

TIMES A LEGAL PAPER AGAIN

NEW NEWSPAPER LAW BECAME EFFECTIVE TODAY—MAY PRINT LEGALS

The Times becomes a legal newspaper and is qualified to publish legal notices of every description, except that which originates with the county or state, according to the initiated law which was approved by the people at the November election. The law became effective when the state canvassing board had officially canvassed the vote.

Answering requests for interpretation of the initiated law regarding legal publications, Attorney General Langer has issued an opinion setting forth under the proper designation the various classes of legal publications. His statement of the classes follows:

1. Legal publications, notices, etc. which must be published in the official newspaper selected at the election of Nov. 2, 1920:

a. Official proceedings of board of county commissioners.

b. All notices and publications, which county officers are required to publish by law, including tax lists.

c. All notices and publications, which state officials elected or appointed are required by law to publish.

d. All notices and publications of cities, towns, villages, and schools within such cities, towns and villages if the official newspaper chosen at the election of Nov. 2, 1920, is printed and published in such city, or village.

2. Legal publications, notices, etc. which may be published in a paper other than the official newspaper of the county.

a. All summons, citations, notices, orders and other processes in all actions or proceedings in the supreme, district, county and justice courts.

b. All notices of foreclosure by advertisement on real estate, chattel mortgage or other liens on real or personal property.

c. Statements of banks and publications of townships and township offices.

d. Legal notices and publications of townships and township offices.

e. Legal notices and publications of school district officers in case such school district does not have within its boundaries a city, town or village.

3. In cities, towns or villages in which the official newspaper is not located, the city council or commission or board may designate an official newspaper for the publications of such notice and legal publication, as are by law required to be published by such cities, towns or villages, including legal notices and statements of the school within such city, town or village.

The attorney general announces he will answer any other questions that may arise regarding legal publications.
