

WORK ON NEW GARAGE STARTS

BUILDING WILL BE COMPLETED THIS FALL—MODERN IN EVERY DETAIL

Excavation for the basement of the new garage, which will replace the old eye-sore that has "graced" one of Binford's principal business corners, marks the beginning of a structure that will not only add a great deal to the appearance of our business street but gives Binford a garage that can offer its patrons more and better service—something we have sorely lacked, owing to the handicap of not having sufficient space in which to install facilities for the proper handling of work such as is required in a first-class garage.

Plans for the new building have been approved and call for a structure 50 feet wide by 94 feet long, one story. The front will be of beautiful design in red face, wire-drawn brick, and the sides in tile block, and probably stuccoed on the side adjoining the street. The interior plan is arranged to afford ample space for a work shop, paint and welding room in the rear, storage room in the center, and an office, stock and display room in the front, with large doors in both front and rear. The basement will be 14x50. This is to be used for storage battery service. The building will be heated by a large furnace.

Modern machinery will be installed, increasing the facilities with many labor-saving devices, and, in general, making such additions to equipment that will give Binford as good a garage as can usually be had in any of the larger cities. As soon as the excavating is com-

pleted, the present building will be moved into the street, permitting the masons to commence the foundation.
