

NEW GARAGE FOR BINFORD

LARGE FIRE PROOF STRUCTURE
WILL REPLACE PRESENT
BUILDING--NEW OWNERS

Binford is, at last, to have a large and modern garage.

A deal was completed this week whereby H. B. Hanson, the present owner, disposed of his interest to two Moore brothers, J. L. Moore, of Spiritwood lake, and V. C. Moore, of Monticello, Iowa. In addition to acquiring the property of Mr. Hanson, they also became the owners of the building owned by Theo. Herigstad and also the two adjoining lots, owned by R. H. Carroll.

In an interview with The Times, J. L. Moore stated that work on the new building will commence at once. Present plans call for a single story structure with a frontage of 75 feet, extending back 84 feet, and to be absolutely fireproof. Mr. Moore stated that the exact material for the building had not been fully decided upon. It is planned to build the north fifty feet as soon as workman and material is available, leaving the present building as it is for temporary use until the new one is far enough advanced. Owing to the scarcity of dwelling houses in Binford, the upper story may have to be used for living quarters. If however other arrangements can be made the top story will be removed and the new roof extended over the entire space.

A complete and modern equipment will be installed, including not only the necessary facilities for repairing and overhauling, but also vulcanizing and painting departments, and a full line of accessories, etc.

The Moore brothers are experienced automobile men and are financially able to give Binford a garage that will be a credit to the town. In this respect we have been behind some of our neighboring towns.

Mr. Moore states that he has had his "eye on Binford" for a number of years, while looking for a location for such a business and in his travels he found none that appealed to him so much. He recognizes, too, that the proposed development of Red Willow lake and the new state highway through Griggs County, north and south, will bring much added traffic thru our town, and consequently increased business in all lines.

The Messrs. Moore are married men and will bring their families here as soon as homes can be secured.
