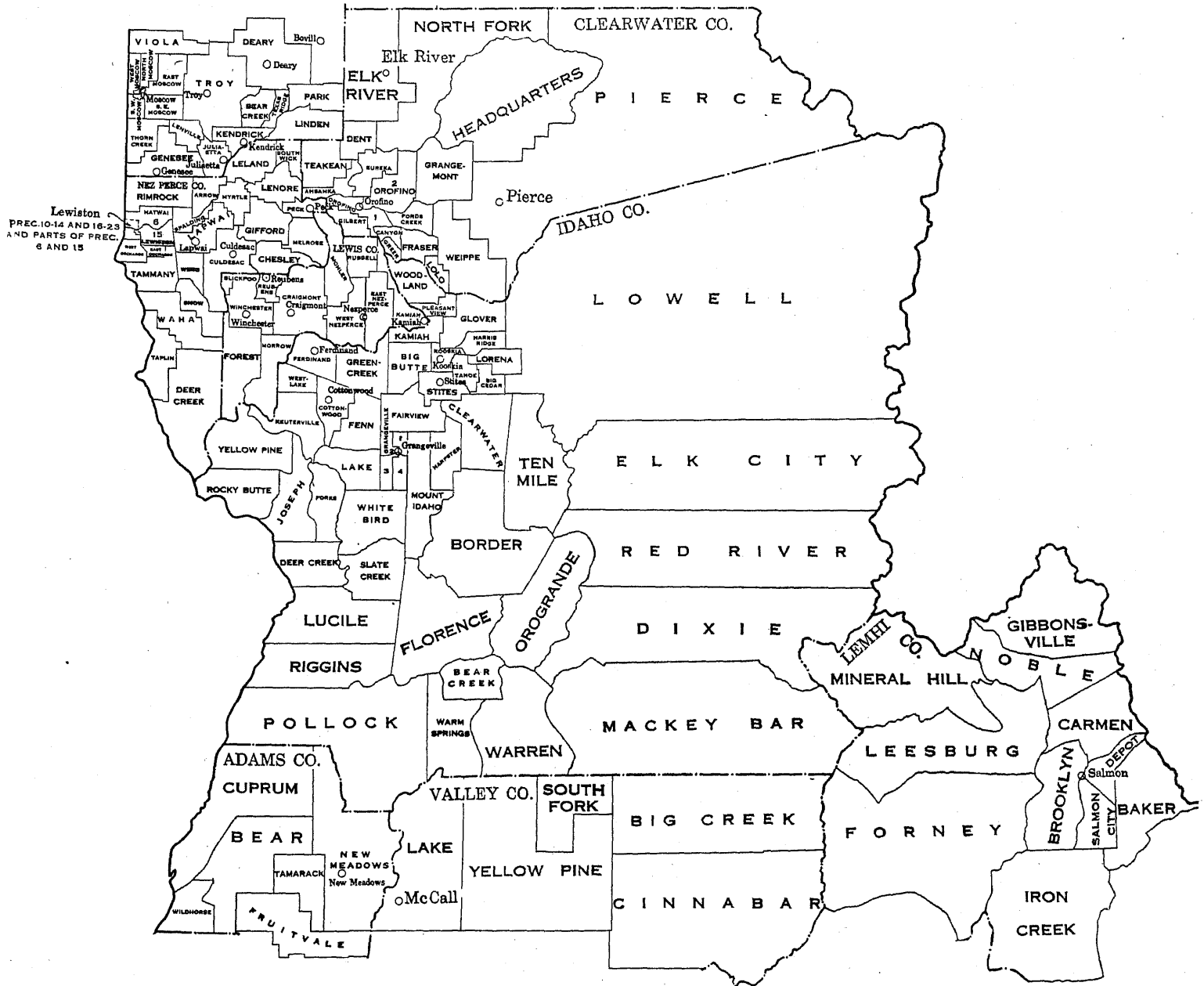

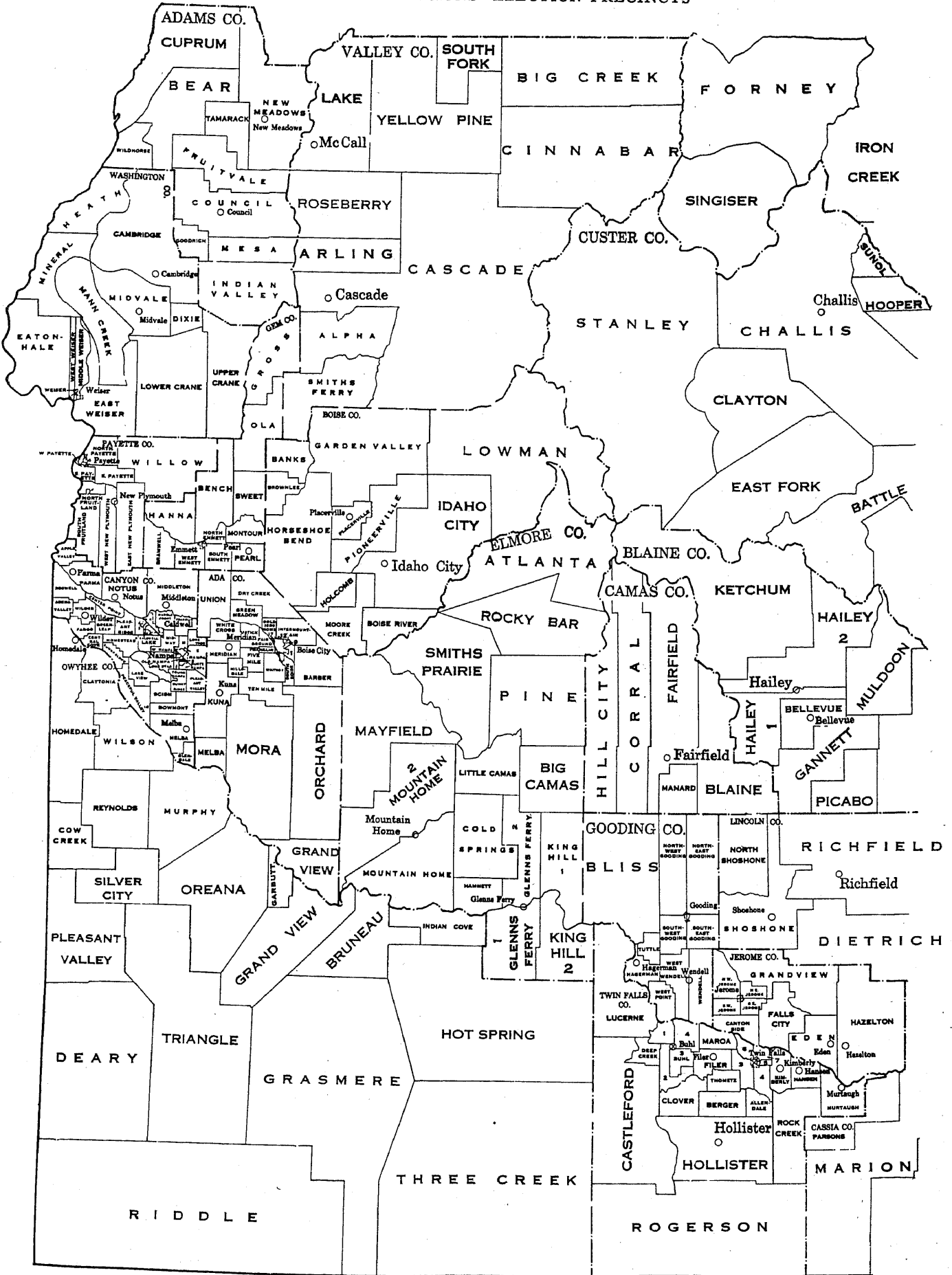
IDAHO—SECTION II, CENTRAL PART

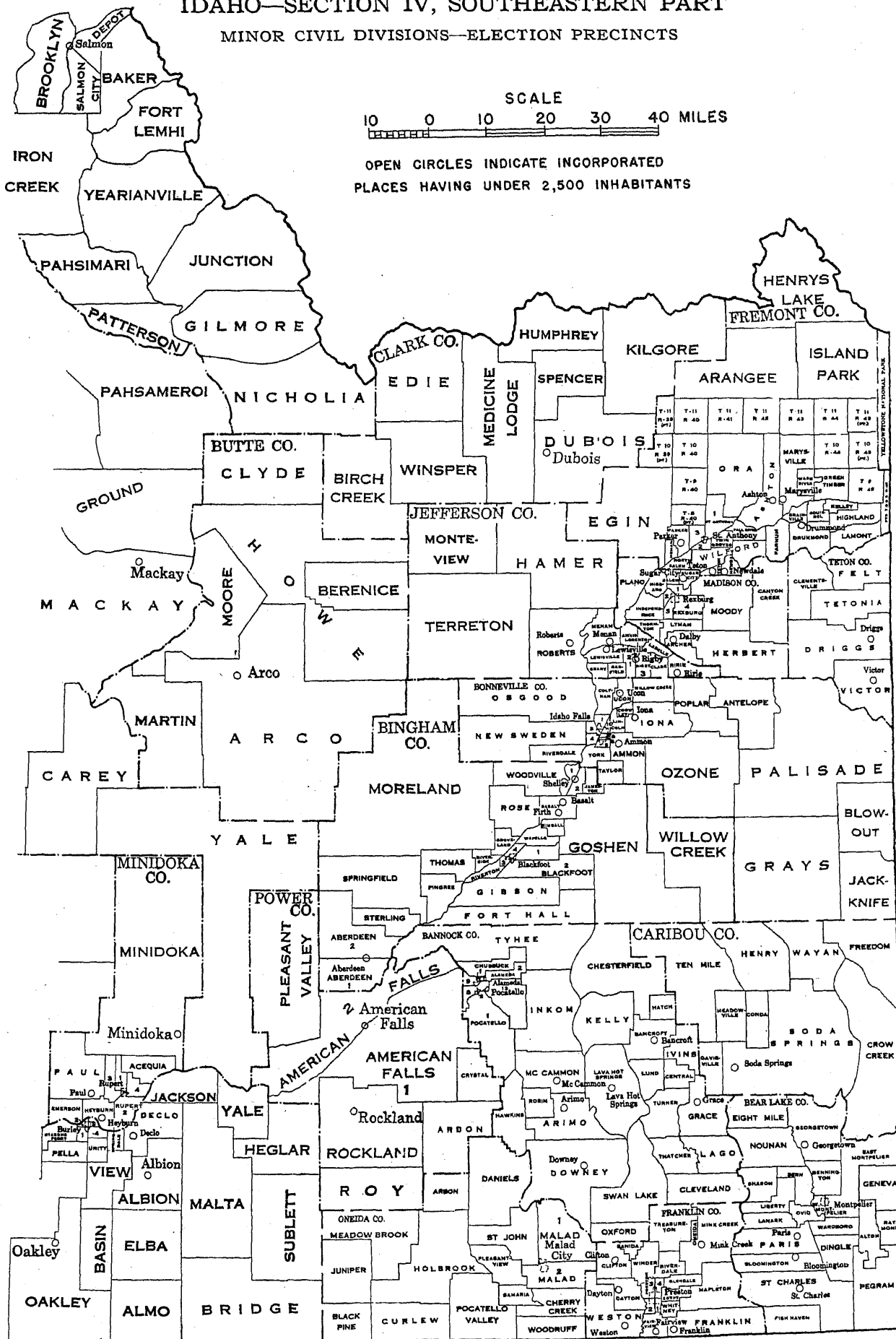


IDAHO—SECTION III, SOUTHWESTERN PART

Population of the State.—Idaho was organized as a Territory in 1863, and was admitted to the Union as the forty-third State in 1890. Its population on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 524,873, which represents an increase of 79,841, or 17.9 percent, as compared with the population on April 1, 1930. The total land area of the State, as shown in table 3, is 82,808 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1940 was 6.3, as compared with 5.4 in 1930.

Table 1 shows the population of Idaho from 1870, the year in which the Territory of Idaho was first separately enumerated, to 1940, together with the increase during each decade. The urban and rural

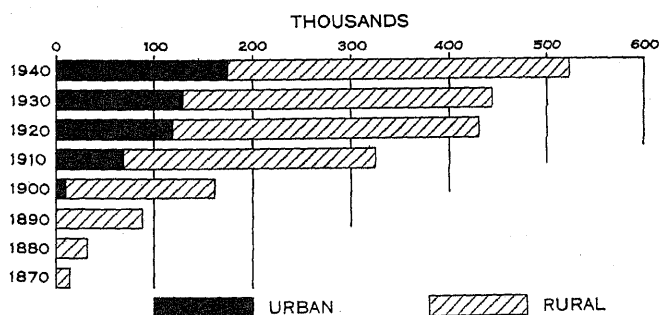
population of the State at each census is presented in this table and is also shown graphically in the accompanying chart. The urban population of Idaho consists of those persons living in incorporated places of 2,500 or more, the remainder of the population being classified as rural. The urban and rural areas are not necessarily constant from one census to the next, since new places are added to the urban list from time to time as they attain a population of 2,500 or more; for example, Alameda was classified as urban in 1940 for the first time. Places are likewise taken off the urban list when, through decline in population, they fall below this limit.

