On motion K. S. Sulland was chosen temporary Chairman. Minutes of the meeting of July 3rd, 1905, read and on motion approved.

On motion the Chairman appointed H. N. Horner, K. A. Johnson, G. O. Johnson and himself as a committee to check up the accounts and records of the County Treasurer, which work was taken up until 12 o'clock noon when adjournment was taken until 1:30 p. m., same day.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Board reconvened at 1:30 p. m. All members present—F. Gray taking his place as Chairman.

After completing the work in the Treasurer's office, the committee reported that they found the cash, accounts, and records satisfactory, and the committee was discharged.

The Auditor and Treasurer were on motion authorized to prepare and have published in The Hope Pioneer a financial statement of the County for the year ending June 30th, 1905.

On motion the Auditor was instructed to advertise for bids for furnishing the County with 20 tons of hard nut coal, to be delivered in the cellar of the Court house not later than November 1st, 1905; bids to be received up to 2 o'clock p. m. October 2nd, 1905.

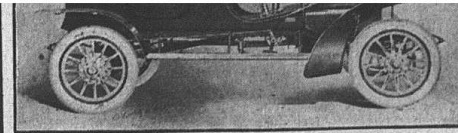
On motion duly seconded and carried the Treasurer and Auditor were authorized and directed to transfer \$2700.00 from the penalty and interest fund to the bridge fund.

Mr. H. Savage appeared before the Board and asked for abatement of a part of his assessment in Sharon Village for the years 1904 and 1905. On motion the Chairman appointed H. N. Horner and G. O. Johnson as a committee to investigate the matter.

The committee that was appointed to inspect site for grading on line between sections 22 and 27, Greenview twp., having made their report, it was on motion ordered that an appropriation of \$200.00 be made to assist Greenview twp. in grading on line between sections 22 and 27.

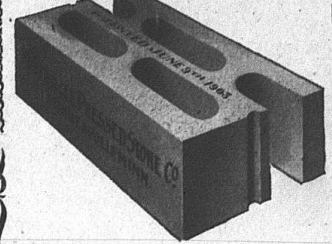
