

# DIDN'T FLY UP HIGH ENOUGH

## Aeroplane Is Not Good Vehicle in Which to Escape Creditors.

The luck of "Lucky" Bob St. Henry, the famous Curtiss North Dakota aero artist was suddenly changed last Friday when he found himself forced to go into voluntary bankruptcy, as a result of living beyond his means.

The papers were filed Friday in the federal court in Fargo, where the court adjudged him a bankrupt and his case was turned over to the referee in bankruptcy Emerson H. Smith. St. Henry's petition for bankruptcy was voluntary, his liabilities exceeding his resources by \$3,917, the latter being found entirely lacking.

Among the principal creditors of "Lucky" Bob, who include people from coast to coast, are the Palace hotel of Fresno, Cal., where he owes a bill of \$400, the Nicollet hotel, Minneapolis, he owes \$100, the Hollis Electric company of Minneapolis, and the Electric Manufacturing company of St. Paul are other creditors.

Bob St. Henry appeared at the county fair in Cooperstown in June, but failed to live up to his contract. The contract called for two flights each day of the fair, but he made one flight and then pulled out, causing a great deal of disappointment to many who had been attracted for the sole purpose of seeing the exhibition. He has made a number of flights throughout the state, the last having been at Minot where he attracted much attention. St. Henry's home is in Carrington, North Dakota.
