

# BOOSTER CLUB IS ORGANIZED FOR BINFORD

ORGANIZATION WAS PERFECT.  
LED LAST WEEK—STARTS OUT  
WITH PROMISE OF MUCH AC-  
TIVITY DURING COMING YEAR

Judging from the enthusiasm attending the organization of the Binford Booster club last Friday evening, it is generally believed that we have, at last, an organization that will live and continue to function for the best interests of Binford and surrounding country. It has been repeatedly pointed out that through the inactivity of our old Commercial club or the Community club, many projects of importance to this particular community were doomed to failure because of no concerted action behind the movement. Recognizing this, the new organization is determined that the enthusiasm, which is usually at its highest at the beginning, shall not be allowed to diminish and subsequently die. In order that it may live, a large membership is necessary and each individual should feel that upon himself rests the success of the organization. The idea of shifting the burden onto a few has caused our other clubs to cease functioning—we've learned that—and from that experience we hope to profit.

Many matters were discussed at Friday's meeting, the most important being the local grain situation and good roads. The difference in the grain prices in Binford and Jessie, for example, has been forcibly brought to our attention, and it is the intention of the club to relieve the situation, if possible. The discrimination between the prices in the two towns has driven farmers who usually make Binford their trading point, away from here with a consequent result of a loss in our other business establishments. On the other hand, the farmer cannot be blamed for selling his grain where he can realize the most for it.

The principal road projects that the club has in view are, the road leading into Red Willow lake and the short strip from the proposed state road east of town into the village. It is the intention to ask for county aid in building the Red Willow lake road. The traffic there in

the summer is very heavy.

The by-laws were adopted as submitted by the committee. Dues are placed at \$1.00.

### DIES AT LAKE CITY
