

Edwin Opdahl, who has been working here during harvest and threshing, was arrested Sunday evening on a charge of bootlegging. He was lodged in the village lockup over night and Monday States Attorney Tufte came up from Cooperstown to conduct the examination. At the hearing in the afternoon, evidence was brought out to show that two other parties had purchased whiskey from him besides the man making the complaint, so the hearing was postponed until evening so the others could be brought to town to testify. Sufficient testimony was introduced to warrant binding the defendant over to the district court, which convenes in November. He was taken to Cooperstown to await trial. The witnesses, with one exception, furnished bonds for their appearance. The other was in poor circumstances and could get no one to go bail for him, or didn't have anything valuable enough to hold to insure his appearance when the case is tried. He was instructed, however, to correspond regularly with the states attorney, or suffer penalty. There is no question but what he will comply with the law laid down.
