The First National Bank of Hannaford.

The business houses of a community are very often a safe index of its character. This is especially true of a bank, inasmuch as the bank is more or less behind all the business of a community, at least to the extent to which they are called upon to finance and further all extensions and improvements. Realizing all this, A. H. Berg and others decided to establish a bank here that would fill all requirements and to that end the Griggs County State Bank was organized with a capital of \$100,000.
