

Dr. Brimi Returns From Camp Dodge

Sentinel-Courier: Dr. C. L. Brimi arrived home on Tuesday of this week from Camp Dodge, where he has been Regimental Surgeon 351st Infantry. The doctor was ordered before the retiring board in December on account of lumbago, which incapacitated him for active service. The board ordered the doctor to be honorably discharged from the service of the United States.

Dr. Brimi will resume the practise of his profession in Cooperstown and vicinity at once.

Following is a copy of the telegram, received by Dr. Brimi from Adjutant General McCain:

Lieut. Carl L. Brimi Medical Reserve Corps is relieved from duty at Camp Dodge and will proceed to his home, reporting on arrival there by telegraph to the adjutant General. By direction of the President Lieut. Brimi is honorably discharged from service of the United States effective upon arrival home.

Dr. Brimi regrets very much his inability to continue as an officer in the army, but as the finest physical condition is a requirement in the medical corps, as well as in the ranks of the humblest private, he was declared incapacitated for service on account of lumbago, his old enemy, and attacks of which he had suffered at the camp. The doctor was in line for promotion to captaincy, and on this account also he regrets his discharge.

People of Cooperstown and vicinity will be glad to learn that Dr. Brimi is to resume his practice here, and he expects to open his offices here as soon as possible.

The doctor was much pleased with conditions at Camp Dodge and says it is one of the best cantonments in the United States. He informed us that Ernest L. Iverson, formerly of the State bank of this city, is now a corporal in the quartermaster department.

Mrs. Brimi and the baby arrived home with the doctor on Tuesday.