Geographic subdivisions.—In tables 2 to 5 the population of Idaho is shown by counties, election precincts or other minor civil divisions, cities, towns, and villages, with some comparative figures from previous censuses. Table 6 gives the population of cities by wards.

Cities of 10,000 or more.—There are seven cities in the State that had a population of 10,000 or more in 1940. Table 2 shows the population of these cities at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase or decrease during each decade. Boise City, the capital and largest city, had a population in 1940 of 26,130.

Minor civil divisions.—To the primary political divisions into which the counties are subdivided the Census Bureau applies the general term "minor civil divisions." The primary divisions of the counties in Idaho are called election precincts, except that in one county (Fremont) there are also a few unorganized townships. The incorporated cities, towns, and villages form secondary subdivisions of the minor civil divisions in which they are located. There are 39 cities, 111 villages, and 1 town. Ordinarily, each of the smaller secondary divisions, or incorporated places, forms a part of some election precinct or precincts;

some of the larger cities include a considerable number of entire precincts and parts of others.

Table 4 shows the population of each county by election precincts (or townships), cities, towns, and villages for the last three censuses. The population of the cities, towns, and villages is shown in *italics* under the population of the election precincts in which the places are respectively located. Where a city or incorporated village is located in two or more precincts, the total population of the place is given in connection with the presentation for the first precinct.

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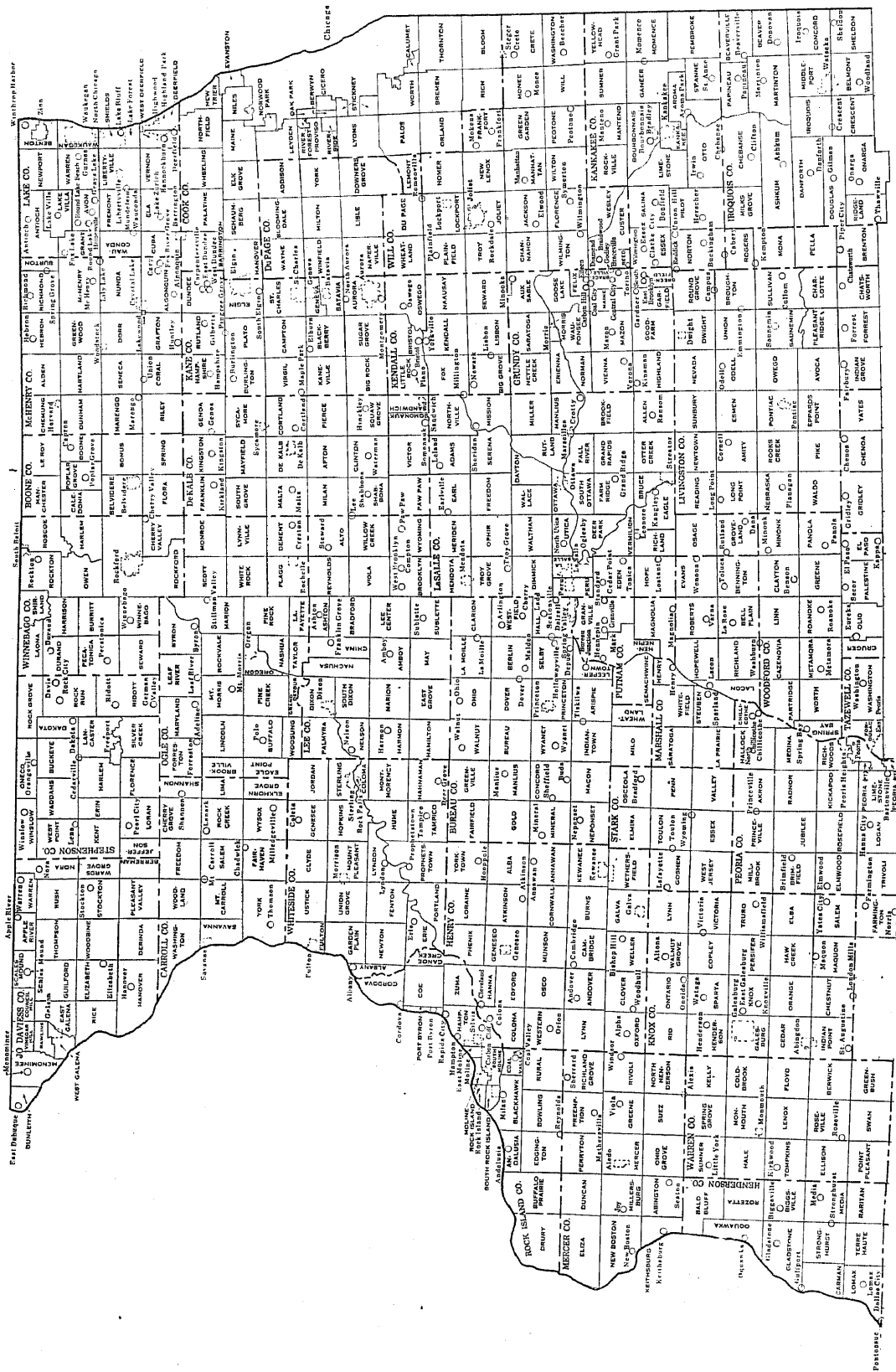
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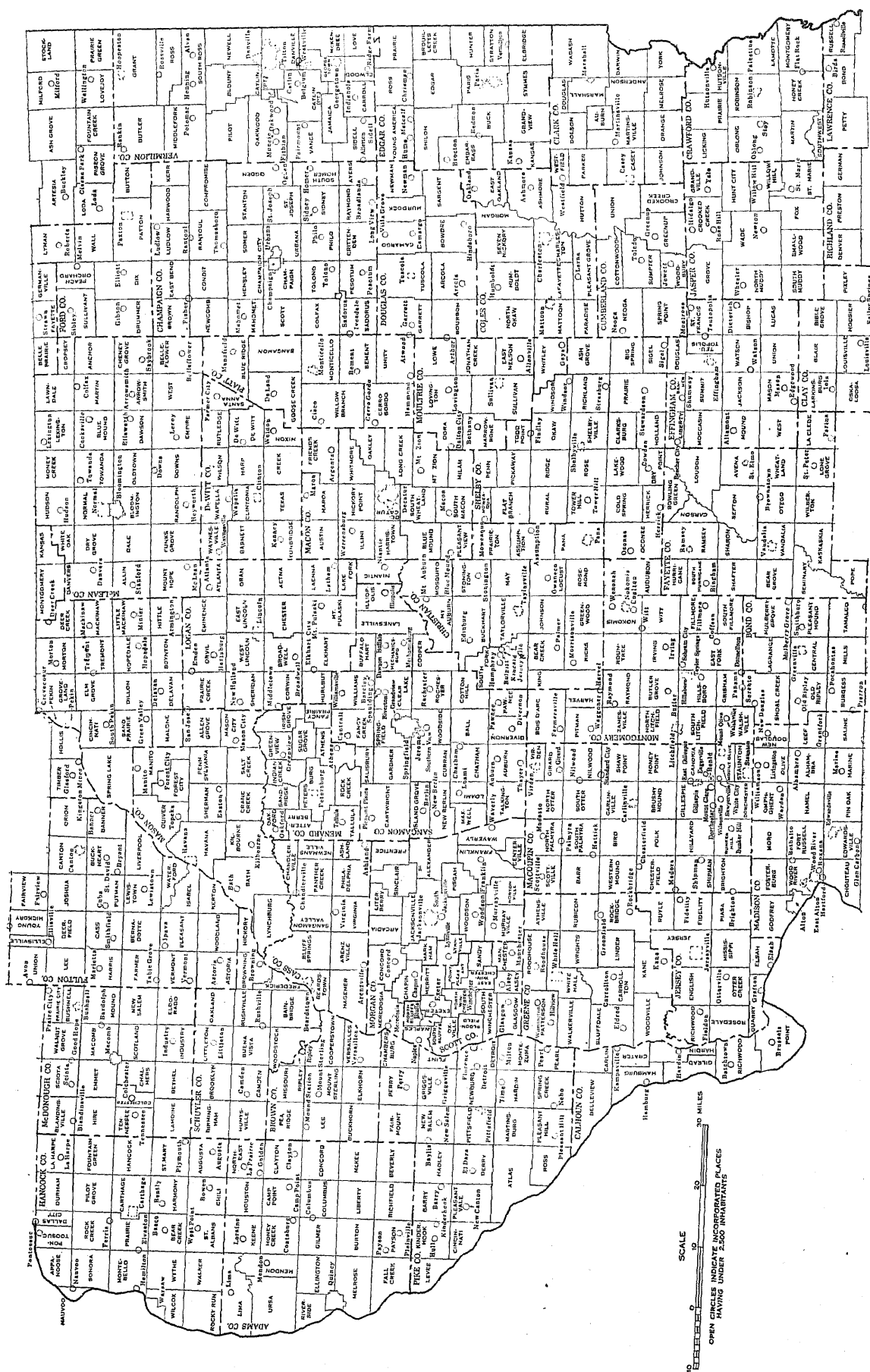
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ILLINOIS—NORTHERN AND CENTRAL PARTS
MINOR CIVIL DIVISIONS—TOWNSHIPS AND ELECTION PRECINCTS

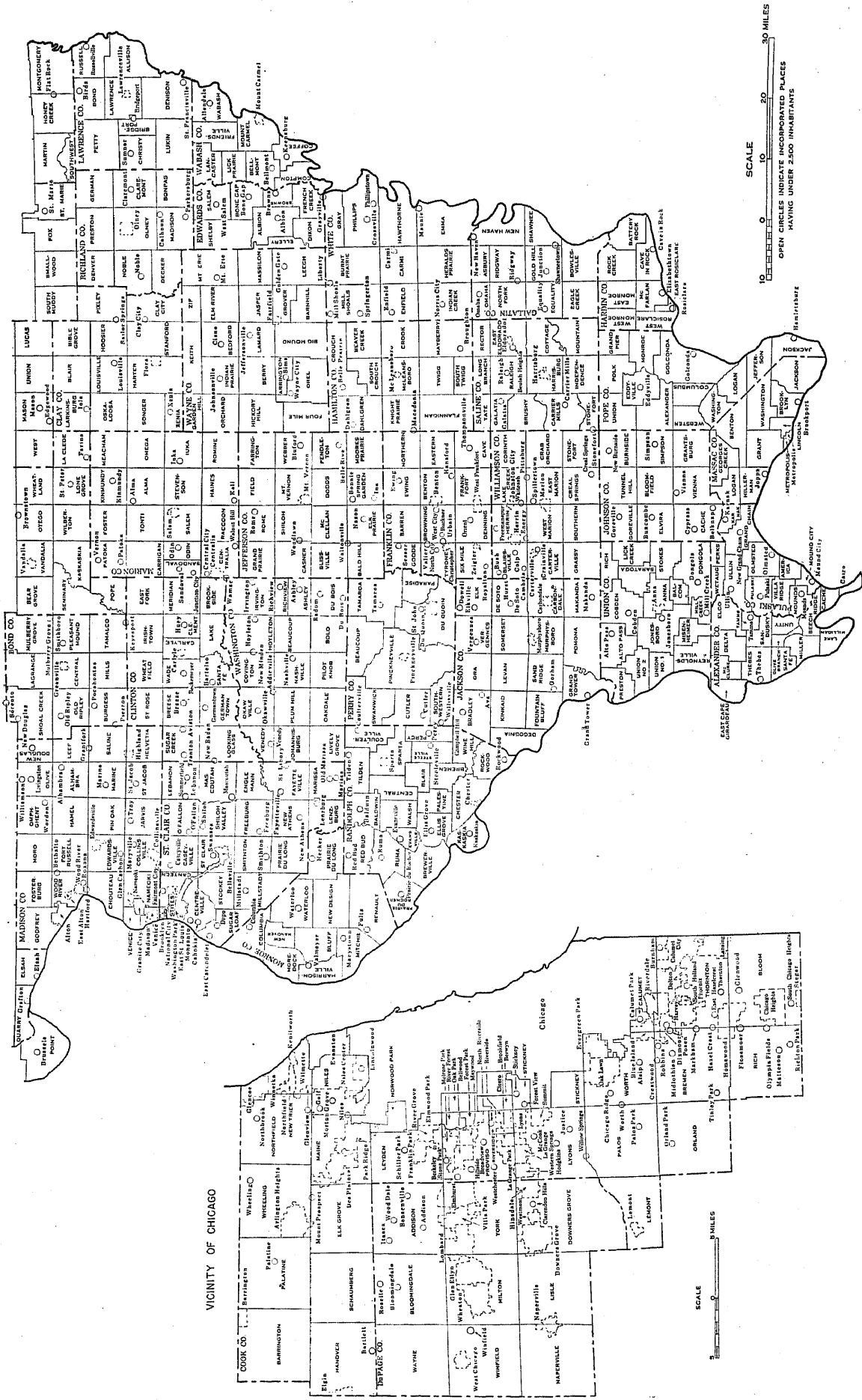

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS

Population of the State.—Illinois, organized as a Territory in 1809 from the western part of Indiana Territory, comprised at that time all of the present State of Illinois, almost all of Wisconsin, and parts of Michigan and Minnesota. In 1818 that portion of the Territory lying within the present boundaries of Illinois was admitted to the Union as the twenty-first State. Its population on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 7,897,241, which represents an increase of 266,587, or 3.5 percent, as compared with the population on April 1, 1930. The total land area of the State, as shown in table 3, is 55,947 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1940 was 141.2, as compared with 136.4 in 1930.

