A stabbing affray at Sutton Tuesday morning, at about one o'clock, resulted in the death of one man and the serious injury of another. Geo. Myers, who is employed as cook in the Sutton cafe, is the perpetrator of the near double tragedy, and is now behind the bars at Cooperstown awaiting time for his sentence, which in all probability, will be a life term in the state penitentiary at Bismarck. The accounts of the murder, which we have heard, vary a little, but it seems that all the men were more or less under the influence of liquor. Ed Lundmark, the murdered man, and Meyers had had a few hot words in the cafe followed by a fist encounter in which Lundt mark received a black eye bandmark then left the restaurant and - was chased down the street a short f distance by Meyers, who carried a - vicious looking knife, with which he f committed the awful crime. Death r was instantanious. Lundmark's s companion, Jack Saunders, thinking n it was no more than a continuance d of the fistic fight in the cafe, went s to separate the two men, and was turned upon by Meyers and stabbed h between the ribs. Saunders was it taken to Fargo and is in a serious s condition. Lundmark and Saunders p have worked around Sutton for two Il years or more. Meyers had been in e Sutton for about two months and to had an unsavory reputation. The 1- coroner's jury was composed of Ben ir Howden, Robert Staar and Adolph k Kjelson, who rendered a verdict of murder. It is one of the most cold-blooded crimes ever committed in the state, and there is hardly any question but what the murderer will extreme penalty for the
