McHenry Tribune: Mrs. Michael Deehr was born in Germany in the year 1846, coming to America at the age of 8 years settling with her parents in the state of Wisconsin, and to the state of North Dakota about 40 years ago, and passed away at her home northeast of McHenry on Monday, October 30, 1922, and laid to rest Thursday, November 2, in the church cemetery near her home, being 76 years of age. The sad rites were conducted by Father McDonald.

In the passing of Mrs. Deehr North Dakota loses another pioneer. When they came to this part of the state there was nothing but prairie, Indians and coyotes, and trials of frontier life.

They established the Deehr post-office to which many of the old settlers made some venturesome trips to get their mail, and can tell some interesting tales relative to life on the North Dakota prairies. The mail was carried overland to the post-office. The postoffice was discontinued about fifteen years ago.

Mrs. Deehr was a good woman, a true and loving wife and mother, and her taking away will be felt by

a wide circle of friends.

Besides her immediate family, four brothers, Henry, Oscar, Arthur and Theodore, and two sisters, Mrs. Geo. Halvorson and Mrs. Herbert Simon, are left to mourn her demise. Her husband preceded her in death about fifteen years ago.
