

LOAN FORCES TO BE POSTED

Organization of Liberty Loan Forces
Will Get Instructions at Cooperstown Next Week.

Chairman Greenland announces a meeting of the Griggs County Liberty Loan forces to be held in Cooperstown, next Wednesday, and every member of the executive committee, township committeemen, solicitors and county bankers are urged to be present at that time.

Mr. Greenland has received no official information as to the opening date of the drive, but press dispatches in the dailies contain statements by Secretary McAdoo, in which the date is definitely announced for April 6—the first anniversary of our entry into the war. The Times is publishing Secretary McAdoo's statement in another column.

A representative of the Ninth Federal Reserve committee will be present at the Cooperstown meeting to explain the new issue of bonds and to aid the local forces in organizing a thorough campaign for the sale of the bonds.