Table 1 shows the population of Illinois from 1810, the year in which the Territory of Illinois was first

separately enumerated, to 1940, together with the increase during each decade. The urban and rural population of the State at each census is presented in this table and is also shown graphically in the accompanying chart. The urban population of Illinois consists of those persons living in incorporated places of 2,500 or more, the remainder of the population being classified as rural. The urban and rural areas are not necessarily constant from one census to the next, since new places are added to the urban list from time to time as they attain a population of 2,500 or more. Places are likewise taken off the urban list when, through decline in population, they fall below this limit. For example, Nokomis qualified as urban in 1920 and 1940 but not in 1930.

Metropolitan districts.—Metropolitan districts have been set up for use in the 1940 Census of Population in connection with each city of 50,000 or more, two or more such cities sometimes being in one district. The general plan is to include in the district, in addition to the central city or cities, all adjacent and contiguous minor civil divisions or incorporated places having a population of 150 or more per square mile. In some metropolitan districts a few less densely populated contiguous divisions are included on the basis of special qualifications. The metropolitan district is thus not a political unit but rather an area including all the thickly settled territory in and around a city or group of cities. It tends to be a more or less integrated area with common economic, social, and, often, administrative interests. The following tables give data for the five metropolitan districts with the main central city in Illinois. Parts of the Davenport-Rock Island-Moline and the St. Louis districts are also situated in Illinois; data for these districts are presented in the bulletins for Iowa and Missouri, respectively.

Table 7 shows the population of the Chicago metropolitan district and its constituent political units in 1940 and 1930, together with the increase or decrease during the decade. Like several others, this district occupies territory in more than one State. In 1940 the Chicago metropolitan district had 4,499,126 inhabitants, whereas in 1930 the district as then constituted had a population of 4,364,755. Lisle township and that part of Naperville township in Naperville city, Du Page County, Ill., and that part of Waukegan township, Lake County, Ill., outside Waukegan and North Chicago cities were included in the metropolitan district in 1940 for the first time. The combined population of these new areas was 12,251 in 1940; the 1930 population is not obtainable.

Census tracts.—Census tracts are small areas into which certain large cities have been subdivided, through cooperation with a local committee in each case, for statistical and local administrative purposes. Through the use of census tract data comparisons may be made from census to census. Tracts are laid out with a view to approximate uniformity in population and with some regard for uniformity in area, and each is designed to include an area fairly homogeneous in population characteristics. In table 8 the 1940 and 1930 population of Chicago is shown by census tracts. This tracted area is shown on the accompanying maps. Part of the tracted area adjacent to St. Louis, Mo., is situated in Illinois; data for this tracted area are presented in the bulletin for Missouri.

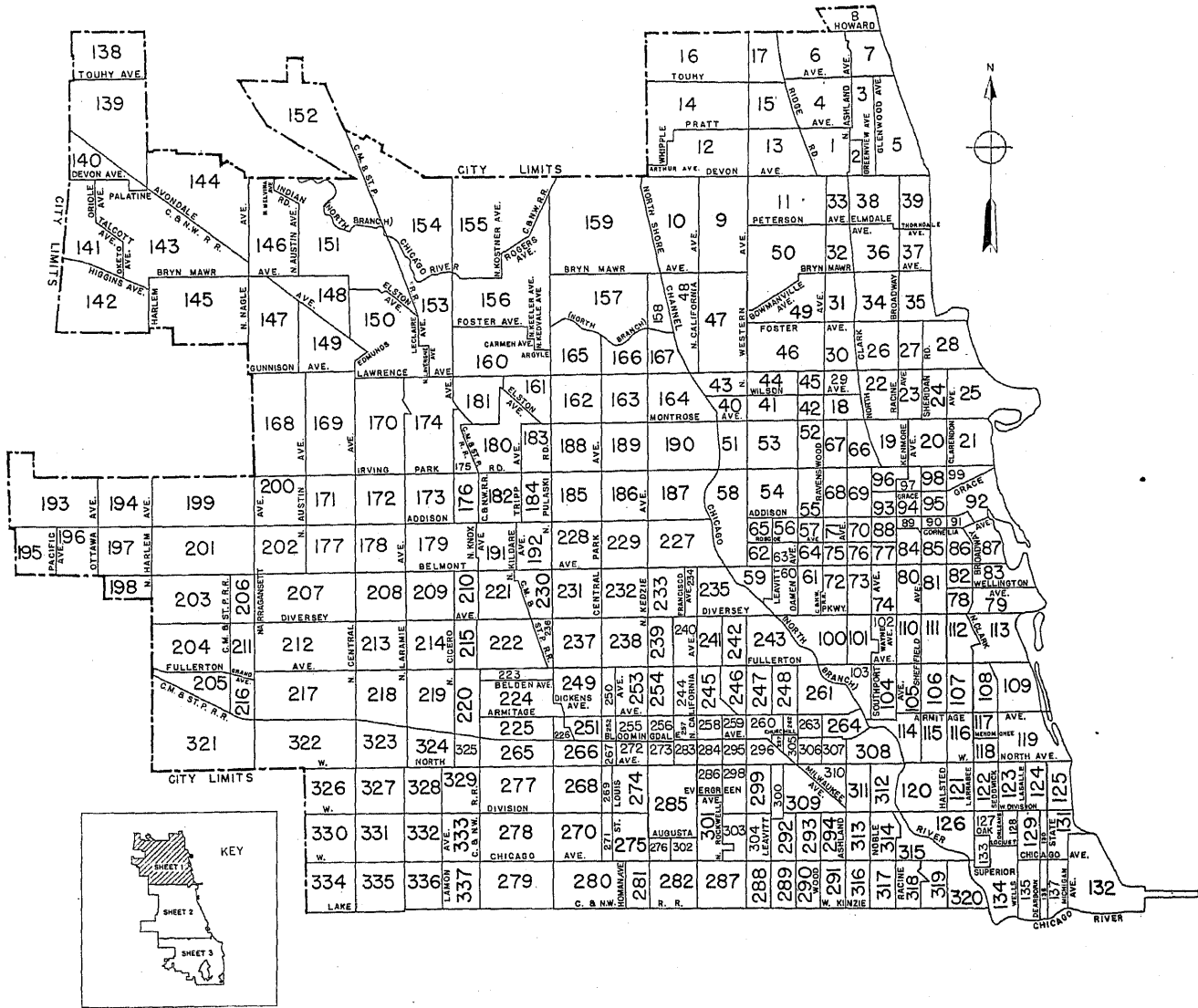

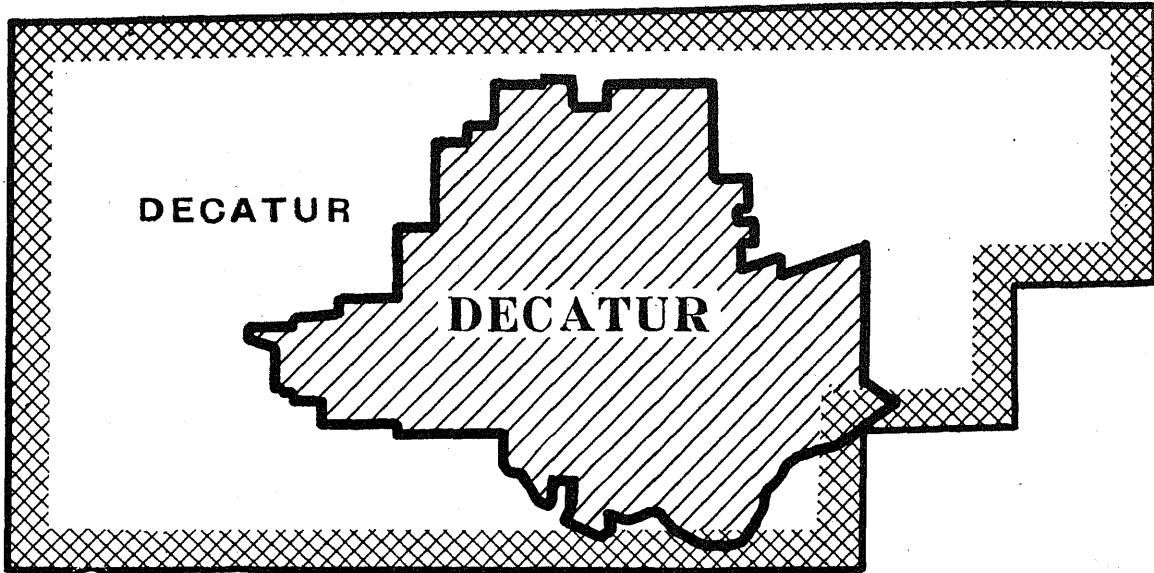

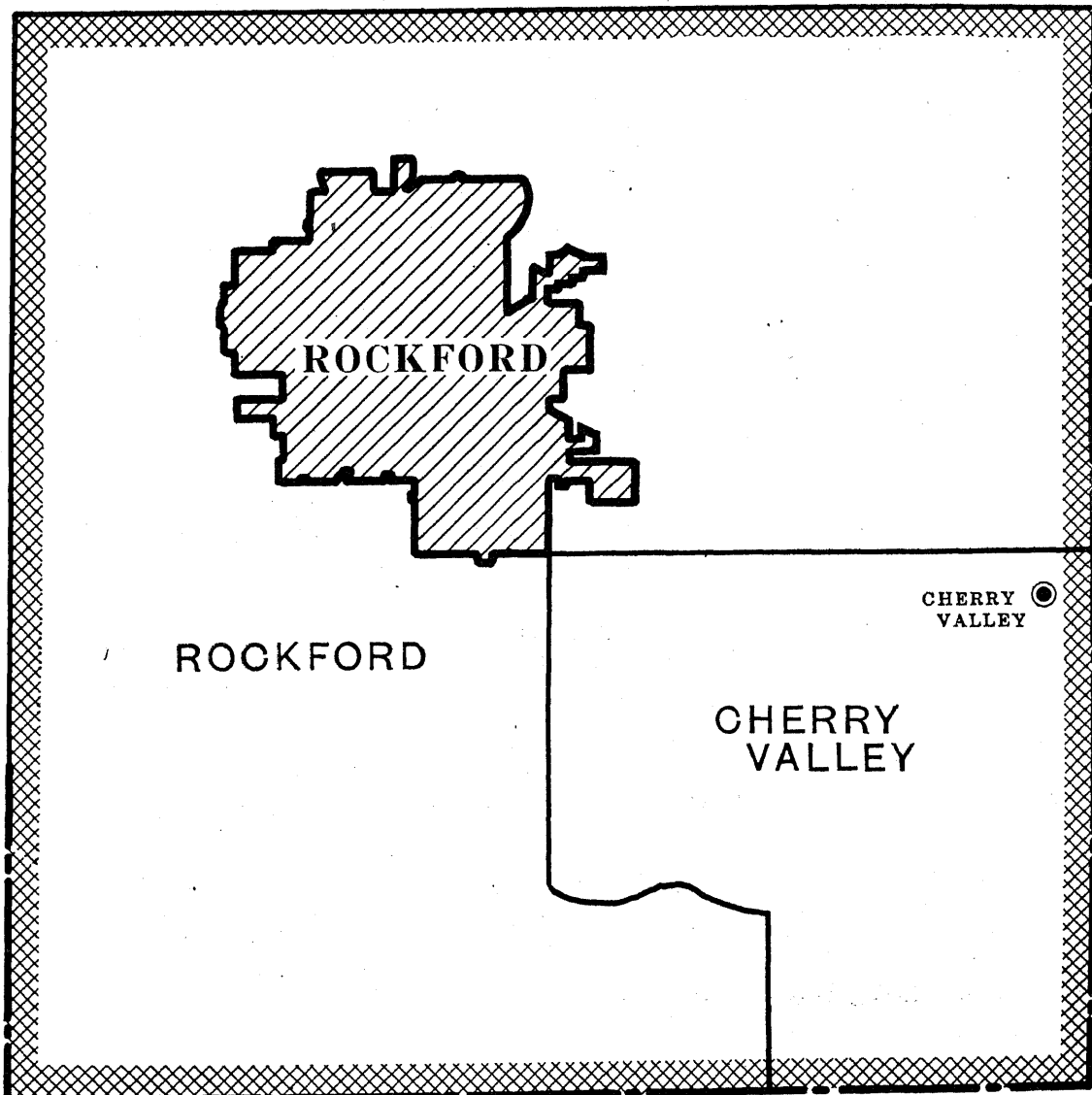
CHICAGO BY CENSUS TRACTS (Part 1)



