

# GAME LAWS.

---

For the benefit of those who are not posted on the game laws we publish the following summary of the laws of this state. We wish to call special attention to the paragraph relating to permits. Deputy Game Warden Washburn has the permits for sale and if you intend to go hunting it will be a good idea to call on him and get one and avoid trouble.

## Open Seasons

Buffalo, Elk, Caribou, Mountain Sheep—Absolutely protected at all times.

Antelope—Protected until January 1, 1911.

Deer—November 10 to December 1.

Beaver—Protected until January 1, 1920.

Otter—November 10 until December 10.

Prairie Chicken, Pinnated Grouse, Sharp Tailed Grouse, Ruffled Grouse. Woodcock—September 1 to October 15.

Quail, English Pheasant, Wild Swan, Chinese Pheasant—September 1 to October 15.

Wild Duck (all varieties) Wild Goose, Crain, Brant—September 1 to May 1.

## Game Limit

Unlawful to kill more than twenty-five of game birds above mentioned in any one day, or more than five of the animals above mentioned in any one season.

Unlawful to sell, expose for sale or have in possession with intent to sell or ship for sale any Prairie Chicken, Pinnated Grouse, Sharp Tailed Grouse, Ruffled Grouse, Woodcock or Deer.

Shipment of any and all kinds of game without the state prohibited.

Permits must be got from the county auditor and a fee of seventy-five cents will be charged residents and twenty-five dollars non residents for said permits. Any one found hunting without a permit is liable to a fine of not less than twenty-five nor more than fifty dollars or may be imprisoned not more than thirty days.
