In his opening remarks he gave much attention to the profileers in America. He spoke of the corporation that was on trial before a federa, judge in the east and the judge merely fined it because there was no law by which he could punish the officers of the corporation. He said that one of the things that he would advocate at the San Francisco convention was a plank making it possi-

ble to throw the president of a profleering corporation into jail.

When at the Chicago convention" said Mt. Bryan, "I attempted to get the Republican party to place a real plank against profiteering in their platform and told them I would do word for word in the Democratic platform so that, whichever party won at the election, we would have the means of combatting this menace."

In discussing the League of Nations the speaker said that America knew how to get into the war but didn' know how to get out. sie said the covenant was the nearest approach fo anything that had eyer been fram ed for the surpose of maintaining world passes.
