

SPERRY CASE IS POSTPONED

**Opposing Parties Not Anxious
That it be Tried Until Late in
February or Early March.**

The trial of Clyde Sperry of Aneta, charged with the murder of Kenneth McKenzie, will not take place at Fargo until the latter part of February or the fore part of March, if the opposing attorneys carry out the agreement into which they have entered. It has been stipulated by the parties that the case shall be transferred to Cass county, but no order to that effect has been made by Judge Burr as yet.

Judge Pollock several days ago fixed Jan. 30 as the date for the trial, but that step was taken, it is stated, as a result of a slight misunderstanding. Showing very likely will be made to that effect and a continuance granted.

Sperry is charged with complicity in the killing of young McKenzie, the Aneta boy who was burned to death in 1909, and which the state contends was murder, while the defense contends it was an accident.

The first trial took place at Lakota and the jury disagreed.
