# WAR NEWS

Washington, July 13.—Gen. Shafter thinks that almost the entire Spanish army have fled from Santiago while the officers were dickering for surrender. They are supposed to have gone west. When our men advanced on the enemy they found hundreds of dummy guns made of wood, and placed in position for a blind. The city is entirely surrounded. No trouble to capture it now. Gen. Miles and staff have landed. There are now 27,000 available men at Santiago.

Under date of the 12th, Gen. Shafter says: Assisted by the navy we bombarded the city Sunday evening for three hours, doing enormous damage. The Vesuvius, Iowa, Indiana, Brooklyn, New York and others, participated.

He further states that a flag of truce has been up since 2 o'clock, considering proposition for surrendering.

Subscriptions to the war loan now amount to \$50,000,000.

After Santiago falls our troops will advance on Porto Rico.

It is officially stated that Spain is ready to sue for peace provided we accept Cuba only, for all of our trouble. This, Uncle Sam will not do. We demand all of Spain's possessions this side of the pond. Our indemnity at this writing amounts to about \$240,000,000.

For the destruction of Cervera's fleet Schley and his men will receive from our government \$200,700 as prize money.

Washington, July 13.—Adjutant General Corbin today received from Gen. Shafter a revised and corrected report of the casualties before Santiago on July 1, 2, and 3, viz: Total number: killed 231, of which 23 were officers and 208 privates; 80 officers were wounded, also 1,023 privates. Total number wounded 1,103. Missing 81, making a total of 1,185.

Official Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners of Steele County.

County Official Proceedings of the Board of Review and Equalization, for the Year 1898.

Sherbrooke, N. D., July 5, 1898.

County board of review and equalization met at 11 o'clock a.m. in the office of the county auditor. Present O. W. Williams, chairman; Laor King, G. O. Johnson, H. J. Rind and R. B. Cochrane, county commissioners, and Charles G. Boise, county auditor.

On motion O. W. Williams was elected chairman of said board.

The board then proceeded to take the oath as members of the board of review and equalization of Steele county, to equalize the real and personal property assessment of said county for the year 1898, and filed the same.

No one appearing to present any application to correct their assessment, the board adjourned at 12 o'clock meridian, adjourned to 1:30 o'clock p.m.

County board of review and equalization reconvened at 1:30 o'clock p.m. pursuant to adjournment. Present O. W. Williams, chairman; and Laor King, G. O. Johnson, H. J. Rind and R. B. Cochrane, commissioners, and Charles G. Boise, county auditor.

The board then proceeded to examine the assessment rolls and lists of the various assessment townships or districts in the county.

After comparing the assessment of real estate and personal property, as returned by the assessors of the various townships, the board proceeded to equalize the assessment of the various townships in the county.

R. R. Fisher appeared before the board and presented an application for a reduction of the assessment of the sw  $\frac{1}{4}$  of section 6, twp 144 n, range 56 w, in the amount of 50 per cent.

After considering the evidence submitted, and the board being satisfied that the assessment of said tract was unjust, on motion it was ordered that the real estate valuation of the sw  $\frac{1}{4}$  of section 6, township one hundred and forty-four, north, of range fifty-six, (56) west, be, and the same was reduced in the amount of 30 per cent.
