

BANK ROBBER APPREHENDED

Believed to Be One of the
Rogers Bank Robbers is
Apprehended.

Sunday afternoon Sheriff Sten-
chel came up to Rogers and took
into custody a man who is be-
lieved to be one of the robbers
connected with the Rogers bank
robbery of last week.

The suspect caught sails under
the name of Joe Barnett, but de-
tectives claim his right name is
Frank Floyd and that he is an es-
caped convict from the South Da-
kota penitentiary.

Barnett has been hanging around
Rogers for the past couple of
months and though offered work
a number of times he constantly
refused to go to work. On the
day before the robbery he hired
out to J. E. Lumpkin. When
night came he did not want to
sleep in the house and was per-
mitted to sleep in the barn.

The next morning he was at
work all right but one of Mr.
Lumpkin's lanterns was missing.
A lantern had been left by the
burglars at the bank on the
morning of the robbery.

Barnett came to town Sunday
morning and a few suspicious ac-
tions combined with the lantern
incident caused the postmaster to
become suspicious and the sheriff
was notified and he came up and
placed Barnett under arrest and
took him to Valley City.

Prominent detectives claim

that Barnett's name is Frank
Floyd and that he is one of the
worst and shrewdest criminals in
the country. It is thought that
the hiring out scheme was mere-
ly a clever ruse for proving an
alibi in case he was recognized
on the night of the robbery,—
