4,692 Claims for Exemption.

Agriculture proved the grounds for the largest number of discharges by the district exemption board on the first draft, according to the report of the board completed last Friday for the provost marshal general's office. The district board which has passed upon a total of 4,692 cases, has wound up its business on the first draft entirely.

A total of 3,054 claims were filed the board on agricultural with grounds. Of this number 912 claims were granted and the men discharged, while the remaining 2,142 men There were were held for service. 827 claims presented to the board on industrial grounds, of which number 70 claims were allowed and 257 were held for service.

Of the original jurisdiction cases coming before the North Dakota district board 690 agricultural claims were appealed to the president and 35 industrial claims were appealed. The board, however, has no record of the decision of the president in these cases, but it is generally un-

One thousand three hundred and eleven appeal cases came up to the district board from the local county boards. Of this number a total of 526 were held for service, and 785 The grounds for were discharged. the largest number of discharges was dependency, a total of 719 of the appeal cases being excused from service on appeal.
