### HOPE STATE HIGH SCHOOL.

School Opens Sept. 4—Equipment, Instructors, Etc.

Hope State High school opens September 4 under the most auspicious conditions, with better equipment and facilities for instruction than ever before in the history of our school.

According to the state department, this is one of the three best schools in the state and with the hearty co-operation of the parents, students and teachers, it can easily be raised to the highest standard of scholarship, discipline and usefulness. The success or failure of any system of schools depends as much upon the constituents as upon the equipment and faculty. Therefore we earnestly and sincerely request those who have the best interests of our school at heart to contribute their support and visit the institution when it is in operation in order that they may see what is being done for the children as a whole.

Physical, botanical, chemical and zoological laboratories have been installed and a very complete line of apparatus for same have been purchased for immediate use, this apparatus being one of the requisites for first classification. This equipment will render instruction easier and more efficient. In this apparatus are found a valveless air pump and Wimhurst electrical machine, two of the best pieces of mechanism in the scientific market today.

An electric gong has been installed for fire drills and other purposes. A systematic fire drill will be begun immediately and practice drill will be given at least twice a week. Then, too, this drill is considered by educators as a splendid means of discipline and a great safeguard in emergency.

The east room on the south side of the basement has been finished for a laboratory for the High school. With this room and the apparatus we shall have a laboratory second to none among the classified schools.

New furniture for the library and High school office has been purchased and gives these quarters dignified and university appearance.

Our faculty consists of strong teachers with long and valuable experience, including normal and university graduates.

Miss Evelyne L. Kasper, a graduate of the University of Minnesota, a young lady with professional reference and unimpeached reputation, will act as principal of the High school. Miss Kasper comes to us highly recommended by the university and the superintendents under whom she has taught. She is thoroughly qualified to render efficient service in any capacity and will add strength and dignity to our faculty.

Miss Lillian A. Horner, a graduate of Pottsdam, N. Y., Normal and a teacher in the Rochester, N. Y., city schools for ten years, will have charge of the seventh and eighth grades. With ten years experience in our department of school work, Miss Horner will certainly deliver the goods.

Miss Alfa M. Carpenter, a classical graduate of the University of Minnesota and our third and fourth grade teacher last year, has been promoted to the fifth and sixth grades. Miss Carpenter rendered efficient service in her former capacity and we bespeak for her success in her new position.

Miss Lucretia Baker, a young lady of our own city and a teacher in the Grand Forks public schools for several years, will have charge of the third and fourth grades. Miss Baker has been very successful at Grand Forks and we

consider her a valuable addition to our faculty.

Miss Julia Larson will have charge of the second grade and teach physical culture in all grades. Miss Larson has been very successful in all her undertakings and will doubtless make good again.

Our primary department will be under the able and efficient supervision of Miss Alta Gilmore who has been with us several years. Each succeeding class under her tutorship becomes stronger and stronger.

Last but not least, we are happy indeed to have with us again in the capacity of janitor our genial Charles Amos, always faithful, capable and pleasant. Mr. Amos has been working faithfully all summer at the school house, making various needed repairs and improvements, and we are confident that he will be better this year as a all around handy man than ever before.
