Binford a "Garden Spot"

Fargo Forum: Hatton, Binford and Sutton are "garden spots" this year, according to H. P. Beckwith, of the Northern Savings bank, who has returned from Finley, having attended the meeting of the third district group of bankers of which he is secretary.

"I never saw the crops show up so well as this year, and farmers in the districts that I visited, personally told me that they never saw anything like it," said Mr Beckwith.

Forerunner of Lower Prices

Twenty per cent reductions in prices are the forerunners of a program of price reduction to continue until a price level somewhere near the old normal is reached, according to Wesley C. McDowell of Marion, who has just returned from Washington, D. C. where he attended a conference of financiers as a Class A director of the Ninth Federal Reserve bank district, and special representative of the smaller banks in the district. The other Class A director from the district at the conference was Edward Decker of Minneapolis.

Attending the conference, which was called to consider ways and means of meeting the threatening financial crisis, were Federal Reserve bank officers and Class A directors, members of the Federal Reserve commission, the shipping board, railway officials, members of the Interstate Commerce commission, members of congress, leading exporters of grain, and the secretary of the treasury.

The theme of the conference was the same as for the group meetings of the North Dakota Banker's association. Attention at these meetings also was paid to boys' and girls' clubs and increased production, and at one meeting a slogan was adopted "One New Livestock Farmer for Every Banker in the State," pledging bankers to interest one new farmer in livestock breeding.

In a final effort to bring down the cost of living and establish American business on a solid and safe foundation, the nation is swinging back to the war basis of restricted use of money," said Mr McDowell. The peak of an acute business emergency is just being passed, and the American people are called upon to exercise the same degree of restraint and the same amount of national cooperation which they displayed during the war that a rapid recovery from the economic ills may be expected.
