

# QUOTA IS MORE THAN DOUBLED

Tabulated Figures of Liberty Loan Drive Places County at \$226,000.

With better than 100 per cent oversubscription—and the brakes haven't been applied yet—Griggs county is right out in front, doing her share to halt the Hun.

Every unit in the county is entitled to the honor flag for oversubscribing its allotment. Some turned in an amount more than double its quota, and a few have the added distinction of more than trebling.

Mabel and Willow townships lead again in the amount of subscription. In the second campaign Willow was the banner township of the county, but in the present drive, Mabel, with the town of Sutton, is leading.

The hope and expectation of State Chairman McDowell that 25 per cent of the state's population become holders of Liberty bonds of the third issue, is fulfilled in Griggs county. Fourteen percent of the people was the record in the second campaign.

Oscar Greenland, chairman for Griggs county, is to be complimented for his fine generalship in organizing for the county and the rapidity with which the allotment was oversubscribed was much due to his preparations in advance and his selection of a bunch of boosting chairmen and assistants to clean it up when the word was given to go.

## Draft Men Sent Home.

Thirty-three North Dakota men who have been in training at Camp Dodge for some time have been recommended for discharge from military service on account of physical deficiency.

These men will be given "certificates of physical deficiency," and are not permanently discharged from the service. They are required to report to their local board when the causes for which they have been discharged no longer exist.

The government will pay the expenses of these men to the towns from which they were inducted and wages while they have been in camp.
