The first North Dakota contingent of the second draft has been called for April 29 by Provest Marshal General Crowder, according to instrutions received by Adjutant General G. A. Praser. The order calls 1,087 North Dakota men to the colors. Of this number Griggs county will be required to furnish 13 men according to General Fraser, who wired the quota of the various counties of state to the local boards. The call came as a surprise not only to the civilian population of the state

)but to General Fraser as well. e first intimation that an increment of **;** -8 the second draft would be called soon came in press dispatches from Washp ton Saturday morning stating that a call would be issued the latter part n of the month.

North Dakota less than two weeks ago sent 1,264 men, the last 40 per cent of its quota of the first draft to Camp Dodge, Iowa. The states quota on the first draft was approximately 5,500 men out of 600,000 men called in the United States. If the go vernment plan to raise 800,000 men on the second draft is carried out North Dakota will be required to raise even a greater number on the draft. . 0 of a crop will be given deferred enn trainment as far as information is available in the adjutant general's office. There has been nothing to rescind the order of the president issued just before the movement of the last increment of the first draft giving deferment to men engaged in farming.
