

HANS AASLETTEN DIES OF HEART FAILURE

Pekin Budget: This community was deeply shocked Monday afternoon when the report was telephoned in that Hans Aasletten had died suddenly while on a business trip to his farm in Bergen township.

Mr. Aasletten, accompanied by Olaf Horven, went to see his renter, Elias Hegeberg, to get the Hall Insurance withdrawal blanks made out. They saw Mr. Hegeberg at the Tuffeland farm, and in order to get some records that Mr. Hegeberg had, they set out for the Aasletten farm in the southwest corner of Bergen township. He seemed to be as usual, when as they came to the corner by Hans J. Hanson, he fell back against the seat and died without a word. The car drove in to the Hanson yard, and efforts were made to revive him, but he was already dead. Dr. Link was called as soon as a telephone could be reached, but could only assist to death having been instantaneous and due to heart failure. The body was brought to Pekin, and Jas. Orr of Lakota was summoned and prepared the remains.

The two brothers, Christ and Andrew Aasletten and the sister, Mrs. Engen, live near St. John, N. Dak., and they were immediately notified by wire. Mrs. Engen was unable to come, and the brother, Christ, had left the day before for Canada. Andrew came down Tuesday and remained for the funeral. Besides these relatives mentioned the deceased is also survived by two brothers and a sister in Norway.

Hans Aasletten was born in Nordre Land, Norway, January 17th, 1862, and was thus 62 years, four months and 15 days old. He emigrated to America in the spring of 1890, and came then to Hancock, Minnesota, where he remained until 1892 when he went to Hatton, and shortly to this locality where he has made his home ever since. He filed on and proved up a quarter section of land in Bergen township which property is still in his possession. Some eight years ago he commenced to make Pekin his home and has resided here since.

The deceased was never married. He was a diligent worker, of a saving disposition, and enjoyed life in a quiet, inobtrusive manner. He was a social and jovial soul and made friends with everybody. Everybody liked him and he was respected by all. His health of late years did not permit him to perform any heavy labor, but he was always ready and willing to help with small jobs and light work. Always jolly, he would be ready to banter with you whenever you met him and you always felt cheered from contact with him.

Maybe he did not accomplish anything which the world would call great, but he had a place and purpose in this world, and we believe he filled it. We can all be the better for having known him. Personally we feel that we have lost a staunch and true friend.

The deceased was one of the first to join the Sons of Norway lodge

in Pekin, a membership he retained until his death. In this organization he was a steady and earnest worker, and he will long be missed in this assembly. The funeral arrangements were taken care of by the local lodge.

Funeral was held from the Pekin church, Thursday, June 5, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, interment being made in the Pekin cemetery. Rev. T. S. Hanson of Warwick officiated, and the Pekin choir assisted by members of the Sheyenne choir, assisted with a few appropriate choir songs. Pallbearers were brother members of the order as follows: B. A. Anderson, L. E. Quam, A. M. Bergstrom, A. L. Gulbro, O. S. Quam and E. C. Brekken.