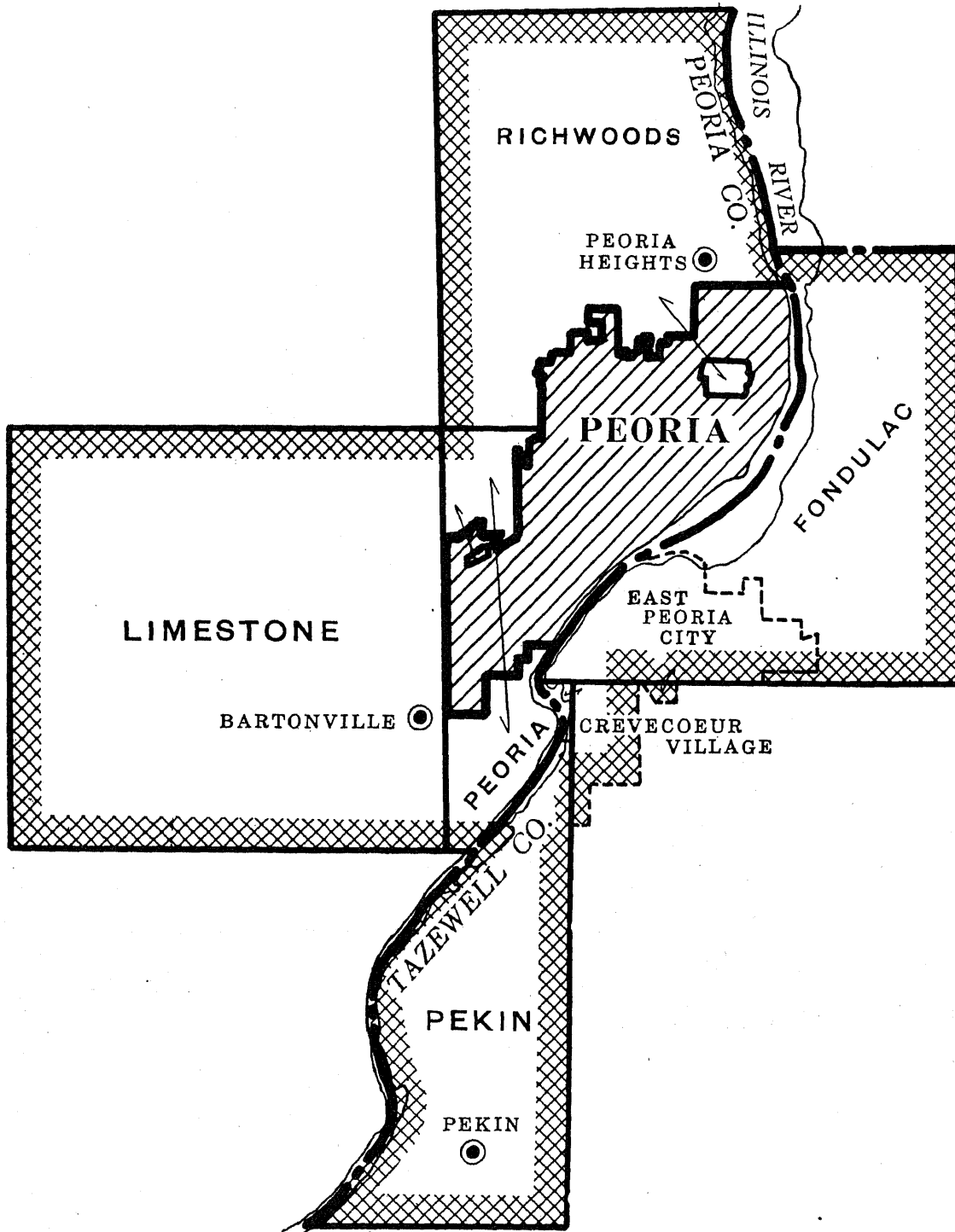
DECATUR METROPOLITAN DISTRICT



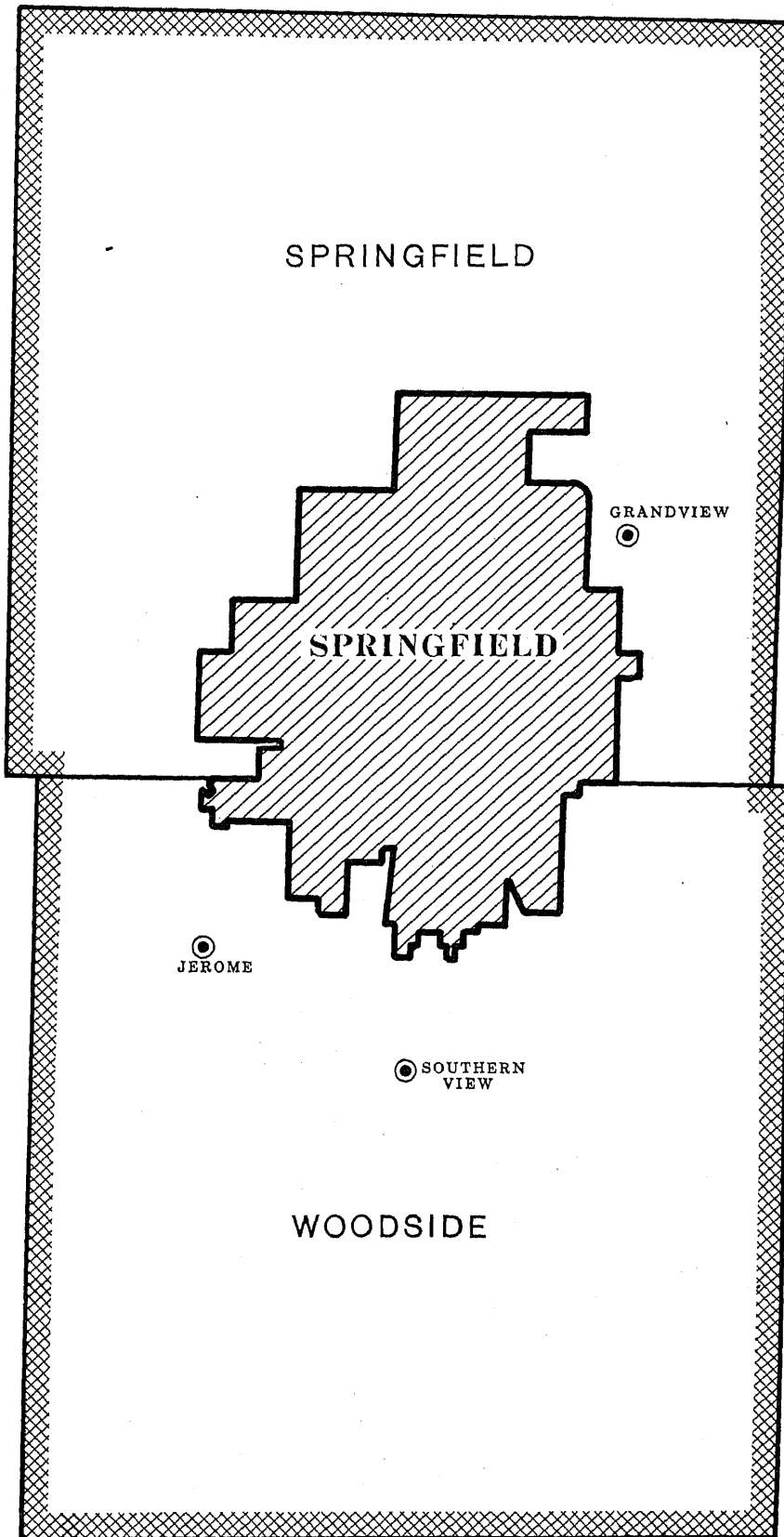

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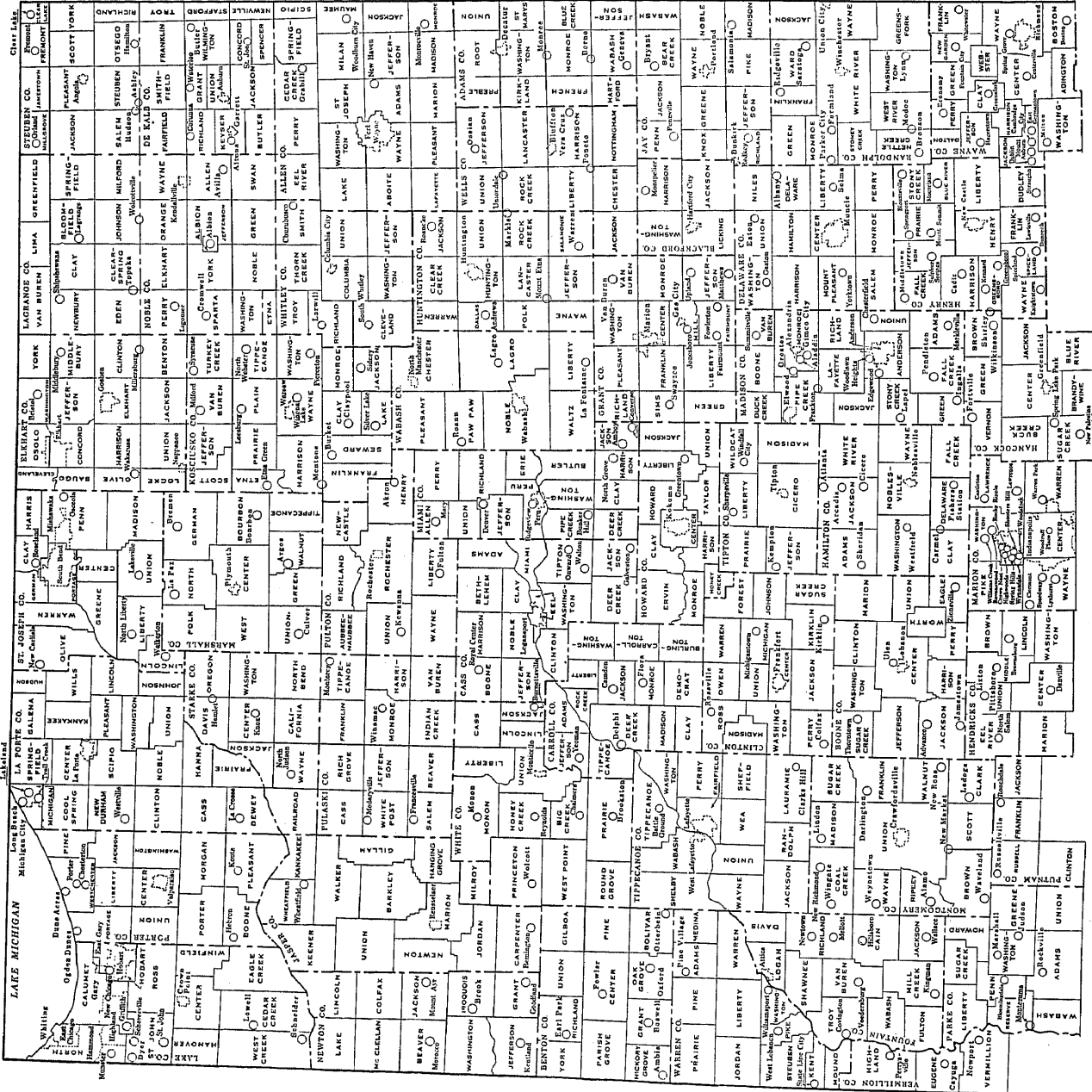
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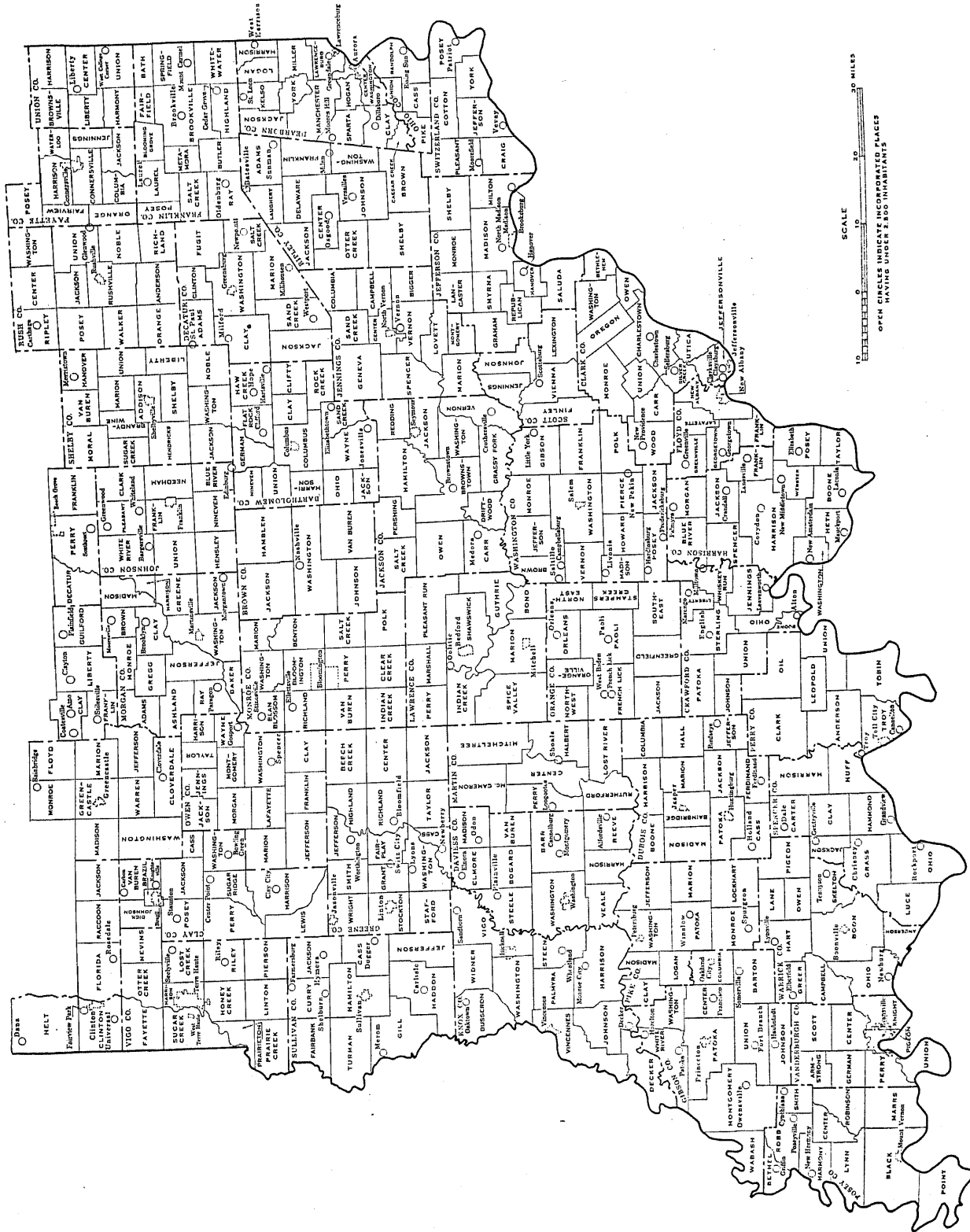

