#### WOMEN FIGHT FOR EXISTENCE

Chainmakers of England Who Refuse to Work for Less Than Five Cents an Hour.

The women chainmakers of Cradley Heath have been "looked out" because many of them refused to sign agreements to work for less than five cents an hour, the minimum wage fixed by the board of trade, the London correspondent of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch writes. There are 300 of these women, who by 68 hours a week of the hardest kind of physical toil cannot hope to make more than \$3.75 to \$4 a week. The minimum wage means to most of them a bare living and wage to wear.

An employer who can show an agreement to work at the old wage or less than the minimum now set is not obliged to pay the new official
