## Will Redeem 3c Stamped Envelopes.

Postmasters, commencing July 1, when the two-cent postage rate is again effective, will redeem from the public all unused and undamaged two-cent cards and three-cent envelopes, printed or unprinted, at full value, provided they are convinced such cards and envelopes are presented by the original purchasers, according to an announcement by J. A. Knapp, local postmaster.

Postmasters will furnish in exchange for such cards and envelopes, postage stamps, postal cards, or stamped envelopes of other denominations or varieties to be selected by the owner, or they may be applied in payment or part payment for two-cent stamped envelopes. No postal cards nor stamped envelopes will be redeemed from the public in cash.
