

M. A. Hagle returned last Saturday from Grand Forks, where he had taken his son, Henry, for treatment in the public health laboratory of the university, for bites which had been inflicted by a mad dog, an account of which was in The Times last week. This is the twenty-fourth case to be treated at the public health laboratory. The famous Pasteur treatment is the one used. Until the last two years no means of preventing rabies was known to the medical profession. The Pasteur institute at the university is the only one in the northwest outside of the twin cities.
