ELIAS KJORMOE PASSES AWAY

Elias Kjormoe was born near Ege-sund, Norway, June 19, 1863. He came to America with his parents, Ole and Ingeborg Kjormoe, at the age of fourteen years, and settled near Marshalltown, Iowa, where he grew to manhood. On May 5th, 1898, he was united in marriage to Miss Julia Etheim, to which union was born three sons, Elmer, aged 24, Oliver, aged 19, and Carl, aged 16 years, all of whom are at home.

About noon last Saturday, shortly after the family had partaken of their noonday meal, Mr. Kjormoe was taken ill with a stroke of apoplexy, from which he died Saturday evening, without regaining consciousness. He was 61 years, nine months and seven days old at the time of his death.

Besides his sorrowing wife and children he leaves to mourn his loss, a brother, Sam Kjormoe, of Marshalltown, Iowa.

A brief services was held at the home at noon, and at two o'clock services were held at the Lutheran Free Church, Rev. Halling, officiating. Special musical numbers were rendered by Mrs. Halling and by a mixed quartette. The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery west of town.
