## Declamation Contest

The second annual interscholastic declamation contest, under the auspices of the State University of North Dakota, was held in the M. E. church at Grand Forks last Friday evening. A very large crowd attended, the church being filled long before time for the program to begin, where many were obliged to stand throughout the evening.

There were ten contestants, seven young ladies and three young gentlemen. The program was interspersed with music by the University band, which was fine, to say the least.

Each contestant was there to win and the dramatic ability displayed was a credit to the high schools represented. Our contestant, Miss Eunice Jacobson, was fifth on the program and murmurs of "there's the win-

ner" were heard on all sides as soon as she began to speak. The sympathy of the house was with her from start to finish, no other contestant holding the undivided attention of the crowded house as she did.
