The preliminary hearing of Andy Brown on the charge of murder in connection with the death of Marie Wick in Fargo on June 7 last, has been postponed until Friday, March 17. The postponement was necessitated by the fact that W. C. Green, state's attorney, who is prosecuting the case was engaged in another case in the Cass county district court.

It is understood that Brown will demand the hearing of evidence and that he will be represented by W. H. Barnett and Clair Brickner, who were the attorneys for William Gummer, already convicted and under sentence of life imprisonment for the murder of Marie Wick.

Gummer still is being held in the Barnes county jail at Valley City, but probably will be taken to Bismarck the last of the week.

As yet the appeal of Gummer to the supreme court that was announced at the time of his conviction, has not been perfected.

Brown is held in the Cass county district jail, without bonds.
