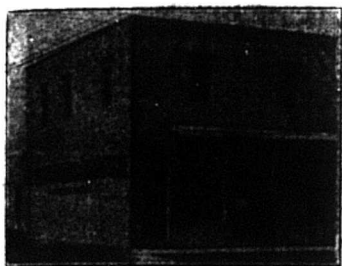


TIMES PLANT WILL BE MOVED

C. E. Peterson Closes Deal for Abraham Building--Will Move This Week.

Obituary of Mrs. Goplen's Father

Wanamingo (Minn.) Progress: The funeral of the late Ole O. Follingstad, whose death was briefly announced last week, was held at the Lutheran church in this village, Sunday, and was attended by an unusually large number of people, many being unable to get inside the church. Services were conducted by Rev. Cl. J. Carlson. Solos were sung by Mrs. Carlson and Martin

Halvorson. The pall bearers were: John Nelson, Nels Olsness, Tollef Stenhaus, Carl Ring, Jorgen Ingepretson, and Andrew Goplin. Burial took place in the Wanamingo cemetery.

Mr. Follingstad's death was due directly to uremia. He underwent an operation June 5, 1917, and from that date was continually confined to his bed.

Ole O. Follingstad, son of Ole and Mary (Kolberg) Follingstad, was born at Vardahl, Norway, August 15, 1834, and died December 15, 1919, aged 85 years and four months. The following obituary record is supplied by L. J. Gjemse, a life-long friend and associate of the deceased:

"Mr. Follingstad emigrated to America in company with his parents in 1861, and came direct to Goodhue county. October 30, 1868, he was united in marriage to Miss Inger Bakkethun and moved the same year to an 80-acre farm which he bought in Wanamingo township. This was added to from time to time until he owned 380 acres, which he farmed up to a few years ago when his sons took over the farm.

"To Mr. and Mrs. Follingstad were born fourteen children, six of whom died in infancy. Olaf died in 1897, at the age of 25 years. Oscar and Henry are farming the home place; Lewis is farming near Franklin, Minnesota; Mary, wife of Daffin Goplin, residing in North Dakota; Julia, wife of Rev. Thomas Hanson, of Franklin; Mathilda, wife of Phillip Johnson of Leon, and Ida, who is at home.

"Mr. Follingstad was a self educated man, well read and well informed, with a big fund of common sense. He was a leader and took a prominent part in, and was identified with most of the public measures pertaining to the growth and prosperity of his township and the surrounding villages. He served for a number of years as assessor, was for a number of years president of the Farmers State bank of Wanamingo, had been a director and part owner of the Wanamingo flour mills and was for a time one of the company that owned the Wanamingo lumber yard. He belonged to the Norwegian Lutheran church, of Wanamingo, which he joined a number of years ago."
