No Penury for "Tino," as He Has Millions Safe

Former King Constantine of Greece is in no danger of being reduced to the penury which embittered the last days of former Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary, according to Greek circles in Paris. It is asserted that Constantine took precautions against this long ago and has 10,000,000 gold francs, or about \$2,000,000, in safe investments, deposited in New York City, Brazil, and Switzerland. The magnificent jewels of Queen Sophie and the royal household plate, were shipped to Switzerland as soon as the situation in Greece became disquieting.
