Minneapolis, where he had his tonsils removed, he departed for New Mexico, hoping that the warmer and drier climate would be beneficial. On the way to Fargo, he took a turn for the way to rargo, he took a turb to the worse, and had to be carried from the train at that city. He de-cided to take electrical treatments at the Nelson Sanitorium there, and last Friday word was received here

that he had contracted pneumonia, and was seriously ill. In his weakened condition he was unable to twithstand the ravages of this disease and gradually failed, death claiming him early yesterday morning. He came to Cooperstown about 20 years ago from Wisconsin, since which time he has been engaged in the practice of law.
