

COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS.

Official Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners of Steele County.

Sherbrooke, N. D., May 7, 1898.

Board of county commissioners convened at 10 o'clock a. m. pursuant to adjournment. Present O. W. Williams, chairman, and Commissioners King, Johnson and Cochrane.

The minutes of the meeting of April 11, 1898, were read and approved.

On motion the following bills were allowed and ordered paid from the general fund by warrants, viz:

On motion the board adjourned until 1:30 o'clock p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Board reconvened at 1:30 p. m., pursuant to adjournment. Present O. W. Williams, chairman, and Commissioners King, Johnson and Cochrane.

In view of the fact that the county has a large number of poor patients needing medical treatment in the north half of Steele county, and the county has no regular employed physician to take charge of cases in such district, and it being expedient to put them under the charge of a regular physician:

On motion the county auditor was instructed to advertise in the county official papers for bids from physicians to become the county physician for the north half of Steele county, the bid to include service and medicine for the period of one year, said bids to be opened on Wednesday, July 6, 1898, at 11 o'clock a. m., the board reserving the right to reject any and all bids.

The application of Joseph F. Beckerjeck to purchase the interest of the county in and to lots 19, 20 and 21, in block 12, original townsite of Hope, agreeing to pay the sum of \$17 therefor, was presented to the board.

On motion said petition was granted, and the chairman directed to execute, and the auditor to attest a quit claim deed of said premises to said Joseph F. Beckerjeck.

The hour of 2 p. m., having arrived the board proceeded to open bids for the furnishing of material, hauling the same and the construction of eight pile bridges, as duly advertised.

On motion all bids to furnish material and construction of bridges with wooden piling, were rejected.

On motion the bid of Dibley & Robinson to furnish all material and the construction of five bridges with steel sub-structures, and three steel sub-structure bridges with combination superstructures, as per plans and specifications, and to furnish steel sub-structure and to construct the Hollingstad bridge, the county furnishing the lumber for said last named bridge. All of said bridges to be completed for inspection and approval, on or before July 15, 1898, for the sum of \$2,500; it being understood that the county shall deliver all bridge material on the various bridge sites from the stations.

On motion the bids for hauling material were accepted and contracts awarded as follows, viz:

T. M. Major, bridge No. 1, at \$2.00 per M. feet; bridges 2 and 3, at \$1.95 per M. feet; D. N. Van Dusen, bridge 4, at \$1.20 per M. feet; bridges 7 and 8, at \$1.30 per M. feet; Adolph Peterson bridge 5, at 98c per M. feet; Ole Harstad bridge 6, at \$1.65 per M. feet; they being the lowest bidders therefor.

On motion O. W. Williams, G. O. Johnson and R. P. Cochrane, were appointed a committee to inspect bridges Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 5, and H. J. Rindy and Laor King were appointed a committee to inspect bridges Nos. 1, 6, 7, 8 and the Hollingstad bridge, when completed.