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS

Population of the State.—The Territory of Indiana was organized from part of the Northwest Territory in 1800, at which time it comprised nearly all of the present State of Indiana, together with the area now constituting Illinois, Wisconsin, and parts of Michigan and Minnesota. In 1802 an area now constituting almost all of the remainder of Michigan was added, and in 1802 and 1803 minor revisions of the eastern boundary took place. The area of the Territory was greatly reduced by the organization of the Michigan Territory in 1805 and the Illinois Territory in 1809. In 1816, with the addition of a small strip of land along the northern boundary and the separation of an area in the Upper Peninsula, Indiana assumed its present limits and was admitted to the Union as the nineteenth State.

The population of Indiana on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 3,427,796, which represents an increase of 189,293, or 5.8 percent, as compared with the population on April 1, 1930. The total land area of

the State, as shown in table 3, is 36,205 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1940 was 94.7, as compared with 89.4 in 1930.

Table 1 shows the population of Indiana from 1800, the year in which the Territory of Indiana was first enumerated, to 1940, together with the increase during each decade. The urban and rural population of the State at each census is presented in this table and is also shown graphically in the accompanying chart. The urban population of Indiana consists of those persons living in incorporated places of 2,500 or more, the remainder of the population being classified as rural. The urban and rural areas are not necessarily constant from one census to the next, since new places are added to the urban list from time to time as they attain a population of 2,500 or more. Places are likewise taken off the urban list when, through decline in population, they fall below this limit. For example, Monticello qualified as urban in 1920 and 1940 but not in 1930.

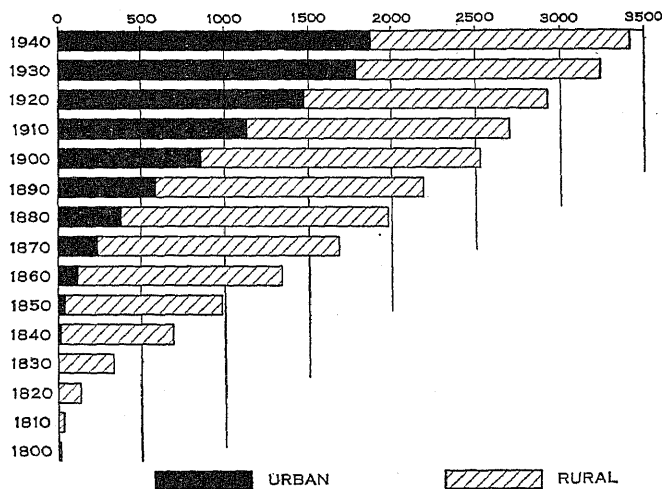

Geographic subdivisions.—In tables 2 to 5 the population of Indiana is shown by counties, townships, cities, and towns, with some comparative figures from previous censuses. Table 6 gives the population of cities by wards. Data for the metropolitan districts are presented in tables 7 to 7-D and for the census tracts of Indianapolis and its adjacent areas in table 8.

Cities of 10,000 or more.—There are 35 cities in the State that had a population of 10,000 or more in 1940. Table 2 shows the population of these cities at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase or decrease during each decade. Indianapolis, the capital and largest city, had a population in 1940 of 386,972.

Minor civil divisions.—To the primary political divisions into which the counties are subdivided the Census Bureau applies the general term "minor civil divisions." The primary divisions of the counties in Indiana are the townships. The incorporated cities and towns form secondary subdivisions of the minor civil divisions in which they are located. There are 99 cities and 430 towns. Ordinarily, each of these secondary divisions forms a part of some township (or townships).

Table 4 shows the population of each county by

townships, cities, and towns for the last three censuses. The population of the cities and towns is shown in *italics* under the population of the primary divisions in which the places are respectively located. Where an incorporated place is located in two or more townships in the same county, the total population of the place is given in connection with the presentation for the first township. Where the place is situated in two or more counties, the total population is given in connection with each county.

Incorporated places.—Table 5 shows the population in 1940 and 1930 of the incorporated places (cities and towns) in Indiana. In this table the places are arranged in alphabetical order, each followed by the

name of the county in which it is located. In table 6 the population of the cities of 5,000 or more that are subdivided into wards is shown by wards.

Metropolitan districts.—Metropolitan districts have been set up for use in the 1940 Census of Population in connection with each city of 50,000 or more, two or more such cities sometimes being in one district. The general plan is to include in the district, in addition to the central city or cities, all adjacent and contiguous minor civil divisions or incorporated places having a population of 150 or more per square mile. In some metropolitan districts, a few less densely populated contiguous divisions are included on the basis of special qualifications. A metropolitan district is thus not a political unit but rather an area including all the thickly settled territory in and around a city or group of cities. It tends to be a more or less integrated area with common economic, social, and, often, administrative interests.

Table 7 shows the population of the Evansville metropolitan district and its constituent political units in 1940 and 1930, together with the increase or decrease during the decade. Like several others, this district occupies territory in more than one State. In 1940 the Evansville metropolitan district had 141,614 inhabitants, whereas in 1930 the district had a population of 123,130. The metropolitan district in 1940 consisted of exactly the same area as in 1930.

Parts of the Chicago, Cincinnati, and Louisville districts are situated in Indiana; data for these districts are presented in the bulletins for Illinois, Ohio, and Kentucky, respectively.

Census tracts.—Census tracts are small areas into which certain large cities (and sometimes their adjacent areas) are subdivided, through cooperation with a local committee in each case, for statistical and local administrative purposes. Through the use of census tract data comparisons may be made from census to census. Tracts are laid out with a view to approximate uniformity in population and with some regard for uniformity in area; and each is designed to include an area fairly homogeneous in population characteristics. In table 8 the 1940 and 1930 population of Indianapolis is shown by census tracts. This table also gives the population in 1940 by tracts of certain adjacent tracted areas shown on the accompanying map; these tracts were not established until 1940.

