

MEMORIAL DAY.



PROGRAMME MAY 29, 1897.

George P. Foster post and Sons of Veterans will form in front of the G. A. R. hall on Steele avenue at 10:45 o'clock a. m., headed by the Hope Cornet Band.

General orders from department headquarters will be read by the adjutant, after which the column will counter march to front of the town hall where they will meet the school children and citizens in procession.

The column will then be reformed for the march to the cemetery in the following order:

Hope Cornet Band,
Geo. P. Foster Post,
Womans Relief Corps, No. 16,
Sons of Veterans,
School Children,
Other Societies and Citizens.

The column will move at 11 o'clock a. m., and proceed direct to the cemetery.

On arriving at the cemetery the opening exercises will begin with:

Invocation by the chaplain,
Song by the male quartette,
Address by Rev. J. E. Jones.

Music by the Hope Cornet Band?
Exercises by the Sons of Veterans,
Exercises by twelve little girls and twelve little boys, by decorating the graves.

Firing salute,
The return march.

The marshals of the day are Thos. Ward and Comrade Laor King.
