

MUCH BUILDING IN THE SPRING

Thompson Yards Have Closed Several Deals, With Others Pending.

Judging from the outlook at the present time, building activities in the spring, in Binford and surrounding country, will be greater than it has been for many years past.

Mr. Osen, the local manager of the Thompson yards, has furnished us the names of those whom he has already closed deals with for lumber and other material, and he has many more bills which are pending, and will be closed at an early date. The Thompson yards own their mills on the coast and by shipping direct to their local yards, the middle man has been eliminated, thereby giving their customers the advantage of this saving in price. In addition to that, their liberal plans of settlement makes it possible for the average man who is not possessed with an over abundance of cash to make the payments without much inconvenience. Building operations will begin as soon as the frost is out of the ground in the spring, and the list of those who have already decided to build, or make improvements, is printed below:

H. O. Osborn, on the Church farm, will erect a house, 18x26-14, with five rooms; and a barn 56x45-14.

E. Wold, a contractor and builder, who will come from Shelly, Minnesota, to locate here, will build a cottage in town, 24x26-9.

Ole Bakken will erect a four-room cottage on his farm for Christ Overby. The house will measure 28x28 and 9 feet posts.

Paul Doll is to build a farm elevator, holding 10,500 bushels; and a machine shed, 40x60-8.

C. E. Peterson will erect a bungalow, containing six rooms and bath, 28x42-9.

John Jacobs will build a residence in Binford, 14x28-14.

Peter Lysne will build a house, 24x26-12, with eight rooms and hall, and a barn 28x48-14, on his farm.

An addition with basement will be built onto the Lutheran Free church, and other interior improvements be made.

Frank Bowe will have some modern improvements made in his residence.

Abe Abraham will erect a store building on Main street the dimensions of which are 24x50-14.

A. D. Shaw will remodel the interior of his restaurant.

John Finstuen will build a barn on his farm measuring 28x48 with 14 foot posts.
