Camp Green,  
March 31, 1918.

Dear Friend:

I received your letter some time ago but I have been too busy to write to you, but, better late than never.

We have been drilling every day from morning til night and are going after it in a good manner. I like it fine and feel better than I ever did in my life.

It is hot here. The sun is just burning, but we are a happy bunch. We are anxious to go across and get the Germans, and I hope it won't be long before we can go.

Have you commenced spring's work yet? Have you all the men that you need?

I would be glad to get the Binford Times to read. I imagine I'll be here for some time and if I move I will get mail anyway. We may be moved soon, but I don't know and if I did know couldn't tell anyone.

Am over at the Y. M. C. A. having a nice time. They are singing and playing here. I tell you the Y. M. C. A. is a fine thing for the boys. It kills a lot of bad things that might happen otherwise.

Well, I will have to close for this time. Greet your family from me.
