N. J. Olson Dead.

Sanborn Enterprise: A telegram was received by relatives here Monday morning that Mr. N. J. Olson of this place, who recently started with Mrs. Olson for California by way of Colorado and Utah had been stricken with double pneumonia and was in a serious condition in Salt Lake City. Wednesday morning another wire was received from his son F. O. Olson, who accompanied him, conveying the sad intelligence, that Mr. Olson had passed away at 2:00 that morning. Mr. Olson had been in rather poor health for a long time, and it was thought that a sojourn of a few months in a more salubrious climate would be beneficial. He was a man of heavy build, and the high altitude of the contry which through he was passing together with his debilitated condition combined to bring on the fatal attack.

Mr. Olson was sixty-three years of age. He was born in Norway and came with his parents to this country when a lad of 12 years. In his young manhood he worked as station agent on a railroad in Minnesota, gradually working into the grain business. He came to Sanborn in 1883, as manager of the old N. P. elevator. Later he went into the merchandise business and acquired some prairie land. He returned to the grain business and built a line of elevators in North Dakota and a seed house in Moorhead, Minn., with headquarters in Minneapolis. He made his home in Fargo and Minneapolis for some time. A few years ago he returned to Sanborn and lived on one of his farms near town, moving in the village when winter in.

At the time of his death and for a long time previous he was the head of the firm of N. J. Olson & Sons, with offices in Sanborn, Moorhead,

and Minneapolis, Fred being in charge at Moorhead and Rob at Minneapolis.

Besides owning considerable land in this vicinity he had interest in large tracts elsewhere.

We understand arrangements have been made for the interment of the body in Fargo.

The deceased was a man of affairs. Besides his widely extended grain business, he took an interest in local affairs. He assisted in the organization of the village and was one of its first officers, was postmaster of Sanborn under President Harrison, and took an active part in the early development of this section of North Dakota.

It is with deep regret that the Enterprise chronicles the death of Mr. Olson, and we join with the entire community in extending condolences to the surviving members of the family.

There is left to mourn his passing away, the bereaved widow, three sons, F. O. of Fargo, N. R. of Minneapolis, and R. J. of Sanborn, and one daughter, Mrs. Rufus Lee, of Gladstone, N. D.
