Fall River, Mass., shows the hightadvance. In this city the mority has jumped from an average ate of 13.7 per 1000 people to 100.4. The total of cases throughout the cuntry since the disease became revalent in the middle of September, will run into the millions. This made evident by the actual figures of the army camps. There have been \$1,462 cases of influenza and pneumina among the troops in training. The deaths in the army camps from both diseases for the same period lave reached the high total of 12,-10.

While the United States public health service cannot forcast what the final toll will be, they say that, "taking the country as a whole, the epidemic has done little more than get a good start. The end is not in sight. The epidemic will be as severe from the Mississippi to the Pacific slope two weeks hence as it was in New England a couple weeks ago. and as it is in and about Washington today." The bureau further states that the people must take home to themselves a large measure of responsibility for the spread of The spread of influenthe disease. za can be checked materially if citizens will exercise the most ordinary care."
