

### Nels Tufteland Passes Away

Nels Olson Tufteland, after an illness that confined him to his home for nearly two years past, was summoned by death on Friday, October 29, at 7:30 o'clock in the morning, passing peacefully to his rest. Heart trouble and asthma were the cause of his death.

Nels Tufteland was born July 26, 1851, at Tufteland, Norway, having attained the age of 69 years, two months, and three days. On Oct. 15, 1877, he was married to Eli Olson Berge, at Bergen, Norway, and to this union was born seven children. In July 1882, the family emigrated to America, and settled at Montevideo, Minnesota, where they resided until June 27, 1886, when they came to Griggs county and homesteaded on the farm on which the family still resides at Red Willow lake. The children who survive him are Mrs. Annie Arnold, of Alberta, Canada; Mrs. Olin Carlson, of Polson, Montana; Mrs. Martha Slaven, Baylor, Montana; Mrs. Rebecca Abrahamson of Tokio, N. D.; Henry Tufteland, of Judson, N. D.; Adolph and Bertha, at home. Besides his wife and children, he leaves to mourn his death, a brother, Andrew, at Cooperstown, a sister in Norway, eleven grandchildren, and one great grandchild.

Deceased is one of the pioneers of Griggs county. He was of a quiet disposition, and was generally and

highly esteemed by all who knew him. He lived his life bravely and faithfully and was a kind father and husband. And for such is doubtless laid up a crown of glory in heaven.

The funeral was held from the home at 1:30 o'clock, Monday, and from the church at 2:30, Rev. Bach officiating. A large funeral cortege followed the remains to their final resting place in the West Prairie cemetery.
