Governor's Proclamation.

Armistice day, will be observed as a legal holiday in North Dakota, according to a proclamation from Governor Lynn J. Frazier, which has been received.

The proclamation follows:

One year has passed since the joyful news was flashed across the ocean
that hostilities had ceased; that the
world was once more at peace; and
that American and Allied arms had
triumphed. That day was observed
as a day of thanksgiving, of prayer
and of patriotic expression as befitted the occurrence of so great an
event as the winning of a world victory.

It is therefore both appropriate and desireable that this first anniversary be likewise observed and that on that occasion special honor be accorded the thousands of young men and women who gave themselves to their country's service, and who have now returned to their usual peaceful pursuits; also that we, as the citizens of a great state of the world's greatest nation, renew our covenant of faith in the new democracy, bought so dearly by those who fought its battles; and that we by all means in our power seek to perpetuote those high ideals that constitute the true foundation of permanent peace and good will.

Acting under the authority of the statutes of the state, I hereby proclaim that Tuesday, November 11, 1919, be observed as Armistice day, and be a legal holiday throughout the state of North Dakota, and urge that all the people in the commonwealth join in making this observance general and inspirational.
