## **GRIGGS COUNTY** MAN IS KILLED

PETER BOLSTAD, OF COOPERS-TOWN, WAS KILLED WHEN TRAIN HIT AUTO

The following "close-up" account of the death of Peter Boistad, of Cooperstown, was taken from the Lake Falls, Minn., Gazette, near which place the accident occur red:

Four men are dead as a result of a collision between an automobile north-bound and the Great Northern passenger train No. 135 at Delorme crossing on the county line eight miles south of this city Friday more-The dead are A. Gjesdal, 68 years old, of Crookston; Wm. Riel 36 years old. of Okiee, his son-in iau. Peter Boistad, 45 years old, of Cooperstown, N. D. his nephew, and Carl E. Giesdal, 22 years old, his Bolstad and Riel were instantly killed; A.