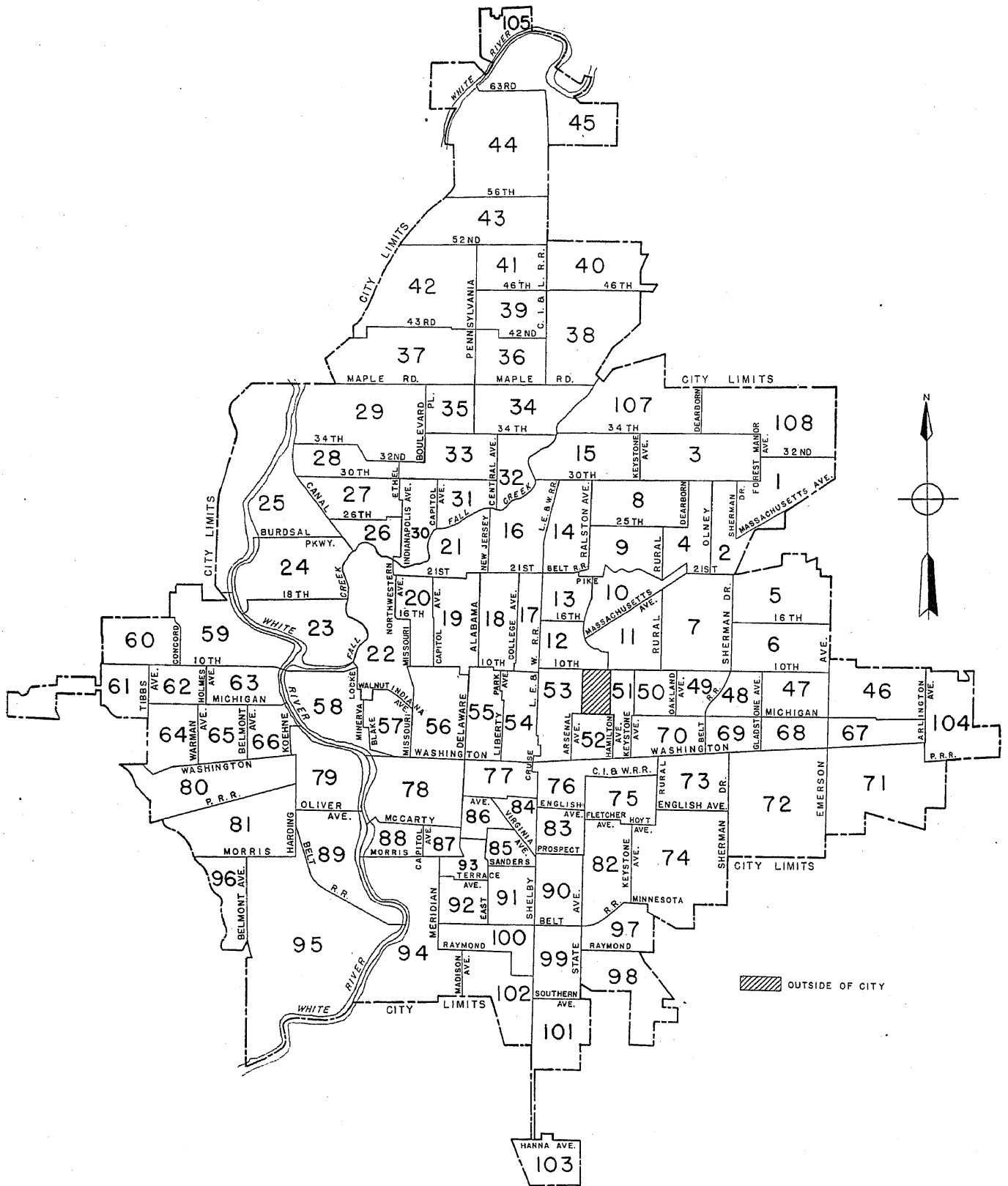

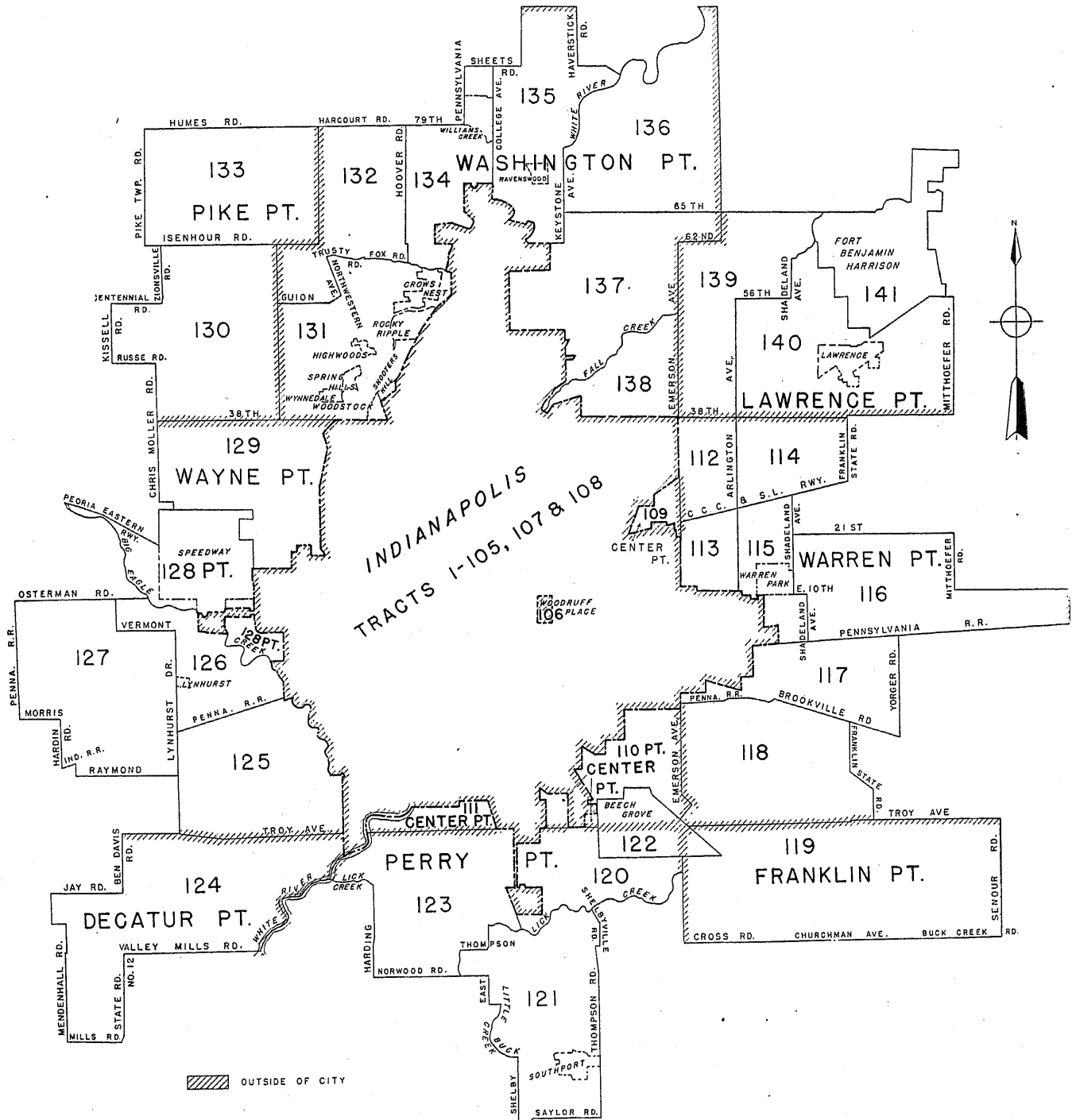

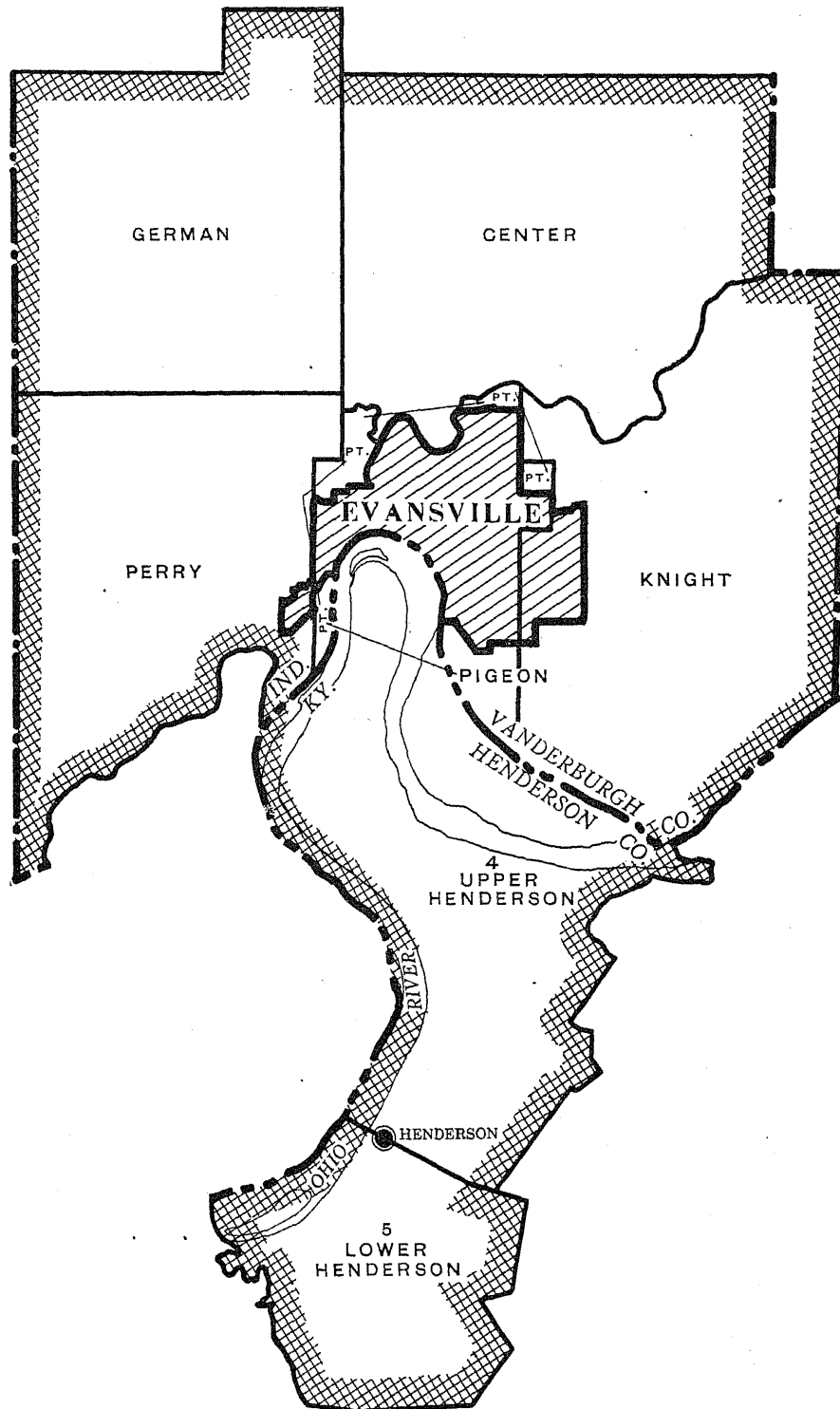
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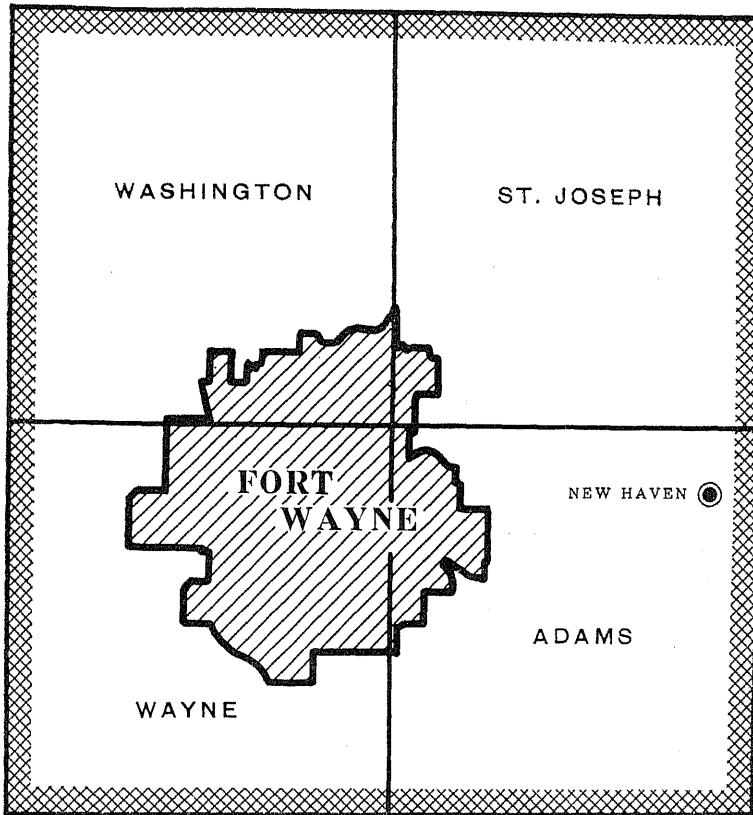
INDIANAPOLIS AND ADJACENT AREAS BY CENSUS TRACTS



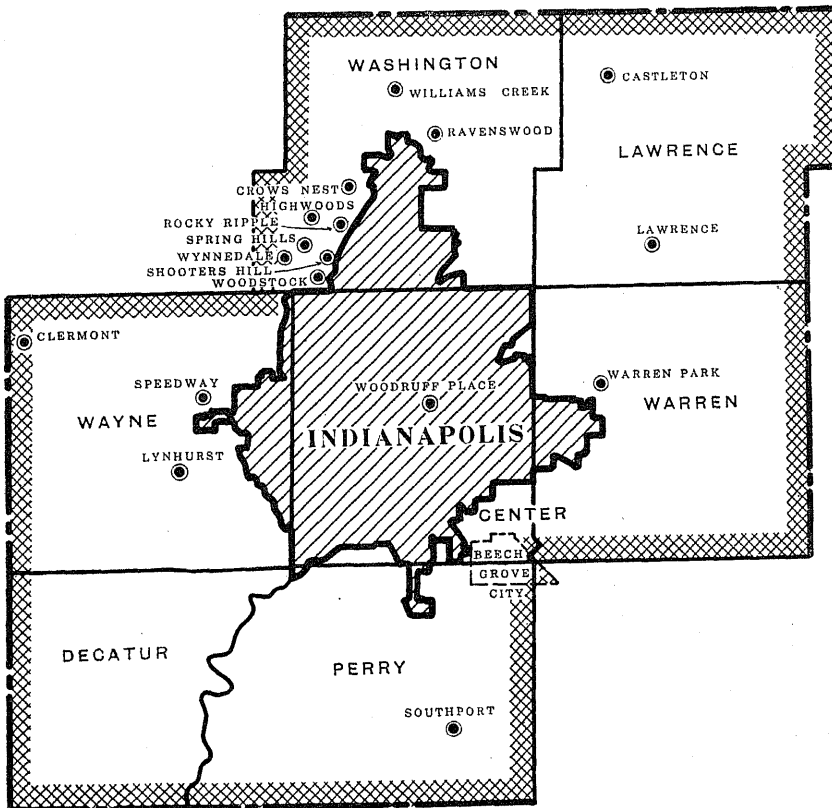
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FORT WAYNE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT

