

# G. & F. STARS WIN CHAMPIONSHIP OF TWO-LEAGUE TILT

SECOND GAME OF INTER-LEAGUE SERIES WON BY G. & F. TEAM SPOONER PITCHES AND ALLOWS FIVE HITS

winning from the Home Players at Sutton last Sunday by the lative score of 9 to 2, the players representing the Griggs & Foster league won the Inter-League championship, taking two out of the series of three games.

The extreme heat and high wind Sunday made it miserable for ball, but in spite of that handicap, the game was more interesting than the score would indicate.

Spooner, of Grace City, the Griggs & Foster pitching ace, was in excellent form and held his opponents to five hits, and but for an error by Peterson, in center, after two men were out in the eighth, would have had a shut-out. His pitching in the first three innings was marvelous. In four previous innings, the Home Players attempted to score but were retired by three strike-outs. Kingsley, of Sutton, pitched the first five innings for the Home Players and was nipped for two hits and five runs. Wickham, of Wimbledon, relieved Kingsley in the sixth. Two errors, a walk and a hit batsman, and two hits, gave the Griggs & Foster four runs in the sixth frame.

The G. & F. counted two runs in the opening inning. Metz walked, but was struck out. Metz took second on Peterson's out to first, and scored on Slyter's hit. Slyter stole second on third and scored on Leahy's bin-

Ehlers grounded out to first. The run was counted in the fourth. Peterson opened with a single, stole second and took third when Tucker hit on Leahy's roller, and scored on Fosberg's out to first.

Two runs were hung up in the fifth. Spooner whiffed for the first out. Metz hit safe, Nelson and Peterson allowed suit. With the bases full, Peterson hit sharply to Tucker, Metz scoring, and Nelson was forced at first for the second out. Leahy brought Peterson home on a safe one out to right.

The G. & F. continued to heap up

some more in the eighth. Ehlers was safe on Tucker's error. Hafner erred on Fosberg's ground ball, Johnson was hit by pitched ball, loading the bases. Spooner hit to McGarry and was thrown out at first, Ehlers scoring. Metz walked, again filling the bases. Nelson brought Fosberg and Johnson home on a single to left. Peterson grounded out to first, advancing Metz and Nelson. With Metz perched on third, Slyter dumped one along the line, Metz scoring and Slyter beat the throw to first, for his third hit of the day. Nelson was run down between third and home, ending a long stay in the field for the Home Players.

Peterson gratuitously handed the opposition two runs in the eighth. As a center-fielder, he's a cracking good editor and a better printer. Hafner led off with a hard one to Slyter, who erred. Hafner stole second and took third on Wickham's hit to right. Wickham stole second. McGarry popped out to Spooner. Dunham struck out. Fallen hit to Peterson who—oh rats—Hafner and Wickham scoring. Kupka was out at first unassisted.
