Three more wins were added by the Binford club when Aneta-Sharon, Sutton and McHenry fell victims to the locals hitting. Aneta-Sharon retaliated in the morning game of the Fourth at Sharon, trimming the locals 4 to 0.

In the Sutton game played on the out of town grounds last Friday, the locals started right off in the first inning with a score. Hafner, first up, hit safely, stole second and went to third on a passed ball. In the meantime, Ehlers and Peterson went out on flies. Besse held the Aneta-Sharon team hitless in all but the first inning, while the locals garnered five hits off Swanman's delivery to no avail, getting only one hit per inning for five innings. No Binford runner reached third base.

In the winner's half of the first inning, Lano went out, Johnson to Ehlers. Halliday was given life on Hafner's error. Goff was hit by a pitched ball and took first, being replaced by Lano as runner. Ellingson hit for two bases to right field, Kingsley stepping in a hole just before reaching the ball. Halliday scored. Gropley hit to left field and two runs scored before Olson could come in from his deep position and get the ball to the plate. His throw was wild and Gronley took third. Swanman hit, scoring Gronley. Hanson struck out. Kittelson hit a roller to Johnson, who forced Swanman at second ending the inning. Four runs, three hits, two errors.

After the disastrous first inning, no Aneta-Sharon runner reached third, but one reached second and two first base.

SECOND HAIL STORM MAKES CLEAN SWEEP

CROPS IN ROSENDAL AND WILLOW TOWNSHIPS AND SOUTHERN NELSON COUNTY BADLY DAMAGED.

The second hail storm of the season hit the territory north and west of Binford last Saturday, and completely wiped out crops of all kinds in its path. It was even more disastrous than the one of three weeks ago when the country south of town was hit.

From information which The Times is able to collect, the storm began as far west as the Nerby farm, three miles east of McHenry, and took a northwesterly course, covering an area four miles in width. The farms of Barney Vogen, Albert Bjornson, John Asmus and others in that territory of Rosendal township, were hard hit and will suffer a total loss. Others who were just on the edge of the storm report partial loss. A quarter owned by Wm. Adrian, in Willow township, was completely wiped out and some damage was done to the Adrian home farm. The Mustad farm was hit slightly, but north of there and into Nelson county, it made a clean sweep.

The barn on the Lorentz Bjornson farm was completely wrecked.

The hail varied in size to as large as a base ball. Windows in many homes were broken, even though protected by screens. Live stock was injured.

Campers at Red Willow lake were caught in the storm on their way to the lake and were forced to remain until it was over.
