The law is known . as the Brinton newspaper bill, and provides that all official printing and y practically all legal printing of every nature shall be done by one paper in each county. Athough this is the d first opportunity the voters will have of naming their choice for official newspaper, the law has been effective, because of a provision authorize f ing the printing commission to appoint such newspaper to serve until the next general election. In all cases, with the single exception of Barnes county, and in many instances with utter disregard of qualifications, the appointments have gone to the league publications. At the coming election the voters will register their choice for official newspaper in the same manner as voting