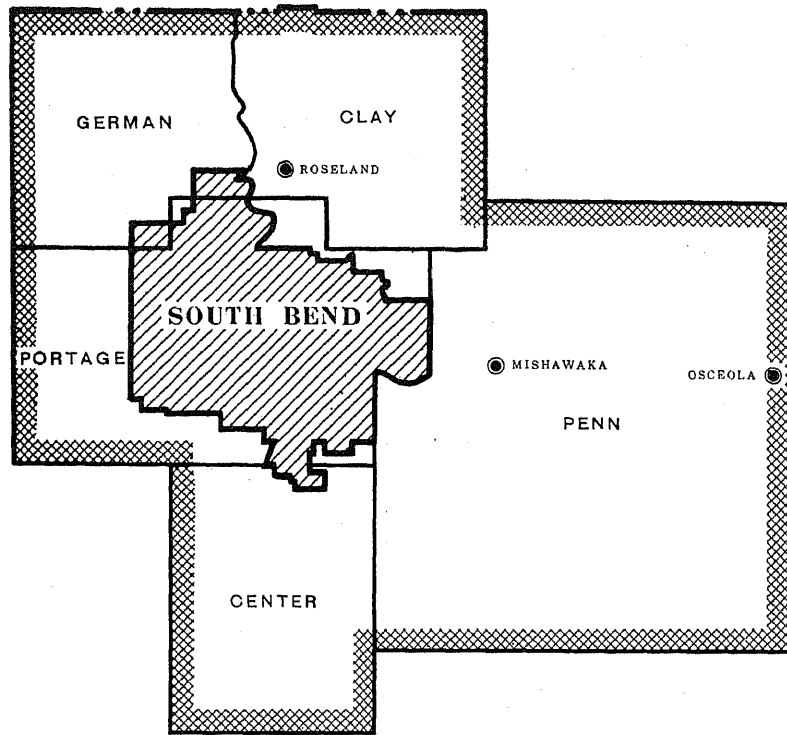


INDIANAPOLIS METROPOLITAN DISTRICT

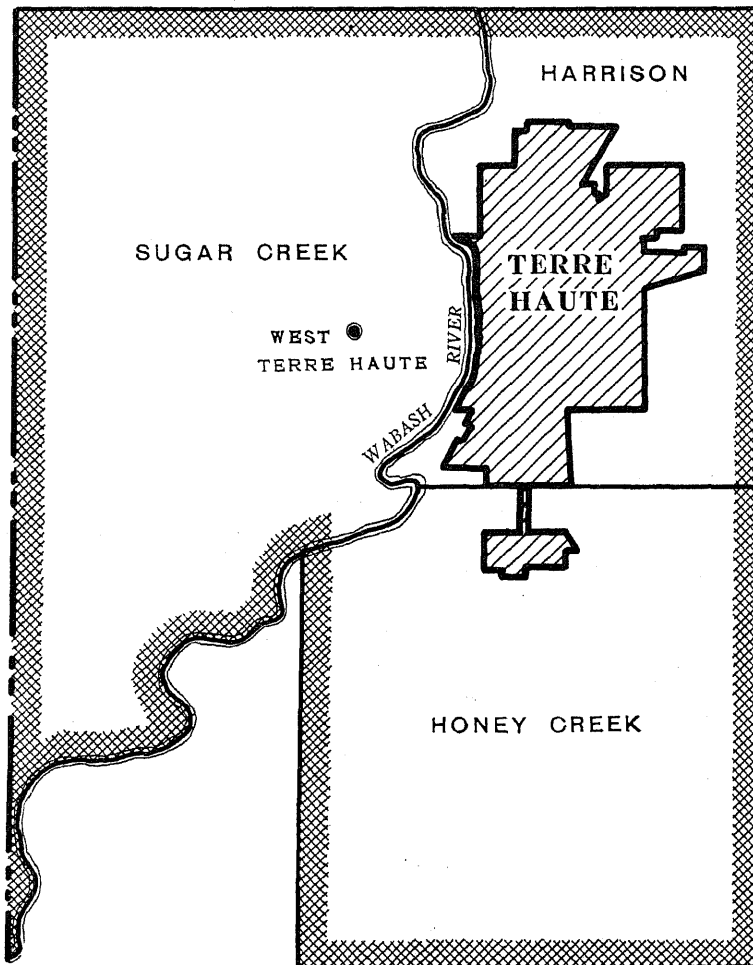

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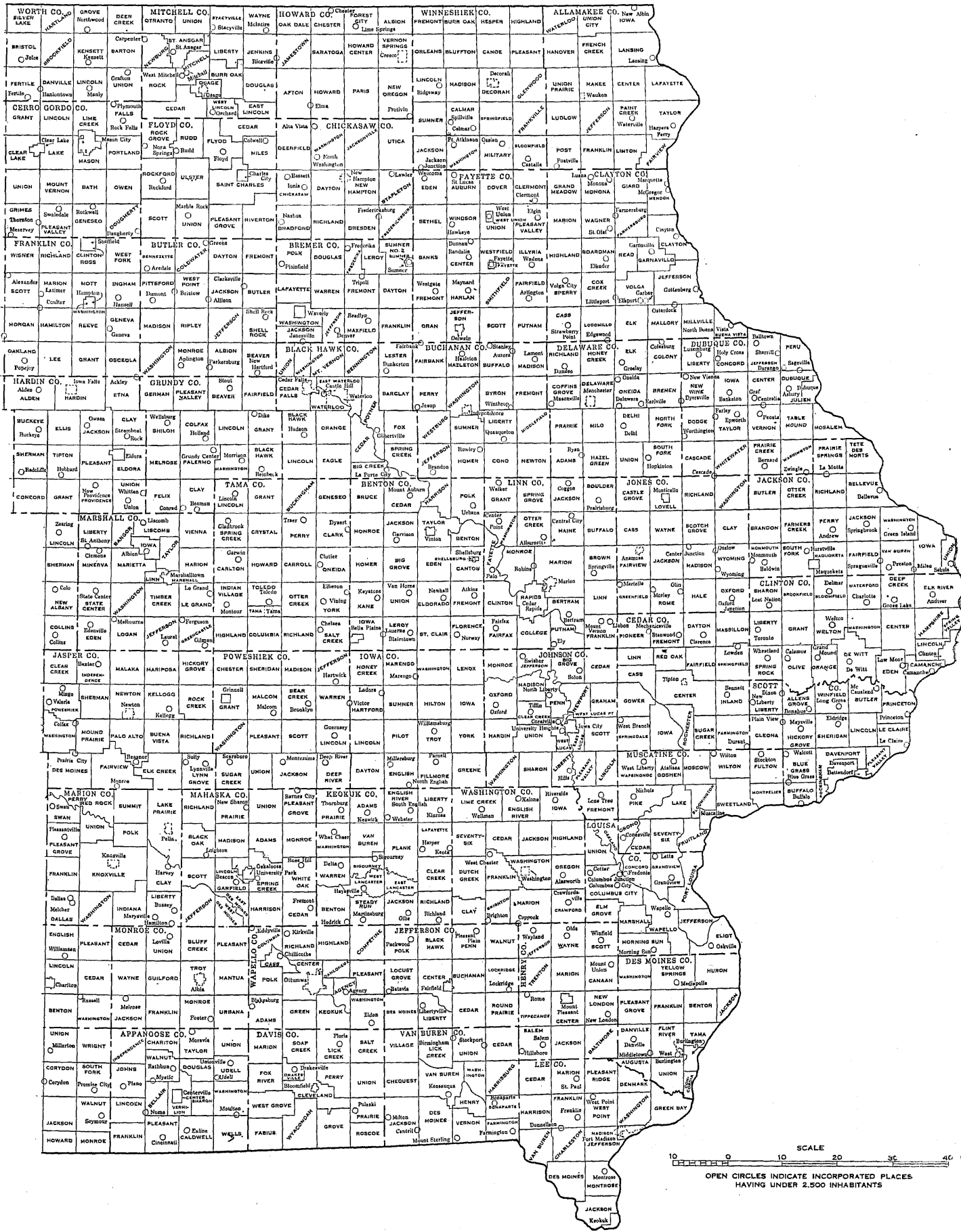

Population of the State.—Iowa was organized as a Territory in 1838 and was admitted to the Union as the twenty-ninth State in 1846. Its population on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 2,538,268, which represents an increase of 67,329, or 2.7 percent, as compared with the population on April 1, 1930. The total land area of the State, as shown in table 3, is 55,986 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1940 was 45.3, as compared with 44.1 in 1930.

Table 1 shows the population of Iowa from 1840, the year in which the Territory of Iowa was first enumerated, to 1940, together with the increase or decrease

during each decade. The urban and rural population of the State at each census is also presented in this table and is shown graphically in the accompanying chart. The urban population of Iowa comprises all persons living in incorporated places of 2,500 or more, the remainder of the population being classified as rural. The urban and rural areas are not constant from one census to the next, since new places are added to the urban list from time to time as they attain a population of 2,500 or more; for example, Bloomfield was classified as urban in 1940 for the first time. Places are likewise taken off the urban list when, through decline in population, they fall below this limit.

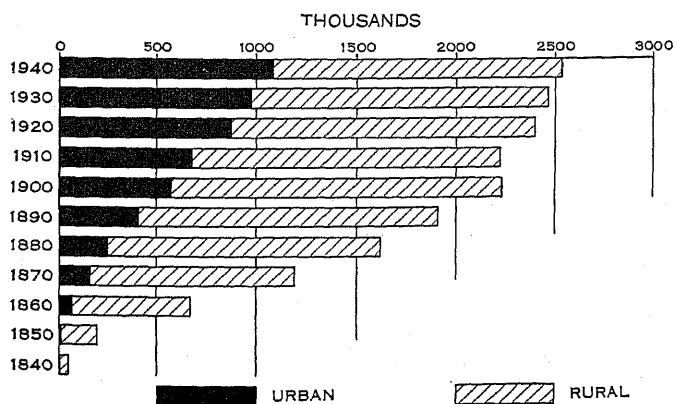

Geographic subdivisions.—In tables 2 to 5 the population of Iowa is shown by counties, townships, cities, and towns, with some comparative figures from previous censuses. Table 6 gives the population of cities by wards, and tables 7 and 8 present data respectively for five metropolitan districts and for the census tracts of Des Moines.

Cities of 10,000 or more.—There are 21 cities in the State that had a population of 10,000 or more in 1940. Table 2 shows the population of these cities at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase or decrease during each decade. Des Moines, the capital and largest city, had a population in 1940 of 159,819.

Minor civil divisions.—To the primary political divisions into which counties are subdivided the Census Bureau applies the general term "minor civil divisions." The primary divisions of the counties in Iowa are called townships, except for Sioux City, which is independent of any township organization and itself constitutes one of the primary divisions of Woodbury County. The incorporated cities and towns form secondary subdivisions of the minor civil divisions in which they are located. There are 109 cities and 822 towns. Ordinarily each of these secondary divisions, or incorporated places, forms a part of some township (or townships).

Table 4 shows the population of each county by townships, cities, and towns for the last three censuses. The population of the cities and towns is shown in *italics* under the population of the primary divisions in which the places are respectively located. Where an incorporated place is located in two or more townships in the same county, the total population of the place is given in connection with the presentation for the first township. Where the place is situated in two or more counties, the total population is given in connection with each county.

Metropolitan districts.—Metropolitan districts have been set up for use in the 1940 Census of Population in connection with each city of 50,000 or more, two or more such cities sometimes being in one district. The general plan is to include in the district, in addition to the central city or cities, all adjacent and contiguous minor civil divisions or incorporated places having a population of 150 or more per square mile. In some metropolitan districts a few less densely populated contiguous divisions are included on the basis of special qualifications. A metropolitan district is thus not a political unit but rather an area including all the thickly settled territory in and around a city or group of cities. It tends to be a more or less integrated area with common economic, social, and, often, administrative interests. The following tables give data for the five metropolitan districts with the main central city in Iowa. Part of the Omaha-Council Bluffs district is also situated in Iowa; data for this district are presented in the bulletin for Nebraska.

Table 7 shows the population of the Cedar Rapids metropolitan district and its constituent political units in 1940. This district was defined for the first time in 1940. For comparison the 1930 population of the units comprising the present district is also shown, together with the increase or decrease between 1930 and 1940. In 1940 the Cedar Rapids metropolitan district had 73,219 inhabitants, whereas in 1930 the same area had a population of 66,591.

Table 7-A shows the population of the Davenport-Rock Island-Moline metropolitan district (called the

Davenport metropolitan district in 1930) and its constituent political units in 1940 and 1930, together with the increase during the decade. Like several others, this district occupies territory in more than one State. In 1940 the Davenport-Rock Island-Moline metropolitan district had 174,995 inhabitants, whereas in 1930 the district as then constituted had a population of 154,491. Port Byron township, Rock Island County, Ill. (population: 907 in 1940; 613 in 1930), was included in the metropolitan district in 1940 for the first time.

