

A. H. Overby and family returned early yesterday morning from an extended visit with relatives in Rice and Goodhue counties, Minnesota. Just after leaving St. Paul, on their downward journey, they met with a serious accident, and it's a miracle that it did not prove fatal. As they were rounding a curve they met two autos coming from the opposite direction. The first one, a Ford, observed the traffic rules by keeping to the right, but the rear car, in attempting to pass the Ford ahead of it, did not see the Overby car approaching, and collided with terrific force. The front end of Mr. Overby's Ford was completely wrecked. The other car, a big Stearns roadster, sustained a broken front ax and other minor damages. Mr. Overby was pushed forward onto the steering wheel with such force that it was bent, and it was some time before he was able to collect his thoughts sufficiently to look after the welfare of the members of his family. His daughter, Mary, who was riding in the front seat with him, fell into the

windshield and received three bad cuts, requiring ten stitches. She bled profusely. Mrs. Overby was thrown out of the car and when picked up was beneath the running board. She sustained no severe external injury. The contact of the two cars and her fall to the ground shook her up badly and it will be some time before she fully recovers. The young boy was thrown clear of the car and landed on a three-foot embankment near the road. The man in the other car was not injured, but he was held responsible for the accident, and reimbursed Mr. Overby to the extent of a new Ford, and paid some other expenses.
