Pioneer Press: During the storm of last Monday night Mrs. Alexander, residing at 436 Carroll street, St. Paul, who was standing on the porch of her residence, was startled by a flash in the sky. Looking upward she beheld a ball of fire rapidly descending to the earth with many a spiral twist and sudden deviation from its path. The fiery object flashed through the air with an angry hiss and struck the ground a short distance away with a heavy thud. The next morning Mrs. Alexander sent her children out to look for the meteorite in the vacant lot in which it had appeared to fall. They soon found it about one-third buried in the ground. It weighs about 100 pounds, is gray in color and egg shaped. In many respects it resembles a granite boulder. Encircling the strange stone are two ridges, each an inch wide, as smooth as glass. The rest of the surface is pitted with indentations or depressions.
