

FARMING CHANGE

COMES RAPIDLY

Interest in diversified farming has never been keener throughout the state than at the present time, is the declaration of John W. Haw, state extension leader at the North Dakota Agricultural college.

Mr. Haw has just returned from a trip through Ramsey, Bottineau and Towner counties, and says:

"County agents in the northern part of the state are being kept especially busy at the present time with poultry culling demonstrations and in giving aid and advice to those who are preparing turkeys and poultry for market.

"That whole country is full of poultry. It is really remarkable how this end of the agricultural business has been developed in recent years. Poultry has proved to be such a dependable profit making business that farmers are going into it more extensively everywhere.

"From my observations it would appear that there will be a very small acreage of rye this year. Where in former years farmers could be seen drilling in rye quite generally at this season, very little rye seeding can now be seen.

"There will be a big part of the potato crop left in the ground if the present prices do not advance soon."
