Sharon-Aneta Mill Deal May be Fixed The blue sky commission is endea-

voring to sidestep responsibility for settling a difference between Aneta and Sharon over the location of a flour mill which Sharon and Aneta wants, and members of the board hope that at the annual meeting of the Grain Growers' Co-operative Milling and Elevator Co., which was

held at Sharon last Friday, that the stockholders may rescue the blue sky

commission from its dilemma by voting to leave the mill where it is and to invest the money which would be spent in moving the mill in the purchase of an elevator at Aneta. If this agreement is reached, Sharon will retain its mill, and Aneta will gain an elevator, and the company will save \$14,000, which is the estimate cost of toting the Sharon mill some fifteen miles across hills and coulees to the proposed Aneta site. The company will also avoid

threatened law suits and will put an end to some very ill feeling which has developed between the rival com-

The trouble has grown out of some modern financeering. A new company was organized to take over the Sharon mill, it is understood, Then the same man who organized the Sharon company, organized the Grain Growers' concern at Aneta, which purchased the capital stock and property of the Sharon enterprise. Anetans who put up the most money which went into the Grain Growers' Co. were, it appears, promised that they would have the Sharon mill. Sharonites who had invested in the original mill company objected to this arrangement and they went to blue sky commission with their troubles. The blue sky commission advised the litigants to go home and endeavor to patch up their differences, and this effort is expected to be made at the Sharon meeting.
