

WIND STORM DOES DAMAGE

Terrific Wind Has Blown Out Some Seeded Grain--Other Damage Reported.

The heavy wind which has continued since last Sunday, has done some damage to seeded grain, especially on the light soil and fall plowing and summer fallow. The fact that not much plowing was done last year has proven a benefit, because the soil on spring plowing isn't so pulverized, and not so apt to blow.

Small outbuildings and windmills have been blown over.

Automobile parties, who started out Sunday before the wind had reached its highest, experienced considerable difficulty in returning home late in the afternoon. The F. G. Lewis, D. A. Goplin, and C. A. Linse families, who were returning from the south, became lost in the dust near the Dox farm and drove off the road many rods before the real situation had dawned upon them.

During the lull of the wind early Tuesday evening, a manure pile on the Ramsfield place in south Binford was set on fire, and when the wind increased the sparks were blown onto the grass and for a time before the fire bell called out the citizens, it looked as though some of the buildings in that part of the town were doomed.