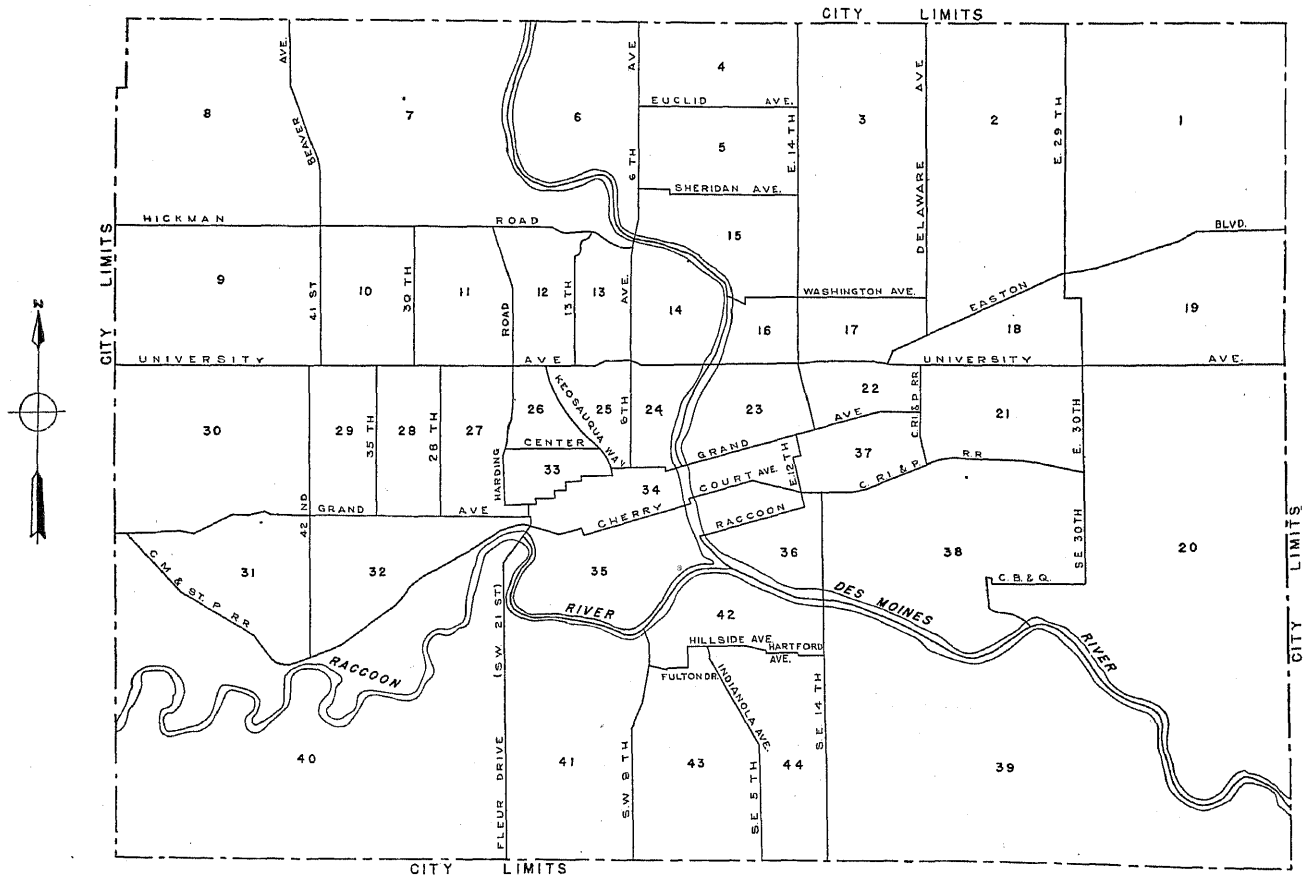
NUMBER OF INHABITANTS

Census tracts.—Census tracts are small areas into which certain large cities are subdivided for statistical and local administrative purposes, through cooperation with a local committee in each case. The tracts are permanently established, so that comparisons may be made from census to census; they are laid out with a view to approximate uniformity in population and with some regard for uniformity in area, and each is designed to include an area fairly homogeneous in population characteristics. The 1940 population of Des Moines is shown by census tracts in table 8, and the tracts are shown on the accompanying map. Since these tracts were not established until after 1930, there are no comparative figures for earlier censuses.

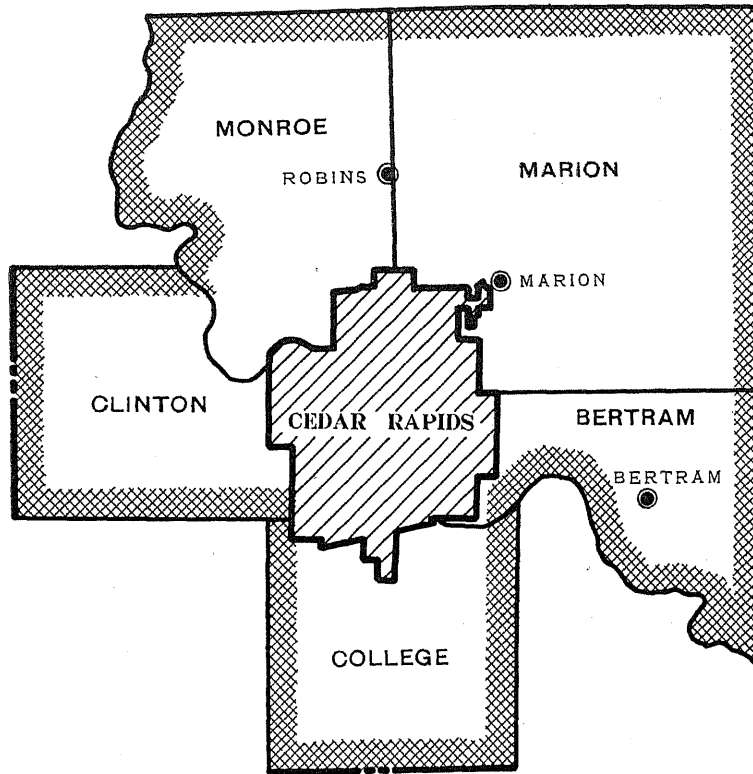

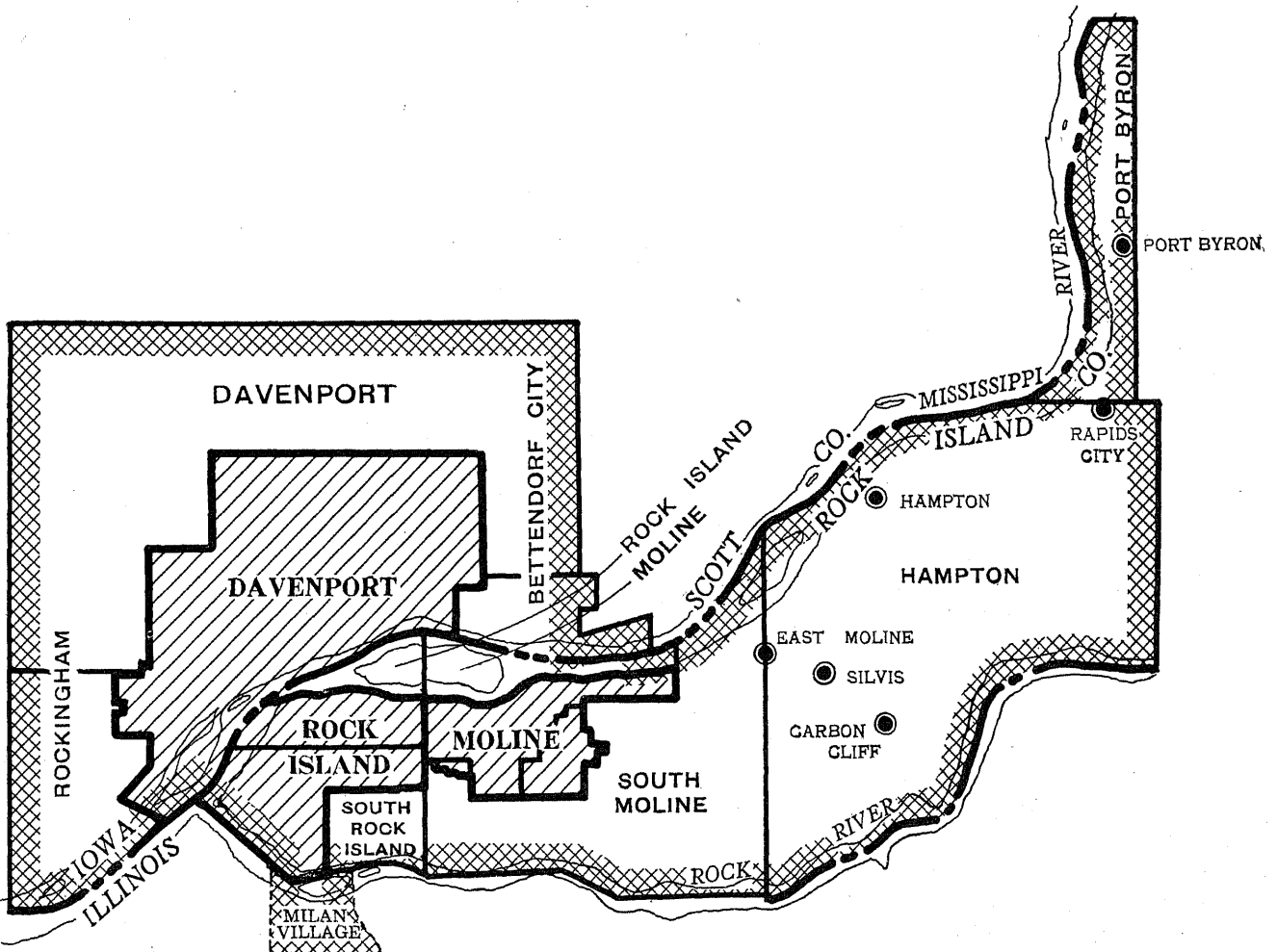
DES MOINES BY CENSUS TRACTS



CEDAR RAPIDS METROPOLITAN DISTRICT

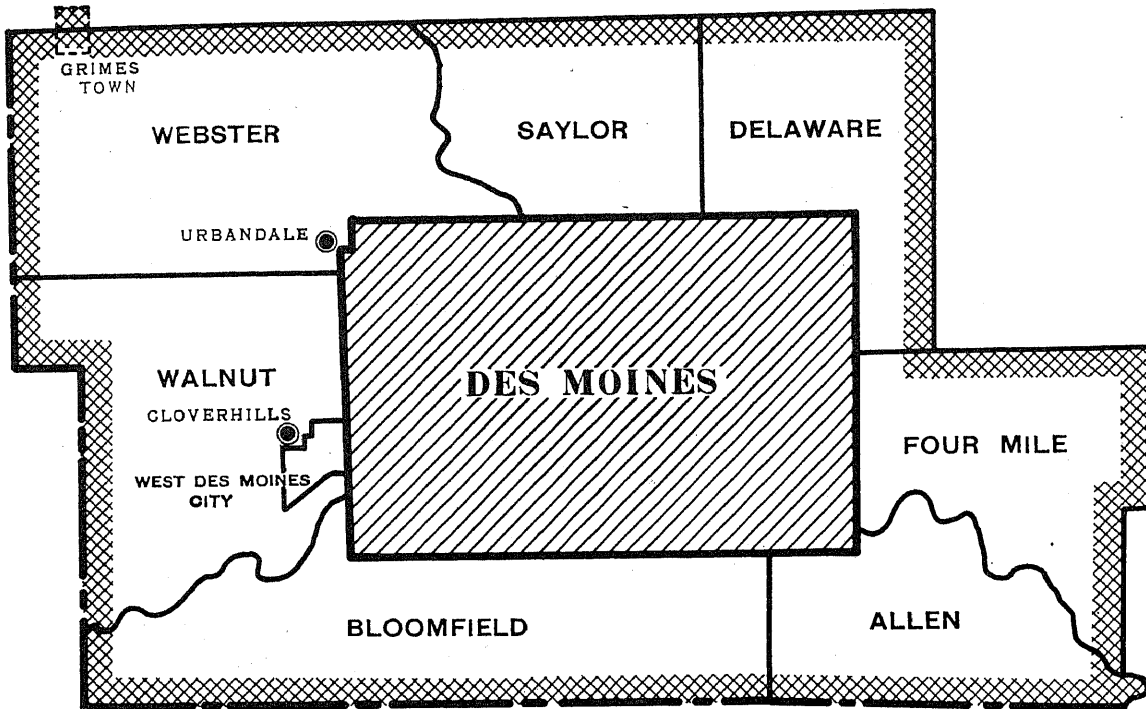


DAVENPORT, IOWA-ROCK ISLAND-MOLINE, ILL., METROPOLITAN DISTRICT

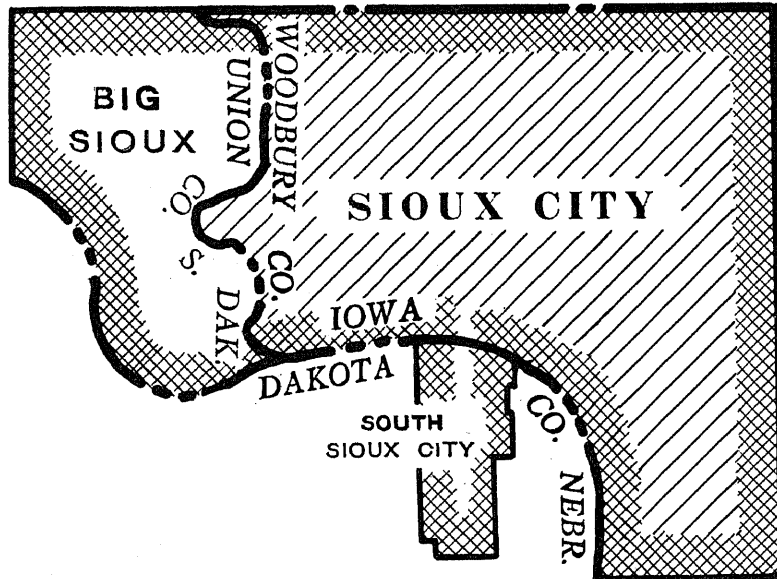


NUMBER OF INHABITANTS
